

# Red Wings Back To Work In Preparation For Finals

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Red Wings went back to work Thursday in preparation for the opening of the Stanley Cup playoff final in Montreal Sunday afternoon but were not happy with the condition of their home ice.

The Red Wings skated for about an hour on somewhat soft ice and some of the players asked jokingly why they had to work in a swimming pool.

Detroit officials explained that new heating and air conditioning equipment was being tested, especially the latter, and that someone had failed to consider the effect it might have on the ice.

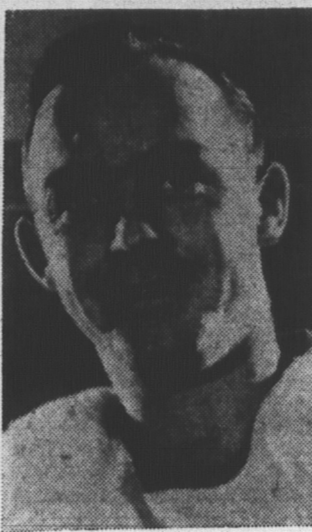
Manager-coach Sid Abel, who arrived after the team had been on the ice for some 20 minutes, took no chances with goalie Roger Crozier.

Abel instructed Crozier to use a face mask to protect him from any deflected shots during the practice.

Crozier does not like to wear the mask during a game, but has used it in practice before. Abel said he planned to make a few changes for the series beginning.

## HUNTER'S CORNER

### Eight Day Old Season Disappoints Some Anglers

The trout fishing season will be eight days old when this column appears in print. It has been a 'contradictory' sort of opening season to date. The majority of trout fishermen have had very mediocre luck so far while others have really hit the 'jack pot'. There appears to be no happy in-between. Some have to be content with one, or two, for hours of casting with a few hitting the big time. The in-between boys have nothing to remind them of their outings but a sore arm and a caloused right hand palm.

The picture in Tuesday's Guardian has really started tongue wagging. I was told by trout fishermen who viewed the box the trout were carried in that after the thirty odd big fellows were removed for the picture they scarcely made a dint in the catch there were twice as many smaller fry left. One keen trout counter estimated between ninety and one hundred in the box when it was viewed before the heavyweights were removed. Another reported to me that he watched another member of the same tribe at Larkin's Dam, Selkirk, moving up towards the Railway Bridge with four fishing poles... three heavy bamboo and one casting rod... in his boat. He was all alone and when he was reminded the law allowed only one rod per person and it held in the hand, laughed heartily as if it was the 'joke of the season'. He wasn't too sure but it looked like three rods with holders attached to the sides of the boat.

#### LETTER READ

I read with interest the letter in the Public Forum of The Guardian in yesterday's Guardian. There was one paragraph that sort of intrigued me. Apart from this paragraph the writer hit the nail square on the head in some of his remarks but was off the beam on others. Quote "Now Mr. Farmer, if you had to buy a hunting license, you would be taxed the same amount as the city dweller who does not own one foot of wildlife habitat, and also the same as the man, not a bonafide farmer, who owns or leases hundreds of acres of land or water and allows only himself or his friends to hunt on said property. These same people expect the same privilege of hunting upland game and geese on your land which you so generously left open to the public" unquote.

In 1952 I purchased the old Mount Fur Company holdings. I didn't get it for penny ante money... the four thousand and fifty acre property topped the two thousand dollar figure. I con-

structed six dams on that property over the years and they were designed for both trout and were bulldozed out of the dam bed to make favourable habitat for trout before the water was backed up. Causeways and car roads were built. And... all this was done with my own hard-earned money. Not one red cent was accepted from any source. The first year it was left open to the public and they sure took it over. Locks were shot off boats and the 'general public' helped themselves. My partner and I have gone back for a spot of trout fishing and fishermen using our boat had to be coaxed ashore.

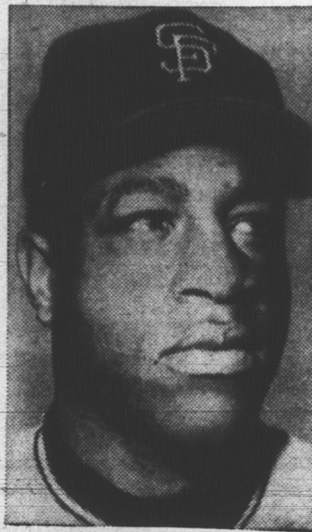
So the lid was clamped on tight... so tight that anyone found trespassing thereon is taken to Court pronto. It's open to people who know how to conduct themselves. So far as hunting on private property I was out once only this past fall and it was by invitation. The lady who owned the field wherein we hunted was given a goose for thoughtfulness and co-operation. We never fired a shot on this property last year... except one at a Gishawk that was taking Ruffed grouse and black ducks. Among my good friends who have enjoyed trout fishing on this property were Dr. Sydney Bonnell and Rev. Billy Graham... the world wide noted Evangelist. If I hadn't put the clamps on tight with respect to 'trespassing' it would be as barren of any form of wildlife, including trout, as the Sahara Desert. The general public forced this drastic protective action.

### San Francisco Downs Chicago

CHICAGO (AP)—A pair of two-run homers, one the 509th career blast by Willie Mays, and the 10-strikeout pitching of Juan Marichal swept San Francisco Giants to a 5-2 victory over Chicago Cubs Thursday.

Jim Hart also slammed a two-run homer off rookie Bill Hands, who was making his first start as a Cub, as the Giants ran their winning streak to five and extended the Cubs losing string to five.

Marichal recorded his third victory without defeat and his third complete game, a string that includes only one earned run.

Mays' fourth homer of the season came after Hal Lanier led off the game with a scratch single. It left Mays only two short of Mel Ott's National League record of 511 homers. Byron Browne homered for the Cubs in the ninth.
