## 7 Sisters Serve 289 Years With Roman Catholic Order

**ST. ALBANS, Vt. (AP)** — The seven Thibault sisters, all dressed alike, returned to their birthplace here last week for a reunion.

Their similar attire was the habit of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, a Roman Catholic order which each of the sisters joined many years ago.

The seven nuns have served the order a total of 289 years, with Sister Mary Hubert (Alice Thibault, the eldest), having completed 50 years.

They are the only living children of the late Amedee and Rose Thibault and were born and raised in St. Albans. Their father died in 1961 at the age of 96 and their mother died in 1944.

The sisters were reluctant to disclose their ages but in seniority their service years are, after Sister Mary Hubert: 46 years for Sister Mary Opportune; 45 years for Sister Rita of Cassia; 44 years each for Sister May Camille of Jesus and Sister Mary Teresa of Aida, and 30 years each for Sister Rose Alma and Sister Mary Doloretta.

**LONG SEPARATION** — It was the first reunion for the seven sisters in many years and they wistfully said, it wasn't likely they would gather again in the near future.

Their work as teachers has taken them to many widely separated places, mostly in New England, in the long years of service to the church.

After her half-century of active duty, Sister Mary Hubert will soon retire to a manor house of the Sisters of the Holy Cross for a well-earned rest from her long labors.

Already on-duty at a manor house in Manchester, N.H., is Sister Teresa of Aida.

The sisters brushed aside personal questions about their lives, saying only that all wished to serve God and feel the sisterhood was the best way.

**Steel Industry Barometer Hints May Show Error**

**CLEVELAND (AP)** — Agreement on a new steel labor contract without a strike would cause the steel production rate, now at a high level, to lose its value temporarily as a business barometer, Steel magazine says.

It explains that a strikeless settlement would touch off a decline in the steel production rate but that steel consumption

and business in general probably would remain high.

The metal-working weekly points out that the automobile industry, a top consumer of steel, will be producing 1966 models at a high rate and that the construction industry, another big steel consumer, is having its biggest year ever.

"Much of the steel necessary for consumption would come out of the record high inventories that metal-working companies have built up as a strike hedge," Steel says.

## Italians Get New Budget

**ROME (Reuters)** — The Italian government Saturday presented its 1966 budget with a 7.5 per cent increased deficit and warned that the country's five-year plan could be in danger if government spending rises even more.

The budget, for the calendar year from January to December, forecast a deficit of about \$1,485,000,000. That compared with the current year's deficit of about \$1,095,000,000.

Cabinet ministers said government expenditures rose because of increased payments for social services, salaries, awards to civil servants and maturing of treasury bonds.

Budget Minister Giovanni Pieraccini, a socialist, said the budget expenditure exceeded the forecasts in the five-year plan due to come into force next year.

"If this tendency continues, we will end by compromising the vast program of social development and of investments which we intend to complete in the next five years," he warned.

Both houses of parliament must debate and approve the budget by the end of the year.

## Indonesia Has Russian-Built Missile-Craft

**SINGAPORE (AP)** — Indonesia has 12 Soviet-built gunboats armed with guided missiles of 15-mile range capable of carrying nuclear warheads, military authorities in this Malaysian state said here.

It is beyond the bounds of reason to believe the Russians would supply the Indonesians with atomic warheads," one source said. Even with conventional warheads, the missiles could destroy Singapore, the informants asserted.
