Consider What Disarmament Aim Should Be

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has urged its European allies to be ready to decide quickly whether an "open skies" test zone in Europe should be included in any first-stage disarmament agreement with Russia.

Harold Stassen, U.S. disarmament chief, is understood to have recommended that a high-level committee of experts be set up within the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to handle this problem.

Diplomatic officials report that Stassen suggested this move because he thinks Russia will insist that a European as well as an Arctic test zone be agreed upon in initial disarmament moves.

These backstage Western manoeuvres came to light as Stassen arranged to meet today with State Secretary Dulles. They will review a disarmament counter-proposal which the U.S. will put before the Russians within a few days.

Stassen who flew in from London Sunday, plans tentatively to return to London Wednesday to resume arms talks with Soviet, British, French and Canadian representatives.

The American plan is understood to omit any proposal for a European open skies zone even though the Russians in a proposal April 30 made clear that they favored such an area.

Mainly because of West German elections, the American strategy now appears to be to concentrate on the Arctic as a starting point until the Europeans themselves decide whether to favor a European counterpart and where it should be.

Blackfellow Artists Cash In

SYDNEY, Australia (CP)—Half-wild Aborigines of the Arunta tribe are earning cold cash through their surprising gifts of artistry.

The industry has led to some oddities. Possession of an Aboriginal painting in Australia's northern territory, for instance, can make the owner liable to six months in jail, or a fine of \$200.

To avoid this fate, he must be able to show he bought the painting from the Arunta Arts Council at a price fixed by the council and that the director of native welfare in the territory has given his permission.

The paintings causing all the fuss are not specimens of an ancient art. They are modern landscapes, usually in watercolor.

One of Australia's strangest success stories is how the Arunta tribesman, Albert Namatjira, English-speaking and educated, is unable to leave his tribal district without official permission.

Troops Arrive At Gagetown

FREDERICTON (CP) — A special Canadian National Railways train will roll into Camp Gagetown Wednesday with the first contingent of troops for the Canadian army's summer training manoeuvres at the huge base near here.
