Nursing School Preparing For National Accreditation

For the past two weeks nursing instructors from the four schools of nursing have been attending an Institute for Instructors in Nursing at the University of New Brunswick. Those in attendance were, from The Prince County Hospital, Miss Helen Ralph, R.N.; from the Charlottetown Hospital, Sister Marie Monice, R.N., B.Sc., and Sister Mary Patricia, R.N.; from the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Miss Janet Ives, R.N. and Miss Vera Dewar, R.N.; from the Riversdale Hospital, Miss Katherine MacLennan, R.N., B.Sc. The institute was concerned with preparation of nursing schools for accreditation by a national accrediting body. Integration of nursing arts in the basic nursing education program and a consideration of the importance of correct posture of the nurse as she care for the patient. Miss Katherine MacLennan, R.N., M.S., director of nursing, University of New Brunswick School of Nursing, chaired the sessions which were conducted by Miss Helen Mustallem, R.N., M.A., director of the pilot project for evaluation of Canadian nursing schools; Mrs. Blanche Duncanson, R.N., M.A., regional visitor for the pilot project and Miss Bessie Seaman, R.N., B.A., director, Victorian Order of Nurses for New Brunswick.

The first film depicted the work and problems of a fire inspector and plainly showed that many fires are caused by carelessness and negligence and could be avoided if common sense was used and reasonable precautions taken. The second was a scenic film showing the beauties of nature in the Bay area. Home made candy was sold by the members of the Brooklyn W.I. The president thanked all who had contributed in any way to the success of the convention.

CLASH LOOMS

Convent May Close Unless S'side School Board Acts

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — St. Mary's Convent with an enrollment of 758 students will voluntarily close its doors here at the end of the present school term unless the Summerside Public School Board assumes part of the costs. The board operates the two public schools, the elementary school and the high school. Both the chairman of the recently formed board of commissioners representing St. Mary's Academy, Dr. Hubert McNeill, and the chairman of the Summerside Public School Board, D. O. Stewart, Q.C., yesterday declined to make any comment. Unofficially, however, it was reported that the commissioners of St. Mary's school had asked that salaries of their teachers be paid by the Summerside Public School Board in accordance with their teaching qualifications, while the church-owned school property would be made available for rental to the Summerside board at a nominal rental of \$1 per year for each classroom, with the public school board also assuming the maintenance of the classrooms including heat and light. It is reported that due to parish financial commitments, failure of the school board to accept the proposal of the St. Mary's Commissioners would result in a closing down of the convent school. This would be followed by the application of \$4 more than 700 students for attendance at the public schools, which are already operating almost at capacity. Expansion of school facilities is already under consideration to meet the increased attendance expected from the occupation of the Hillcrest housing development. The public school board reportedly has rejected the proposal for payment of their teachers. At the same time the board is said to interpret the school act as preventing a separate school from making its pupils a responsibility of the public schools for at least a year if the step is taken without the agreement of the school board. Enrollment at St. Mary's School presently includes 257 boys from grades one to four inclusive, and 501 girls from grades 1 to ten inclusive. Sunday following each church service at St. Paul's Roman Catholic church in Summerside, a meeting of paritomers was held in the church basement to acquaint the attending public with the steps that have been taken by the commissioners and their future intentions in regard to the school matter. Names of the commissioners of St. Mary's school could not be learned officially yesterday but it is understood that the chairman is Dr. Hubert McNeill, and that Henry Wedge is also a member of the commissioners. Members of the Summerside public school board are D. O. Stewart, chairman, T. Earl Hickey, Dr. J. A. Deiron, Dr. Roy Grant, Harry Holman, Alex. Horne and Judge W. E. Darby.
