### Cook's Corner

#### ORANGE LAYER CAKE

1/3 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
2/3 cup milk  
1 1/4 cups flour  
3 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. vanilla extract

Cream shortening, add sugar and egg yolks; mix well and add half the milk; add half the flour which has been sifted with baking powder; mix in flavoring, milk and remainder of flour. Bake in two greased layer cake tins in moderate oven 20 minutes.

#### ORANGE FILLING AND ICING

Whites of 2 eggs  
1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar  
Rind and soft pulp of 1 orange  
Whip eggs to stiff froth; add sugar, a little at a time, until stiff enough to spread. Whip in pulp and rind of orange. Orange coloring may be added if desired.

Apple Orange Cake: Drain 2 1/2 c. (1 can) sliced apples. Melt 1/4 c. butter in a 7" x 11" pan. Cover with 1 c. light brown sugar mixed with 1/4 tsp. cinnamon. On this, arrange the apples in rows.

Make up 1 package yellow cake mix, substituting orange juice for the liquid designated. Add 2 tsb. grated orange rind. Pour the batter, over the apples. Bake 40 min. in a moderate oven, 375 degrees F. Cool 10 min. Turn upside down on a platter or tray.

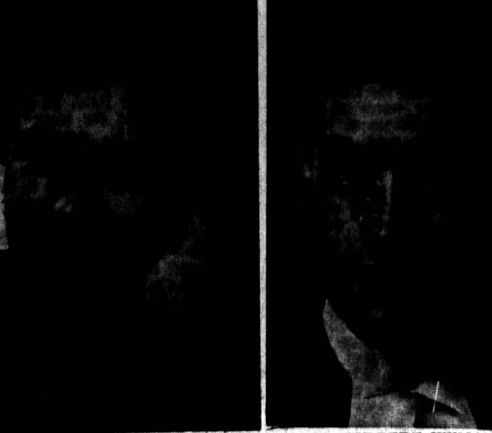
Serve hot or cold with whipped cream dusted with cinnamon. Makes 12 servings.
