PARIS, October 2.—The will of Emile Zola was found as indicated by Mme. Zola in his bedroom, the seals of which were broken in order to obtain the document. The room was immediately sealed up again. The will was not opened until a late hour this evening, and its contents have not been made public. It is understood, however, that M. Zola left everything to his wife. He left no literary testament, and the will contains no directions as to his funeral.

The music loving people from town and country, and Summerside's Scotch went to hear something surpassing anything of the kind ever given here and it is safe to say none were disappointed even though press eulogiums during the past few weeks were stronger than the ordinary. Miss MacLachlan has been said of Jessie MacLachlan and perhaps further criticism would tend to monotony, suffice it to say that her reputation remains unshaken, and is strengthened in the opinions of our severest critics—particularly the Scotch. Perhaps "Coming thro' the Rye", "The Hundred Pipers", "Just While an' I'll come to ye,"—old Scottish favorites—gave the most pleasure, yet "Rule Britannia" was probably not excelled, and patriots were stirred to the highest pitch at her rendition of this popular selection. And while few in the audience truly understood "The Gaelic", her singing of "Me D'achaidh" was most highly appreciated by all and more than those with Scotch blood flowing in their veins. On every appearance Miss MacLachlan was encored, to which she with one or two exceptions, responded. The dramatic expression with which she characterized her songs was really superb and gave great effect. Mr. MacClackey's singing, despite the fact that he was suffering from a severe cold, was well received, as were the piano selections by Mr. Buchanan. Such a program as given by the above artists is a very rare treat for a Summerside audience, and much credit is due Mr. Whitney for having lent such effort in guaranteeing their coming.
