Activities In Seed Potato Certification

Following are excerpts from the report on activities in seed potato certification for 1953, given at the Agricultural Council conference yesterday by Mr. H. C. MacLaren, District Inspector:

The number of applications for inspection received in 1953 showed only a slight increase over 1952 (4,453 as against 4,200). However, an increase of 25% over the previous year (28,805 as against 23,109).

The 1953 planting and growing seasons were exceptionally good but the first part of the harvest was greatly hindered by continued good growth until affected by late blight which made its appearance in the Carleton district July 10th. This was eleven days earlier than its appearance last year. In a very short time it spread to practically all sections of the Island, reducing our yield of seed stock by about 230,000 bushels. However, this blight did not cause any great loss due to rot in the tubers at harvest time. No doubt the weather or the strain of late blight which was present had some bearing on this as we very rarely had late blight prevalent throughout the season without causing considerable rot in the tubers.

The report gives a statistical summary of the results of field inspection and the estimated yield (graded stock) for 1953, compared with 1952. In acreages which passed field inspection most all varieties showed a slight decrease with the exception of Irish Cobblers which had an increase of 480 acres and in the Sebago variety the increase was 3,400 acres over the 1952 planting.

As expected there was an increase in virus diseases due to the crop remaining green late in the previous season. This gave the aphids plenty of time to transmit the viruses.

The prevalence of black leg varies greatly from season to season. Some years black leg may be relatively scarce while during other years a high percentage develops — such was the case in 1953. This year 1,500 acres were rejected as compared to 200 acres in 1952.

Seed Potato Classes

For the past number of years there were three classes of seed potatoes in Canada, namely: Foundation, Foundation-A, and Certified. This was found to be very confusing to growers and dealers in the U. S. A. and other foreign countries, beside being an extra expense for tags and inspection. This past season Canada went back to the two classes — Foundation and Certified.

The report gives a table showing Foundation and Certified 1953 compared with Foundation, Foundation A and Certified 1952. 11,336 acres of the 1953 crop rated Foundation, 11,960 acres rated Certified. In varieties, Katahdin rated the highest with 1334 acres Foundation and 480 acres Certified. Keswick rated the lowest — 44 acres Foundation and 146 acres Certified. In the 1952 crop 3,982 acres rated Foundation, 11,890 acres Foundation A, and 5,166 acres Certified.

Shipments to Jan. 31st

The shipments of seed potatoes began about the same date as last year, the first ship being loaded at Summerside, October 17th. By the end of January 1,154,893 bushels had left the Province, the bulk of which was transported by water.

The statement below indicates the number of ships loaded at the various ports, showing the number of bushels transported by water in comparison with shipments from the 1952 crop:

The report notes that seed potato growers from this Province again made an excellent showing with their selection of exhibits for the 1953 Maritime Winter Fair. For the sixth consecutive year the Grand Championship for the Maritimes was won by an Island grower. The Reserve Grand Championship also went to an Island grower this year. Total prizes awarded to the Maritimes were divided as follows:

Seed plots for instructional purposes were planted by our inspectors at O'Leary, Summerside, Kentville, Charlottetown, Souris and East Baitie for the purpose of aiding growers in recognizing vertical differences and identifying diseases for roguing purposes.

The experiment carried on to determine the effect of seawater on cargoes of seed potatoes is completed and the report on this will be released in the near future. The report also gave details of shipments from the 1952 crop.
