Sport Echoes From Prince County

In the last league games Peter DesRoches of the Rovers scored the high single, 332. Allie Harris of the Curran & Briggs team had a high three of 692, and it certainly isn't the first time Allie has ever achieved that distinction. Though the Curran & Briggs team is fairly low in the standing, it looks as if they will be fighting for the top bracket before long. They were skating like fiends and handing out some stiff checks but little sign of ill-feeling arose during the twenty minutes. Of course goals scored with a team short-handed is different, and shouldn't, perhaps, be chalked up against the defending players. But goals scored when teams are playing on even footing might be recorded in this new summary. No doubt the coaches watch all these things and govern themselves accordingly. But it would be interesting to the ordinary hockey fan to see our own statistics.

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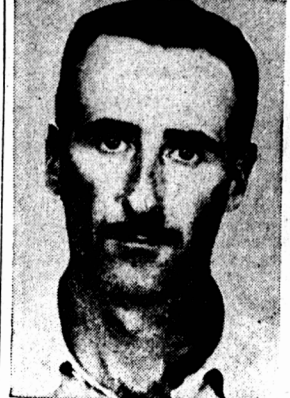
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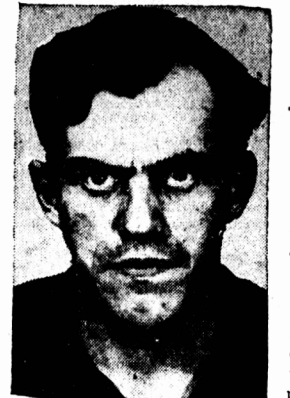
Three Flee Toronto Jail In Daring Break

Remembrance Day Address At Rotary

With the solemnity befitting the occasion, an empty chair draped with the red white and blue, and on which hung a steel helmet, occupied the most prominent position at the Remembrance Day dinner at the Miscouche Canadian Legion Memorial Home last evening.

In this setting, and with the Union Jack as a backdrop behind the tables well laden with food, a full roll call of the Legion members, their ladies, and many interested guests met in an annual dinner of remembrance in honor of those who died in defence of their country.

Chairman and toast master of the evening was Comrade W. A. Kincaid. "God Save The King" was followed by the silence for the fallen comrades.

Grace by Rev. J. D. Kelly was followed by a most delicious turkey dinner.

Hon. Mr. Bernard very movingly recalled the lines of Colonel MacRae's epic poem, "In Flanders Fields" and stated that we could not forget those touching lines, or our obligation to remember on such an occasion we also honour those who also were there, and who took part, but whom God spared to return to their homes and loved ones.-S.

peace," he said firmly. "Yet our proposals are laughed to scorn. I must admit that I do not understand or accept such methods.

"Peace can only rest on mutual forbearance and restraint. Should we not then do much better to proclaim a truce to name calling and angry words? Could we not instead apply our minds dispassionately to serious problems? I am sure that we should: Shall we try from now on? Mr. President, that will be my wish."

A rolling burst of applause from the crowded thamber greeted his pledge. Eden called for the Russians to sign a treaty with Austria, help rebuild Korea, agree to a commission to determine whether elections can be held in all of Germany, and to admit Italy and other countries to the U.N., in particular Ceylon.
