To Observe Centennial Of Notre Dame Academy

This year Notre Dame Academy celebrates its 100th birthday. Although yesterday, October 13, was the actual anniversary of the birthday of the institution, formal celebrations are not scheduled to begin until October 24.

Yesterday the school held minor celebrations in honor of the occasion. In the morning the students assisted at the 7 p.m. Mass with Rev. P.F. MacDonald, Chaplain for Notre Dame, as celebrant. Special programs featuring the early days of the Academy were presented in each of the classrooms, after which the pupils of this, the Centennial year class, had their picture taken as a group. In the afternoon, films were shown in the auditorium.

Following is a clipping from the October 1, 1857, edition of the "Examiner" which recalls the opening of the Academy:

NOTRE DAME CONVENT

"The Convent of the Sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame has just opened in this City, for the purpose of imparting a finished education to those young ladies whose parents and guardians may think proper to avail themselves of the advantages of such an institution. The ladies in charge of it arrived here a few weeks ago from Montreal, under the care of the zealous and excellent priest stationed at Tignish, the Rev. Peter MacIntyre; and we are informed that they bear a high reputation for learning and proficiency in all those accomplishments which form a graceful accompaniment to the moral and intellectual training of young ladies.

"Although the Convent may be considered a sectarian in its character, from its being an institution peculiar to the Catholic Church, Protestant ladies, of all shades of religious belief, are here—as in the case elsewhere—as readily admitted within its walls as the daughters of Roman Catholics, and the blessings of a finished education may be acquired without violence being done to their religious convictions; and we have no doubt that many liberal and enlightened Protestant families in this community will co-operate with their Catholic neighbours in giving encouragement to such an institution as that which has just been established in our midst, and that, ere the lapse of many years, the community generally will bear grateful testimony to the benefits which will have been conferred upon the rising generation by the accomplished ladies who have so recently taken up their abode amongst us."

Stresses Sub Is Serious Threat

TORONTO (CP)—Defence Minister Campney said Friday the submarine remains one of the most serious threats which could face the West in event of a third world war.

He was speaking at a ceremony in which he accepted the first of 100 anti-submarine planes, known as the Tracer, being built by de Havilland Aircraft Company of Toronto for the Canadian Navy.

Mr. Campney said that in two great wars the submarine has come within an ace of bringing about our defeat. The possibility of new dangers does not eliminate the old ones. The submarine remains one of the most serious threats which could face us in the event of a third war.

"The advent of atomic and thermonuclear weapons adds greatly to the potential power of destruction open to the submarine.

Sudden Death Of Ft. Augustus Man

The death occurred suddenly last evening at Charlottetown of Mr. John P. Jay of Fort Augustus in his 69th year. Mr. Jay collapsed on the sidewalk near Jenkins Pharmacy while he was on his way to see a doctor, accompanied by his wife. He is reported to have taken a weak turn and asked assistance from the driver of a New Brunswick car, but on opening the door he collapsed.

The late Mr. Jay was born at Fort Augustus, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Jay. He was twice married. Besides his sorrowing widow, he is survived by two children of his first marriage, Walter A. Jay of Southport, and Jean, Mrs. Aileen Birt of Charlottetown; and six children from his second marriage, Everett, Gordon and Wilfred at home, and Alice, Mrs. Thomas Dunn, Southport; Laura, Mrs. Eddie Arsenault, Charlottetown, and Edna, Mrs. Ira Birt, Charlottetown.

The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon at Mt. Stewart, at 2:00 o'clock.

LOBSTER HAUL

MONCTON, N. B. (CP) — Between 1,700 and 1,800 lobster fishermen of Kent and Westmorland counties shared in a lobster haul valued at \$1,157,000 in August, \$184,000 higher than the same month last year. Officials said the complete season's catch would likely be well above last year's \$1,500,000 total.

Piece Together Forgotten Years Of Vito Sala

UNITED STATES Army investigators have begun to piece together the "forgotten years" of Vito Sala, an army private from Brooklyn who disappeared during the fighting in Germany 11 years ago and then turned up during the defence of Dienbienphu as a French war hero. Claiming to have suffered from amnesia, Sala disappeared from his unit during the fighting around Halbroon, Germany, in April 1945.

Since then he served seven years with the French Foreign Legion, first in Algeria and later during the siege of Dienbienphu in Indochina three years ago.

In Dienbienphu, he so distinguished himself that he won the Croix de Guerre.

MORE OBSERVATION

That, said an American army spokesman here Friday, is about as much as anyone knows definitely about Sala, who will shortly be transferred from here to the United States army hospital in Orleans, France, for further observation.

Legion records showed that Sala according to his own report—had lived for three years as a civilian in Halbroon from 1946 to 1949 before he volunteered for the legion under the name "Angelo Turco."

The army spokesman said no charges had been filed against Sala and that he would continue to undergo examination. Sala entered the army in the United States in 1943.

Sala, said the spokesman, told investigators that his memory returned slowly after the shock of being wounded three times in the bitter Dienbienphu siege.

Alberta Revenues Hit New Record

EDMONTON (CP) — Alberta revenues hit a record \$241,608,105 during the 1955-56 fiscal year and expenditures on income account jumped to a high of \$187,028,320. The government ended the fiscal year with a net surplus of \$15,939,544.

The figures were released Friday by C. K. Huckvale, provincial auditor, in the public accounts book for the fiscal year ended March 31. He said the big reason for the increased revenue is the province's oil development.

The 1955-56 surplus left the government with an accumulative surplus of more than \$151,000,000 in negotiable cash and investments while another \$113,000,000 is tied up in the municipal loan funds.

This total is nearly three times the provincial debt, which stands at about \$91,000,000.

Death In Ch'town Of Mr. R. B. Currie

The death of Mr. Richard Brenton Currie occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Thursday evening after a short illness. The late Mr. Currie was 77 on October 8. He had taken sick late in June of this year and never fully recovered from his attack at that time, although he was only confined to the hospital for two weeks.

Mr. Currie was born in Fairview, P. E. I., one of a family of eight, two brothers and three sisters of which have predeceased him. At the age of sixteen he began teaching, and remained in that profession until 1902. In that year he moved to the United States where he became employed with Boston Elevated. During the first four years of his stay in the States he studied law at night and received an honor diploma at the end of the course.

In 1932 he moved to Providence, Rhode Island, where he became Industrial Relations manager for the United States Rubber Company. At his retirement in 1947 he returned to the Island to live with his sister in Charlottetown. During this period he was employed as a proof reader with the Guardian for more than four years.

The late Mr. Currie married Caroline Taylor of Charlottetown while in the States. Both his wife and a son Gordon predeceased him.

He is survived by his sister, Florence, Mrs. Fergus Robertson, of 58 Upper Prince, and a brother, Edward A. of Fairview.

The remains were transferred from the MacLean Funeral Home to the Home of his sister last evening, where a short service will be held on Sunday afternoon. Burial service will be conducted at New Dominion United Church.
