Large Attendance At Orange Tea Yesterday

Several thousand persons gathered under sunny skies at North River yesterday for the annual Orange Tea, which featured the Orange parade, several speeches by officers of the Order, athletic events, and a continuous serving of meals in the North River rink. Apostolic Delegate To Arrive Here On Monday

The Apostolic Delegate to Canada, Most Rev. Giovanni Panico, will visit the Diocese of Charlottetown from July 15th to July 19th inclusive.

Accompanying the 62-year-old Prelate on his current tour of the Atlantic Provinces is Very Rev. P. Laframboise, O.M.E. of Quebec, Provincial of the Oblate Order. The distinguished Roman Catholic Archbishop will arrive in Charlottetown, Monday by plane and will be met at the Airport by the Knights of Columbus.

On Tuesday morning following a Mass for the children at 8:00 a.m. he will visit the Monastery of the Precious Blood. In the afternoon he will visit Lieutenant Governor Prowse, Premier Matheson and Mayor Stewart. In the evening at 7:30 a Liturgical reception will be held at the Basilica where His Excellency Bishop MacEachern will welcome the distinguished visitor and an address of welcome by the laity will be given.

On Wednesday Archbishop Panico will visit St. Dunstan's University where he will have dinner with the clergy of the Diocese at noon. At 4 o'clock a reception will be held at the Bishop's residence and at 6 o'clock he will visit Mount St. Mary's.

On Thursday he will visit St. Paul's Parish at Summerside and also other parishes in the area and in the evening he will call at the Charlottetown Hospital.

Notre Dame Academy will be visited on Friday morning and in the afternoon Archbishop Panico will visit St. Mary's parish at Souris.

On Saturday he will leave for New Brunswick by plane.

Construction Of P. E. I. Hospital Wing Delayed

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Edward Island Hospital Board of Trustees was held on the 9th instant with the Chairman, Dr. J. W. MacKenzie, presiding. Routine reports from the standing committees were received and dealt with.

The Board was advised that due to unforeseen circumstances arising since the financial campaign commencement of work on the proposed new wing had been considerably delayed. Chief among these was the announced entry of the Province into the National Hospital Insurance scheme which will call for greatly expanded patient bed space. This necessitates a drastic revision of the building plans and to that end the Architect is being brought down from Toronto in a few weeks time for consultation and completion of the revised plans.

The hope was expressed that as the necessary additional construction will add considerably to the original anticipated cost all pledges will be honoured when due so that construction may be started with as little further delay as possible.

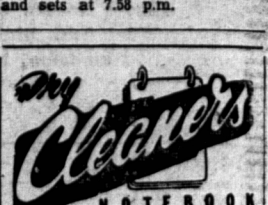

NOTEBOOK BY: P. R. McCORMAC

We were ordering a new piece of equipment for the plant the other day, and that gave me an idea for this column.

For I began to wonder whether it might not be useful for me to remind some of my readers about how to care for their home laundry equipment.

If your washer is stored in a cold place, let it stand with the hot water in it for a few minutes on wash day before you start up the motor. Warming up the washer in this way will help soften the grease in the gear case, making for smoother operation.

Avoid overloading the machine, and if at any time you notice that the tub contains more than a moderate amount of clothes, stop the machine and remove some. Always take time to rinse off all wet parts of the washer when you're through the day's wash. This is important, for it will add years of life to the washer. When you're through rinsing it off, wipe it dry with a clean cloth.

The wringer, if you have one, needs gentle care too. You should avoid bunching clothes into it or allowing sharp sharp objects to cut the rubber. Always release the pressure when you're through wringing the clothes, and wipe all parts clean and dry.

And don't forget, either, to see that the machine is lubricated at reasonable intervals. Those are all simple little tasks, really, but take it from a man who must supervise the use and care of thousands of dollars worth of cleaning equipment.

There's no substitute for consistent, conscientious care. That's just as true of laundry equipment as of your clothes themselves.
