HOUSEHOLD HINT

Well-seasoned bread crumbs add interesting texture and flavor and an attractive finish to creamed dishes, vegetables and casseroles. Sauté one-quarter cup minced onion in one-quarter cup butter until soft, but not brown. Add one teaspoon of poultry seasoning, one teaspoon of chopped parsley and a little salt and pepper. Add one and a half cups of soft bread crumbs to the mixture and toss together until it is well mixed.

It's always a good idea to bake extra bread and rolls, and store what can't be eaten immediately in the freezer. However always keep breads wrapped when they are thawing at room temperature to prevent moisture from collecting on the bread surface. Bread-making has always been a carefully protected symbol of civilization. The Greeks would let only priests make bread because they reasoned that dealing with the staff of life was the business of men trained in religious matters. The Romans, a practical-minded people, turned bread-making over to the Civil Service and enforced rigid sanitary regulations.
