Nan also has a daughter who has produced in 8 months about 12,000 pounds of milk, milking up to 88 pounds a day as a five-year-old, has had six tests with an average of 3.8 per cent.

The selling tables are also moveable and are 5 feet in length and the top is just wide enough for a customer to reach from one side to the other, without having to walk around the counter. The counter is in itself a storage bin with aqua-colored masonite with finger pulls, having done away with the old fashioned type of knobs and handles. Blonde birch is used throughout the store's many selling units.

The store is divided into levels, rather than floors. The lower level features a lime green tone floor, coral hued walls with a wide color band concealing the lighting fixtures. A 23-stool snack bar is to be found on this level plus hardware, household goods and some fabrics.
