### Local and Other items.

**RELIEF FOR WEST INDIES.**—The grant to be made by the British Government to the West Indies to repair the ravages of the hurricane is understood to be \$200,000. Canada it will be remembered, gave \$25,000.

**HEAVY PORKERS.**—Richard Hand brought to the Woodstock market on Tuesday, three hogs, a venture months old, whose weight aggregated 1295 lbs. the heaviest one tipping the scale at 610 lbs. — Woodstock Sentinel.

**PARIS AND THE PORTE.**—The Parisian newspapers have been disrespectfully assailing the Sublime Porte for its non-payment of the indemnity claims of Russia for the war of 1877. Consequently the police at Constantinople have formed a line-around the French post offices, and every Paris newspaper is confiscated.

**TURF WINNINGS.**—The list of winnings of race horse owners this season places Baron Rothschild first, with £30,017; C D Ross third, with £16,282; Pierre Lorillard seventh, with £8,696; Lord William Beresford tenth, with £8,020, and the Prince of Wales fourteenth, with £9,347, which is a big drop from 1-95, when he won £36,819.

**ADVANCE IN PRICES.**—According to an exchange finest Canadian creamery butter has advanced 4 to 5s per cwt in London, and sold last week at 102 to 107s, with fancy parcel 108 to 110s. In Liverpool the market was up 2- at 98 to 104s. The cheese market in London was strong and advancing. Eggs were very firm and in active demand.

**A CHANGE ADVOCATED.**—An English journal advocates as a needed innovation that the employment of automobile funeral cars, insisting that the display of black horses, plumes and other phylacteries of unreasoning mourning is but the survival of the antiquated and barbarous custom of slaying horses at the grave of their owner.

**NOVA SCOTIA COAL AREAS.**—The coal areas of Nova Scotia cover about 635 square miles. They are divided into the Cape Breton, the Pictou and the Cumberland basins. The coal areas of Canada are estimated at 97,000 square miles, not including areas known but as yet undeveloped, in the far north. Last year Canada imported 1,575,395 tons of free anthracite coal valued at \$5,695,160.

**CAN'T FIND ANDREE.**—An Andree expedition—to find and rescue that daring Polar ballonist—has reached the mouth of the Yenisei River, in Easter Siberia. The expedition has had hard luck. It was wrecked while crossing the delta of the River Lena, and was ice-bound on an island for seventeen days. They were glad to get back on the mainland even without Andree.

**A PAPER HOUSE.**—A large paper house with 16 rooms has been erected by a Russian upon his country estate at Savinowka, Pedolia. The house was constructed in New York by an American engineer. Its architect declares that it will last longer than a stone building. To make the triumph of paper still more emphatic, the proprietor has resolved that the whole of the furniture shall be made of the same material.

**A MONTREAL MURDER.**—Two months ago Helen Ravel, of Montreal, refused to marry Pierre Lauson, a young man of 23. Instead she gave her heart and hand to Adelard Ritchot. Lauson vowed that he would kill his rival's bride on sight. He kept his word. Last Saturday afternoon he met Mrs. Ritchot on St. James street. Grasping her by the wrist he held a revolver to her forehead and discharged it. The woman fell and Lauson started to run up Mountain street with a number of men in pursuit. Seeing his pursuers gain on him, Lauson stopped and put a bullet through his brain. Both were removed to the general hospital, where Mrs Ritchot subsequently died. Lauson died two hours later.

**LOSS OF THE PORTLAND.**—The Portland Press places the whole responsibility for the loss of the steamer Portland on the captain of that vessel. No doubt he was to blame for disregarding the orders or suggestions of the manager of the line, but if he had survived the wreck he might have claimed that long familiarity with the coast, along which he was sailing, had caused him to feel a degree of contempt for its dangers. The class of steamers of which the Portland was one, are very comfortable and convenient and usually quite safe, but they are not fit to face a hurricane, a fact which their captains sometimes seem to forget. Captain Blanchard lost his own life and drowned 150 or more persons because he miscalculated the ability of his vessel and the character of the storm he had to face. —St John Telegraph
