DOWN THE BACK STRETCH



Bright sunshine and warm weather brought out a large number of spectators to see the workouts at the Charlottetown race track on the Queen's birthday. The biggest attraction appeared to be the fast record pacer Sir Joseph 1.58 1/2 that was purchased at the Harrisburg sale last fall by Roy Bevan of Charlottetown. Mr. Bevan also bought Ted Genessee, then a 2-year-old trotter, and Brookline, the yearling pacer, now two, and Joseph had taken his record in defeating a very fast field including several with records better than 2.00 at Lexington, Ky. He had engaged in battles with the best pacers in the world over half mile tracks such as Roosevelt and Yonkers and was renowned as a horse possessing terrific lick. Sir Joseph's sire is Volomite 2.03 1/2, the world's greatest sire, and his dam is Elizabeth Hudson, dam of Florence Knight 2.04 1/2 and his granddam is Elizabeth, the dam of Greyhound 1.55 1/2, the world's greatest trotter, also of four others with records better than 2.04 and granddam of one in 2.00 and 13 in 2.10.

Ted Genessee is a large well formed, good mannered 3-year-old trotter. His sire is Rodney 1.57 1/2, one of the greatest trotters that has gone down the Grand Circuit and now an outstanding sire. His grand sire on the dam's side is Hal Dale 2.02 1/2, one of the world's greatest sires of pacing speed. Ted Genessee had trained up to a mile in 2.20 last year and was then turned out by Stanley Dancer as not up to competing with the other heavy stakes colts of similar age. That Stanley told the truth about him has been proven by his recent workouts in which he has been a mile in 2.30 with the last half in better than 1.08.

Brookline is now a 2-year-old. He is by The Widower 3.15 1/2, sire of four with records better than 2.00, and very highly regarded because of the performance of his get the past two seasons. Brookline was practically unbroken when he arrived here but careful management has developed him into a good manner-

ed horse, splendidly built and showing an inclination at present to trot, in fact he looks as though he will be a good horse if left at that gait but his breeding marks him as a pacer both on his sire and on his dam's side and no doubt that is what he will eventually be.

It was fortunate for Roy that he placed these horses in the hands of Archie Llewellyn for we can conscientiously say that no man anywhere could have done better with them. Sir Joseph has manners galore. You can drive him a mile in four minutes or three minutes, horses can be all around him and he doesn't pull or show any bad habits whatever. The three horses are well up in flesh and can stand a lot of miles but they will be in the very best condition. Another member of the stable shows rejuvenation is that sweet little pacer Silk Hal 2.09 1/2. Archie also has a 3-year-old winner of the 3-year-old futurity trot last season, and the pacer Miss Commando 2.12 1/2, both owned by Dr. Preston McIntyre, Montague. Royal Train is greatly admired and there are many who would like to own him if he were for sale. He is a handsome horse, good gaited and should trot to a record close to 2.14 this season. Miss Commando is a good mannered mare that has raced well and looks to have a good season ahead of her this year. Trainer Llewellyn believes in the motto "go slow" and putting a good many miles under his charges' belts before he opens up. We believe more of the above have beaten 2.30 very much, certainly have not worked in 2.20.

Another large stable to display its wares was that of Earle Semple, Kensington, who has some 14 or 15 that he is getting ready for local racing and stake racing elsewhere. Two of them, Whispering Willow and Taurida Bay came in a trade when Dean Galton was sold. These were shown and greatly admired and both appear to be heading for 2.10 or better records this year. Whispering Willow started a few times

Yankèes Stretch League Lead To Three Full Games With 6-2 Win Over Baltimore

BALTIMORE, (AP) — A four-run outburst in the first inning plus sterling fielding gave the league-leading New York Yankees a 6-2 victory over Baltimore Friday night in the first of a three-game series.

A crowd of 21,150 saw the Bombers stretch their American League lead to three full games over Cleveland. Eddie Robinson pumped his fifth homer of the season into the short right field stands, with two mates aboard, to spark the Yankees' game-opening explosion, after Yogi Berra had driven in Hank Bauer with a sacrifice fly.

New York's Whitey Ford, won his sixth against one loss to continue his jinx over Baltimore which has been able to beat the low-head since rejoining the major leagues last season.

Irv Palica, went the distance for Baltimore.

NEW YORK (AP)—Willie Mays unloaded a home run to the opposite field with a man on base in the eighth inning Friday night as the New York Giants broke a four-game losing streak with a 3-1 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Sal Maglie was the winner, knocking off the Dodgers for the 23rd time in 33 lifetime decisions as he started to register his fifth victory of the year.

Carl Erskine, who went into the game with a 6-1 record, took the defeat, once again running into too many hard hits to win. The first inning, a grand slam in the fourth and a three-run blast in the fifth.

Not until the seventh could the Senators stop him when their fourth starter, Pedro Ramos, struck him out.

The victory was the first of the year for Brewer who had lost his previous six decisions.

The crowd of 15,775 who turned out in hopes of seeing Ted Williams in his first regular season appearance forgot about it once Zauchin unlimbered his bat.

The victory went to veteran Hermy Wehmeier, his 15th in his last 16 decisions with the cellar dwellers. It gave him a 3-2 record.

Relief pitcher Bob Friend, called upon when starter Dick Littlefield pitched a fourth-inning right side while pitching until he grooved one for Seminick in the ninth.

In the 10th Wehmeier singled, went to second on a sacrifice, Gene Gorbous was purposely passed but Roy Smalley singled, right side, and King replaced Friend and allowed run scoring singles by Del Ennis and Jones before getting the side out.

Ashburn, who went into the game as the National League's top slugger with a 400 average, got two singles in four official trips.

In the seventh Hobie Landrith opened with his third homer. Three singles and a long fly by Ray Jablonski produced another Cincinnati run and a single by Bell drove in the fourth run and sent Arroyo to the showers although he gained his fifth victory against no defeats. Lappine got Kluszewski to ground out.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Sporting News said Friday in a copyrighted story that Eddie Stanky is on his way out as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals. But the club's front office quickly denied the story.

In a story by its publisher, J.G. Taylor Spink, the weekly baseball newspaper reported the Redbirds' disappointing start had brought to a climax the discontent of fans and club officials over their failure to gain a contending position during the Stanky regime, which began in 1952.

William Walsingham Jr., a vice-president of the club, discounted the report by saying: "There has been no discussion about a change of managers. The recent losses were caused by a lack of hitting and you can't blame a manager for that."
