pend \$15,000,000 between 1968 and 1970 in addition to its North Vancouver facilities.

This includes a berth for ships up to 40,000 tons and 750 feet in length; a third bulk loading pier with loading capacity of 4,500 tons an hour; an increase in covered storage space for potash to 315,000 tons; and a bulk receiving facility for phosphate rock.

The Sault Ste. Marie Wheel Pool is spending \$16,000,000 on a new 5,000,000 bushel grain elevator and deepsea berth on the north shore.

The National Harbors Board also has long range plans for development of a deep sea terminal on the North Vancouver side of the harbor.

In addition, the Canadian Pacific Railways, largest private holder of Vancouver harbor property, has a large-scale, but still unannounced, plan for development of its 40-year-old facilities.

Much of the proposed expenditure on harbor facilities results from the enormous increase in recent years of shipment through Vancouver of such bulk commodities as potash, sulphur, coal and concentrates.

Penitentiaries Commissioner Is Critical

MONTREAL (CP) — Penitentiaries Commissioner A. J. MacLeod said here Tuesday that before passing sentence criminal court judges should receive "advice and assistance" from psychiatrists, psychologists, sociologists and penologists.

He told the National Association of Municipal Judges that one of the main criticisms levelled against the judiciary is that "the judge tends too much to work in isolation in determining what sentence to impose."

Mr. MacLeod said penologists have become critical of judges for the following reasons:  
 1. It is "specious and unrealistic" to sentence a man to prison to learn a trade, for "treatment" or "to set an example to others."  
 2. Many sentences are imposed where the judge knows little more than the circumstances of the current offence and the convicted person's criminal record, without having the professional opinions of psychiatrists and psychologists.

3. A judge isn't likely to know very much about the institution in which he proposes to confine the prisoner, either in terms of its staff or facilities.  
 4. Sentencing policy and practice vary from judge to judge in dealing with the same type of offence.  
 5. The judge is reluctant to regard himself as a vital cog in the correction process, and he fails to realize that his sentence is the "starting point" for the program of correctional training for the offender.

Mr. MacLeod said sentences must have appropriate regard to the fundamental objective of reforming the offender and rehabilitating him in free society.

Millions Are Being Spent To Improve Vancouver Port

VANCOUVER (CP) — Millions and millions are being spent on a major face-lifting of the port of Vancouver, already generally considered one of the finest natural harbors in the world.

Up to now more than \$80,000,000 in public and private funds have been committed for development of facilities along the port's 20-mile miles of frontage.

Before its over the harbor will have not only more up-to-date dockage facilities for all types of cargoes, but probably a new bridge across its broad expanse or a tunnel—perhaps two—dug under its depths.

Engineers and port officials are arguing the relative merits of deepening the harbor entrance under First Narrows, already spanned by the provincially-owned, three-lane Lions Gate bridge between the city and the north shore.

The government is planning for another bridge—or possibly a tunnel on a federal-provincial-municipal cost-sharing basis. The Canadian National Railway plans a \$25,000,000 bridge and tunnel for a package span across the harbor.

ENTRY SAID SHALLOW — Two engineering experts recently said the present minimum depth of 40 feet at the arbor entrance is too shallow for large cargo ships now under construction. They recommended that the harbor entrance should be deepened to 55 feet and facilities should be built to handle giant ships.

However, others close to the port's actual day-to-day operations say no such improvements are needed.

"Of course there are huge bulk carriers too large to take a full load in Vancouver harbor," said Capt. B. D. L. Johnson, the port manager.

"But they are built for specific trades and wouldn't be routed here anyway. It would be absurd to dredge out all the harbors of the world just to handle one or two huge carriers."

Norman Bowen, executive secretary of the port development committee, said the port is keeping up with technological changes through studies of the harbor, its facilities and future.
