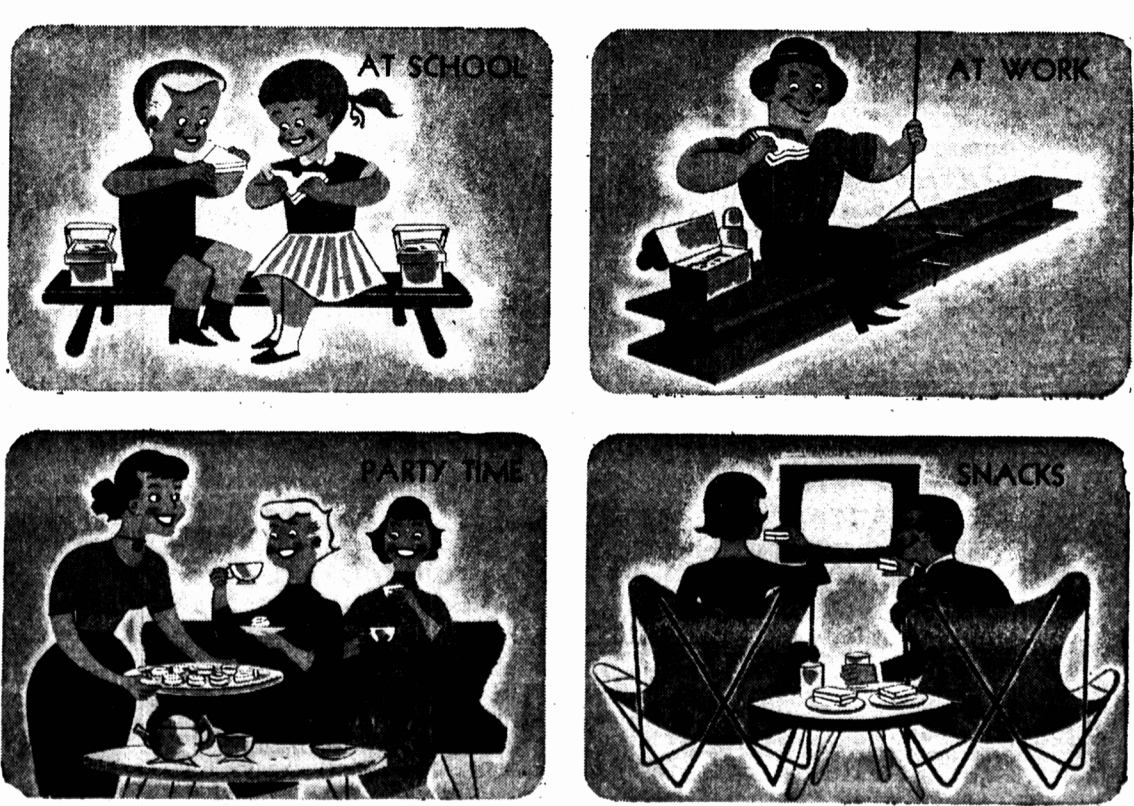
VOTE FOR MERGER

PONDICHER, French India (AP)—Legislators from France's Indian settlements, meeting near here to decide the future of the scattered territory, voted 170 to eight Monday for merger with India. The ballot, held in accordance with an Indian-French agreement of Oct. 13, climaxed seven years of Indian agitation to take over the 196 square miles of territory. The result of the vote will now go before the Indian and French Parliaments for ratification.

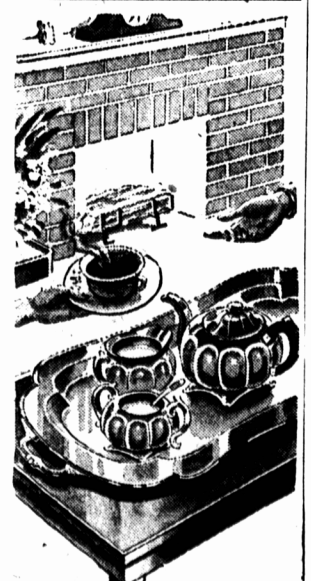
