THE steamer *Princess of Wales* arrived from Pictou yesterday evening at 7 o'clock, with a large quantity of freight and a number of passengers. The Captain reports Pictou harbor clear of ice, but as yet there has been no arrivals from sea.

WE would call the attention of the city authorities to the very dangerous state of the sidewalk, between Beale's Corner and Knight's Bakery, on Great George Street. GENTLEMEN,—I thank you sincerely for the very flattering address with which you have presented me. It was received as unexpectedly as it was welcome. I do not consider that I fully deserve the encomiums you are pleased to lavish upon me. When the Government of this Province detailed me for service at Alberton I went unhesitatingly, determined, by God's help, to use every effort to eradicate from your midst the prevailing epidemic of small-pox. In accomplishing this, I wish to bear testimony to the very valuable assistance rendered me by the Alberton Board of Health.

I did nothing more than was my duty under the circumstances. In this I can assure you I was actuated more by a love of my profession than for pecuniary gain. I congratulate you that once more the fair little village of Alberton is free from a disease which so thoroughly paralysed, for a long time, the business of the place, and excited so much commotion through the Province, especially amongst the members of the Tignish Board of Health.

Thanking you again for the kind wishes proffered Mrs. Brine, myself and family, also for the attention shown me during my sojourn amongst the good folk of Alberton.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CAPTURE OF SEALS.

Souris, April 26.

The Schr. *Campbell*, 25 tons register, of Magdalen Islands, brought in 600 Seals from North Cape on Wednesday morning. Her crew killed 300 on North Side on Monday; but the wind shifted and they lost these. The people at Naufrage yesterday killed 300. Seals came ashore on ice to the number of four thousand.

Ottawa and Foreign News.

OTTAWA, April 25.

It is expected that the new Insolvent Bill will come up for discussion in the House on Tuesday next.

Dr. Bergin has given notice of a Bill to regulate the employment of young children and young women in mills and factories.

The new weights and measures Act, introduced in the House yesterday afternoon, contains a number of changes in regard to the standards; but the principal provisions are doing away with the deputy inspectors. In addition to the power of appointment of Provincial inspectors, given before, power is given to appoint assistants; also, the inspectors may appoint inspectors of districts from time to time, as found necessary. Officers of the Inland Revenue Department may also be appointed district inspectors, and shall discharge the duties of their office in conjunction with it, in addition to their regular work.

Several changes are made in regard to the penalties to be imposed. The penalty for having false or unjust weights and measures, or for fraud in the use of false weights, shall be a fine not exceeding 25 dollars; in case of a second offence, 50 dollars.

LONDON, April 26.

In the Commons to-day, Sir Stafford Northcote said that the Government is considering the advisability of issuing a proclamation of neutrality in the South American war.

PARIS, April 25.

The correspondent of the *Telegraph* says: "I have been informed of the names of the French and English war vessels ordered to be ready for Alexandria at a moment's notice. It seems therefore intended to back up the forthcoming Diplomatic Note."
