Carruthers, Clerk of Presbytery. Launch of the Northumberland.—The "News" of Edg., Journal of the 14th ult., says: "Messrs. Wigham, Richardson & Co. have built a finely built twin-screw steamer from their Neptune Yard, Low Walker, on Thursday. The steamer has been built for the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and is intended to run in their passenger service, for which she will be very completely fitted and finished in first-class style. She is of steel construction, and is fitted with two sets of triple expansion engines, which are also built by Messrs. Wigham Richardson & Co. and Company, and which will enable her to attain a speed of 15 knots per hour. The construction of the hull, outfit, engines, and boilers is proceeding under the supervision of Mr. Robert Anderson of Benbow, who was present at the launch. As the vessel left the ways she was named the Northumberland, the ceremony being gracefully performed by Miss Hunter." TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. ITALY AND THE STATES A DIPLOMATIC RUPTURE. LONDON, April 1. Italy, in view of the New Orleans murders, has withdrawn its Ministers from Washington. This is the greatest rupture of diplomatic relations since the days of Washington. Death of Earl Granville. LONDON, April 1. The Earl of Granville died yesterday. His Lordship had been ill and suffering for many months; and recently underwent two painful operations. (He entered Parliament in 1836 and subsequently became Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. In 1846 he succeeded to his title. He held the seals of the Foreign Office in the Russell Cabinet, 1851-52, and was afterwards Lord President of the Council. In 1868 he became Secretary of State for the Colonies and in 1870, Secretary for Foreign Affairs. He resigned with the other members of the Gladstone Cabinet in 1874 and became Leader of the Opposition in the House of Lords. Upon the fall of Lord Beaconsfield's Government in 1880, and Mr. Gladstone's accession to office, Lord Granville resumed the office of Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, retaining the position until Lord Salisbury came into power in 1885. In the last Gladstone Administration he held office as Secretary of State for the Colonies. Lord Granville was one of Mr. Gladstone's most powerful supporters since the split in the Liberal party on the Irish question. His Lordship was Chancellor of the University of London.)
