Pea Grower Protection May Be Implemented

The regular form of government crop insurance — if federal and provincial governments along with the grower — may be made available to grower of peas, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday.

The consideration is being given because of the serious drop in production reported by growers who supply the processing plants at Montague, Sherwood and New Annan — descriptive stories were carried in this paper last week.

Peas now come under a form of insurance as there is an arrangement between the plant and the growers which pays a certain amount to the growers whose peas are "by-passed" because they do not meet the test of the "tenderometer".

This is a machine which measures the tenderness, or the hardness, of the peas. If the machine registers at more than 125 — 65 or less is ideal — the crop may be bypassed at the discretion of the processor. The top price at the Montague plant, for example, is \$115 per ton. It is \$105 per ton for peas that regis-

Dief Upsetting PC Campaign, Is Liberal Candidate's Charge

Queen's County Liberal candidate Mark MacGuigan charged at a Mt. Ryan public meeting last night that Opposition Leader John Diefenbaker had "pulled the rug out from under the Conservative campaign on the Island by admitting only a few days ago the promised \$100 pension would be given at age 70, instead of at age 65 as claimed by Island Conservatives."

"He now says," Dr. MacGuigan declared, "that the \$100 will be paid at age 69. What will he say tomorrow? Nobody knows. Not even his own party, nor his own candidates, who hear one claim one day and a completely different claim the next day."

At the same time, Dr. MacGuigan pointed out that Mr. Diefenbaker had not yet withdrawn his original statement that in any event the money to pay the earlier and higher pension would be taken from the Canada Pension Plan Fund.

"The Canada Pension Plan Fund," explained Dr. MacGuigan, "is to be built up from the savings of employees and contributions from employers and the self-employed. It is an insurance plan established out of private savings and income. No government has any right to raid this fund. It belongs exclusively to the people who contributed to it. To raid this fund in the manner Mr. Diefenbaker proposes is utterly indefensible."

developments which lie ahead."

Mr. Jones also spoke about "the many desirable aspects of Liberal policy on feed grain."

Growers Decide On Aid Formula

Representatives of growers that supply crops for Island processing plants last night came up with a formula on which a request for compensation due to a poor crop year will be presented to Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

The formula was agreed upon at a meeting of grower representatives at the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture office in Charlottetown.

The meeting declined to give details of the formula and details with Mr. MacRae which the growers hope will take place Thursday or Friday.

A growers' committee of six members — two from each processing plant area — was named to arrange a meeting with Mr. MacRae and also to discuss the matter of crop insurance for the future in these processing crops. The committee was also authorized to study and report on the possibility of a growers' organization being formed in the province.

The committee will be assisted by J.A. Rodd, president of the provincial federation of agriculture and Smith MacFarlane, a past-president of the federation.

The growers base their claim for compensation on the fact that this year was a poor growing season and crop insurance was not available for the growers.

Price Cuts On Automobiles Said Act To Deceive Public

OTTAWA (CP) — New Democratic Leader T. C. Douglas Monday night said that recent automobile price cuts represent "a patent attempt to deceive the public."

Appearing on a CBC television interview, Mr. Douglas said that automobile manufacturers are claiming a price reduction of about \$73, including \$30 worth of new safety features. He said that in the United States, these safety features are said to be worth \$22, not \$60.

On this basis, he said, the actual price reduction is \$26, not \$73.

Mr. Douglas said there is nothing in the recently-approved Canada - United States auto agreement that forces the auto manufacturers to pass on their savings to Canadian consumers.

MAKERS SAVE
Under the agreement, the manufacturers save \$50,000,000 a year in customs tariffs and, Mr. Douglas said, the price cuts announced so far fall far short of this.

Why is it, he asked, that cars built in Canada are being sold in the United States for \$350 less than they are in Canada? Either they are being "dumped," or

else Canadians are being charged \$350 too much.

Mr. Douglas also repeated demands that the federal government establish an inquiry into bankruptcy cases and their possible connection with Parliament Hill. He said the Canadian Lumbermen's Association told Prime Minister Pearson a year ago that there were indications that bankruptcy frauds were connected with contributions to campaign funds.

"After a year there has been no reply."

He said if Mr. Pearson would appoint a judge, or judges, to investigate the cases "I'll never mention the matter again."

Full Slate Named By Three Parties

A full slate of candidates for the Nov. 8 election has been nominated by the three active political parties in the province.

Nominations closed yesterday and the Progressive Conservatives, Liberals and New Democrats each has a candidate running in the four island constituencies.

In Prince County, Liberal cabinet minister J. Watson MacNaught is opposed by Progressive Conservative David MacDonald, Alberton, and New Democrat Harvey G. Dawson, Tignish.

Two seats are at stake in Queens County — those held in the last Parliament by Progressive Conservatives Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarie, both of whom nominated last week. Liberal candidates in Queens are B.B. Jones, Bunsbury and Dr. Mark MacGuigan, Charlottetown. New Democratic Party candidates are Alex MacLean, Parkside and Douglas MacFarlane, Bedouque.

A former provincial cabinet minister, Melvin MacQuaid, Souris, has nominated on the Progressive Conservative ticket in Kings County, opposing the

"Unfortunately, they fail to understand that the only way to ensure Canada's continued existence is to allow the French-speaking group to play the role in Canadian life which it is in a position to assume."

"When one proceeds in such a way as to imply there is room in Canada for only one language and one culture, our country's unity and integrity are then really placed in jeopardy."

It should never be forgotten, Mr. Lesage continued, that not only is French Canada not dying out, but that Canada will only preserve its integrity and further its growth if French-speaking Canadians have a place in it with all the responsibilities of full citizens.

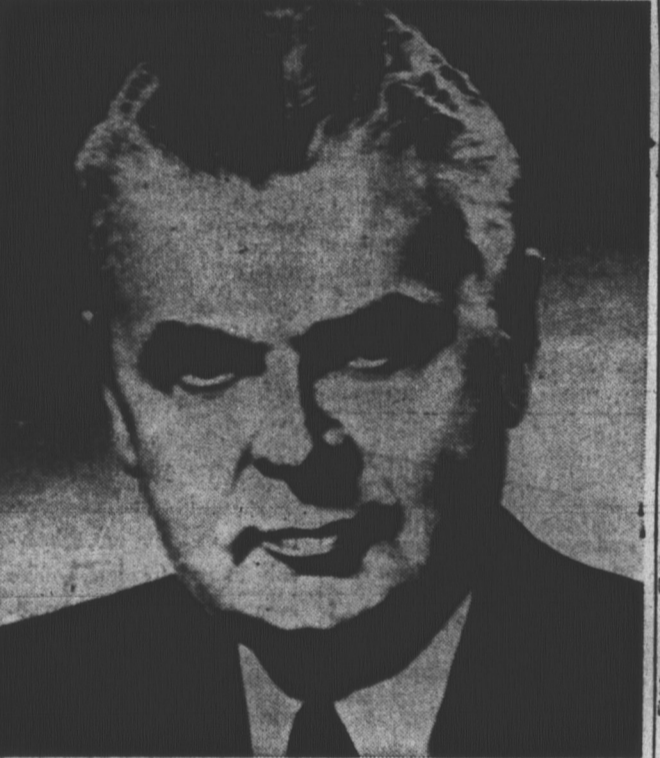
