PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

(Continued from 7th page)

Hon. Mr. Richards followed. He pointed out that the delegates had a number of interviews with the Ministers, and also had the honor of having an interview with the rail cabinet. The delegates were received most courteously by the Premier and his colleagues in the Government, and the Premier promised the most careful consideration of the facts, as set forth in the memorial. He had no doubt as to the strength of our claims. There were several items in the memorial that had not been previously submitted such as that bearing upon the fishery award, as we were entitled to recompense for two years previous to entering confederation. Mr. Richards also pointed out that when this province entered confederation it was estimated that the expenditure would not exceed a certain amount, but it has exceeded the amount estimated by several millions. In regard to winter communication he claimed that if it was found impossible to carry out the terms of Union compensation should be afforded. When we entered confederation there was no idea of subsidizing local railways. This has been done and although this province does not participate in the benefits accruing therefrom we contribute our share. This was one of the grounds upon which this province obtained \$20,000 a year additional. By allowing us the amount the principle was admitted and the province was beyond a doubt entitled to more. Then a large amount has been expended on canals that were not contemplated at the time of entering confederation, and this makes another strong claim. It has been said that this would apply to the other provinces as well. But such is not the case for this is an Island and therefore receives no direct benefit. Another inducement upon which we entered confederation was that we should have continuous steam communication. This however has not been afforded, and we should be compensated therefor. It was promised that during recess the representations of the delegates from this province would receive serious consideration. The delegates proposed arbitration in respect to our claims. They contended that as we are not on an equal footing with the other provinces in respect to the benefit of subsidized public works we should receive an additional subsidy. He hoped that the mission to Ottawa would be productive of much good to the province.

The discussion was continued by Mr. D. A. McKinnon and Hon. Mr. Macdonald, the latter having the floor when recess was taken at six o'clock.

A BLOODY PROBLEM.

Did Boston or New York Shed the First Revolutionary Gore?

A brass tablet on the side of the building at 28 State street, Boston, just in the rear of the old statehouse bears this inscription:

OPPOSITE THIS SPOT WAS SHED THE FIRST BLOOD OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, MARCH 5TH, 1770.

Erected by the Bostonian Society, 1880.

A brass tablet in the south lobby of the New York general postoffice bears this inscription:

On the Common of the City of New York, near where this building now stands, there stood from 1766 to 1776 a liberty pole to commemorate the repeal of the stamp act. It was repeatedly destroyed by the violence of the Tories, and as repeatedly placed by the Sons of Liberty, who organized a constant watch and guard. In its defense the first blood of the American Revolution was shed—Jan. 18, 1770.

A. D. 1897—Erected by Mary Washington Colonial Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Anent the issue thus raised as to where and when the first blood of the Revolution was shed, Theodore Roosevelt, in his "New York," has this to say of the affair of Jan. 18:

"This was the first bloodshed in the struggle which culminated in the Revolution. It occurred six weeks before the so-called 'Boston massacre,' an incident of the same kind in which, however, the Americans were much less clearly in the right than they were in the New York case. Even in New York the soldiers had doubtless been sorely provoked by the taunts and jeers of the townsmen, but there was absolutely no justification for their cutting down the liberty pole, and the New Yorkers were perfectly right in refusing to submit tamely to such an outrage. The chief fault seems to have lain with the garrison officers, who should have kept their men under restraint or else have taken immediate steps to remedy the wrong they did in cutting down the pole."—New York Commercial Advertiser.

PICK ME UPS.

Remedies For Those Who Have Imbibed Not Wisely, but Too Well.

Take any man who is in the habit of looking in the bottom of the glass for "pure sociability" at intervals from noon until midnight, and for stomach comfort before he breaks his fast in the morning, and let him, after he has arisen and dressed, repair to a drug store instead of to a barroom. He has no appetite. He does not feel as though he were "all there." Instead of a cocktail let him ask the druggist to prepare a mixture of these ingredients and quantities, which, when mixed together, shall constitute a single dose: Chloroform, 5 drops; tincture ginger, half teaspoonful; compound tincture cardamon, 2 teaspoonfuls; water, a wineglassful. Swallow that slowly—take five minutes to do it. You will be surprised to find that in about 15 minutes the "all gone" feeling will have disappeared. A gentle, pleasant warmth is felt in place of the gnawing sensation, and in a very little while there are decided symptoms of being hungry. A repetition of the dose inside of an hour, in case the attack of the night before was very severe, will do no harm. A cup of black coffee 20 minutes after the first dose is an excellent thing to follow with, provided the patient is not of a particularly nervous temperament.

You will find some men whose nerves become unstrung upon very slight alcoholic provocation, and such men are prone to try the similia similibus curantur racket. The best thing for a case of that kind is the drug store again. Here is the dose: Elixir celery, a dram; elixir cocoa, a dram; elixir hops, a dram; bromide of sodium, 20 grains.

The narrator will guarantee that you will never resort to whisky again after you have tried whichever of these doses may suit your particular case. As soon as you feel able to eat, make your breakfast of oatmeal principally for two or three days. On the day after taking the first dose invest in two Havana oranges and substitute the juice for the pick me up tonic. If the stomach rejects the oranges as too sweet, throw them away and try the tonic again, but eventually return to the fruit.—Philadelphia Times.
