Decline Shown in June Shipments

The Canadian National Railway's Atlantic Division, report on the movement of freight both to and from the Province through Borden shows a decline in movements in both directions during the month of June. In the exports to the mainland a total of 864 cars were shipped as compared to 690 in the same month last year. For the import figures 1422 cars were landed at Borden as compared to 1470 for the same period a year ago.

Despite the decline in exports, some commodities showed an increase such, 1955 in brackets, meats 25 (21); turnips 31 (7); fish 7 (1); roughwood 35 (24); lumber 8 (5); scrap iron 22 (8) and livestock 85 (84). While those items which declined were, less carload lots 52 (71); eggs 4 (13); potatoes 343 (409) and more 0 (3).

Damage From Beetle Larvae Reported

Colorado potato beetle larvae or grubs are now present in many fields and some damage has been reported, states the Weekly Potato Bulletin issued by the Science Service Laboratory. Flea beetle populations have dropped and they should not be troublesome until the next brood appears early in August. Aphids are beginning to appear on potatoes and large populations may build up rapidly if the weather should become dry and warm during the next few weeks. DDT will control potato beetles and flea beetles, but malathion should be used for aphids.

Oil Ship Here To Load Gasoline

The Irving Oil ship, "Seekonk", Captain G. Burnham, arrived at her berth at the railway wharf yesterday morning. The ship is in port to load gasoline for Pictou and New Glasgow, and should be ready to sail this morning at 10 a.m. She will make two more trips this week, one to the Magdalen Islands and the other to Shipigan, N.B.

Mr. William Connolly, local manager of Irving Oil, announced last night that the 18,400 ton tanker Captain Otto Ottman, is scheduled to arrive in the harbour Sunday night from Aruba, Dutch West Indies. The ship will anchor at Three Tides until Monday morning, when she will move to her berth at the Railway wharf.

14-Year-Old Blamed In Boy's Death

EEED TAOI HRDI FWYP MONTREAL, CP—A 14-year-old Montreal North boy was found criminally responsible Tuesday for the June 8 concrete block slaying of Robert Jones, 9.

The verdict by a coroner's jury sent the lad and his father into uncontrollable sobbing. "I don't understand What does it mean?" asked the father, pressing his face against his son's. The father had been detained briefly by police during the investigation.

A scheduled appearance by the boy in juvenile court later Tuesday was postponed and police said he now may appear today. Bobby Jones' battered body was discovered a last month not far from his Montreal North home, which he left in the evening to attend a carnival against orders of his parents.

ASKED FOR QUARTER—The juvenile held responsible for his slaying was not identified in accordance with Quebec law. This states that persons up to 18 years of age may be identified in criminal cases only after being charged in criminal court.

Detective-Sergeant Jules Arsenault of the provincial police told the inquest: "He (the juvenile) told me the Jones boy requested a quarter and, when refused, became abusive."

TITO VETOES EAST GERMANY

BONN (AP)—The West German government said Monday President Tito of Yugoslavia has given assurances his government will not recognize Communist East Germany. Tito gave this pledge to Karl Georg Pfleiderer, the West German ambassador in Belgrade, the announcement said.

Potato Board Activities For Past Season Are Reviewed

"Financial statements (published elsewhere in this issue) and reports of the chairman, the manager, and the secretary, to the Potato Marketing Board, constitute a review of the board's work in the past marketing season, when presented at the closing meeting," said Mr. E. W. Campbell last evening.

"Foremost, was the subject of Canadian-U.S. potato tariff negotiations, for which hearings were held in Ottawa last June with a further review in February. While nothing definite has yet materialized from these hearings, an announcement by Federal officials of some relief is expected soon.

In addition to exploring all possible means of assistance for the Island growers, including foreign outlets for potatoes during the grim early part of the past marketing season, the Board supported the New Brunswick Growers' bid for a diversion program to starch and feed, feeling that any diversion of New Brunswick stocks would benefit Island growers indirectly. Such a program—paying \$1.00 per barrel for spot-graded stock of Canada No. 1 grade—was approved by the Agricultural Prices Support Board, but was not used to any great extent since market prices rose above this value almost before approval was given.

Three supplementary agreements have been made with the C. N. R., under the Agreed Charge Agreement, and the Board actively supported the Summerside Board of Trade in its successful efforts to forestall removal of the tri-weekly freight rate to and from western Prince County.

The sum of \$2,000.00 was contributed to the Potato Industry Promotion Committee for disease control purposes. Full membership has been taken out in The Canadian Horticultural Council. Advertising of both seed and table potatoes—Island Brand—has been carried on, as extensively as financial resources would permit. Growers were advised through the press of current market prices.

During the past season, funds for operation of the Board have been derived from a voluntarily paid fee (1 cent per 100 lbs. of potatoes exported) from 94 per cent of the dealers, and a license fee from the remaining 6 per cent who have so far declined to cooperate with the majority by paying on that basis. This estimated general co-operation by the Island dealers has permitted the Board to discard, as a source of support, the unpopular growers license fees. Since the failure of some dealers to go along with the 1/2 cent per hundred-weight idea was a result of scepticism that it would be generally embraced, it is hoped that the percentage of dissenters will yet decrease.

Appreciation was expressed of the spontaneous assistance given by the Minister and Deputy Minister of Agriculture, also by the Seed Certification Branch, and the Inspection Department. The proclamation of the new marketing act and the temporary plan for potatoes which responded to the B.C. J. was made on June 28th. At a subsequent meeting, Mr. W. A. MacLennan was elected chairman, Mr. E. W. Campbell as manager and Miss Margaret Macmillan as secretary.
