World Series Opens Today

The curtain unveils on the 1965 World Series today with the highly regarded National League champion, Los Angeles baseball club invading the home of the Minnesota Twins in the first game of their best-of-seven world championship battle.

The Dodgers are being favored to take the American League champions, mainly on the basis of their superb pitching staff plus the fact that a lot of people consider the National League far superior to the American loop.

Bill Ledwell, author of Sport Beat in The Evening Patriot conducted a survey on local opinions in yesterday's column and of ten enthusiastic baseball fans (including the author of the column) there was only ONE that predicted he thought the American League champions had a chance of picking up all the marbles.

The Twins have a capable ball club which has been hitting, running and fielding effectively all year. We can't help but feel that the Dodgers and their numerous loyal fans may be in for a rude awakening before the curtain comes down on the annual fall classic.

Who was the lone wolf that went on the limb in Mr. Ledwell's column? It was none other than Fred (Husky) McCabe and Husky said he thinks the Twins can take the series in seven games.

Recreational activities may include: a tennis match, swimming, fishing, a nature walk or just sitting beside a shaded brook. The key to the whole thing being the use of the many facilities provided by nature.

Above everything else recreation is not a waste of time or a mere preventative of juvenile delinquency.

Jim Fox, city recreation director advocates the use of the great outdoors and when we visited his office to chat about the above subject yesterday he showed us a quote from a speech by President Lyndon B. Johnson which was as follows: "Natural beauty is more than a rich source of pleasure and recreation. It shapes our values. It molds our attitudes. It fills our spirit and it helps us to be the kind of men and women we finally become. And the kind of men we become makes this great nation." To some such a speech would be termed politics, but we think there is definitely a good deal of truth in this statement.

There is a rumor that our neighbors to the south are contemplating a 20 hour work week and this is going to provide a great deal of leisure time for them. This is not to be a gigantic problem if the youth of today isn't taught the proper use of leisure time.

This observer thinks this movement is necessary and you might say it is as big as the whole outdoors.

S'side Racing Goes Tonight

SUMMERSIDE — With the grandstand heated and made comfortable for the racing fans a large crowd is expected at Summerside Raceway tonight to witness another top-notch card consisting of five evenly matched classes.

In the first race Lola Hal, even after a dismal showing in her last start, will likely be the favorite, followed closely by Highland Spirit and Billy G. Command. Highland Spirit will go away on the rail.

The feature race brings together Amy Thorpe, Ellen Joyce, Top Way, Spurge, Chief's Gal and Paddyland Girl. The lone trotter, Topway, will likely be co-favorite with Amy Thorpe and this race, position as they come off the first turn will mean a lot. Fans can be assured with Topway out and going, a fast mile will be cut out.

The second dash of the evening sees a mixed class of trotters and pacers with a hard winner hard to pick: The three pacers, Eleanor Patch, All Jolity and Royal Hi Direct, will have to show mid season form to head the trotters to the wire.

Home stretch and Rollomatic, in positions 1 and 7, will likely be the favorites but Susan's Birthday and Drillo Hal can't be overlooked.

The fourth double dash of the night could take the play away from the feature race with seven entries vying for honors. Again post positions mean a lot with Lucky V and Ripover in the one and seven hole, Blue Mountain Girl, Sunny Key, Knight Norris, Miss Flamingo and Chesterway Thomas will have to go all out to head them to the wire.

The ninth and final dash will have starters including Victory March, Lorna Price, Mighty Sandy, Jolly Lass, Haless Abb, Gary Lee Clegg, Honest Patch and Name The Price.

With a heated grandstand and an all weather track along with a better than average field of horses a good evening of racing can be expected at the local oval.

Quebec Aces Sign Bauman

QUEBEC (CP) — Goaltender Garry Bauman signed a contract with Quebec Aces of the American Hockey League Tuesday and indications are he may become the club's regular net-minder.

Bauman, 25, played last season with Omaha Knights of the Central League and allowed 159 goals in 43 games for a 3.70 goals-against average.

He has looked impressive at training camp so far. The Aces were left without a regular goaltender in the middle of the 1964-65 season when Gump Worsley was called up to Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

Other goaltenders in camp here are Ernie Wakely, Gilles Baurville, Jean-Guy Montpetit and Carl Wetzel. After Worsley's departure, Wakely finished out last season for the Aces.

Teams Set For Opener; Twins Aroused By Rumors

By JACK HAND MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Favored Los Angeles Dodgers will send 23-game winner Don Drysdale against Minnesota's Jim Grant today in the opening game of a World Series that pits Dodger pitching against Minnesota's home run power.

Minnesota's first series, long a sellout, will be watched by about 47,000 fans in recently-enlarged Metropolitan Stadium. Los Angeles is a 7 1/2-to-5 series favorite and also a slight choice in the opener.

Game time is 3 p.m. EDT. The weather man predicts a fairly comfortable day with temperatures in the mid 60s and mostly sunny. There will be a brisk breeze blowing out from home plate, a factor favoring the hitters in a park where home runs are no novelty.

When Sam Mele, the Minnesota manager, sent his Twins through their final series tune-up, he reported some of the boys were upset by a story in the local paper quoting Buzzy Bavasi, Dodger general manager, as predicting a four-straight sweep.

"The Dodgers may be in for a little surprise," said Mele. "Those stories about the Dodgers got some of our guys a little disturbed. It may fire up the guys a little."

"They've got three real good pitchers. I've got pretty good pitching. They've got a good bullpen. So have I. Maybe they have more over-all speed than we do. We certainly have got more power."

Grant, 21-game winner in regular season play, has been the solid man of the Twins staff since he picked up a fast curve from pitching coach Johnny Sain.

The muscular six-foot, 180-pound right-hander has completed 14 of 38 starts for a 3.30 earned run average. However, he has been nicked for 34 home runs, a weakness he probably won't have to worry about too much in this series. The Dodgers are low in the majors with only 78 homers.

Drysdale, 23-12, has a deceptive three-quarter side arm motion that makes him especially rough on right-handed batters.

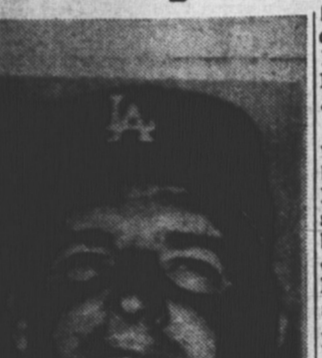
The Twins will send a heavy-hitting lineup against the Big D, who got the starting call because Sandy Koufax, the 26-game winner, will be observing Yom Kippur, the most solemn day in the Jewish calendar.

Mele platoons in left field and center field and will use Sandy Valdespino, a chunky little Cuban, in left and Jimmie Hall in center against the right-handed Drysdale. When Koufax pitches, Bob Allison will go to left and Joe Nosske to center.

Against Drysdale, the Twins will have left-handed power in batting champ Tony Oliva, Don Mincher and Hall, plus Valdespino, a pesky hitter. Oliva has been out of the lineup recently due to a muscle pull in his right leg but he reports he's in fine shape and ready to go.

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Sazio said that although he's going after Anthony and Kuntz, this doesn't mean either will see action in Monday's game. He said it was too early to tell.

Anthony, highly-rated Michigan fullback who starred in this year's Rose Bowl game with a three-touchdown performance was let go by Cleveland Browns of the National Football League and Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Football Conference.

Kuntz's whose habit of retiring at the end of every season stuck this year, would be particularly helpful to the team should he return because he is an effective two-way man.

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Ralph Sazio Calls For Help

HAMILTON (CP) — Coach Ralph Sazio of Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Eastern Football Conference sent out an urgent call for help Tuesday on glancing at his injury-riddled roster after a weekend game with Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

Fullback Art Baker has a small bone broken in his leg between the knee and the ankle and will miss Monday's game here against Ottawa Rough Riders.

Linebacker Herb Patarra, already sporting a cast to protect a cracked bone in his thumb and nursing a sore shoulder, suffered a torn knee ligament and is also out.

End Bill Ray Locklin and centre Gene Ceppeloni are hobbling on weak knees, but are expected to be ready for the Ottawa game.

MAY USE ANTHONY With two of his first stringers out, Sazio says he hopes to re-inforce the squad with Mel Anthony, recently released after a five-day trial, and Bobby Kuntz, who retired at the end of last season.

MINNEAPOLIS (CP)—Whatever the outcome of the World Series between Minnesota Twins and Los Angeles Dodgers, there should be more home runs hit when the teams play in Los Angeles.

The left field fence in Los Angeles is 330 feet from home plate compared with 344 in the Minnesota stadium. Left centre is 389 feet from home plate in Los Angeles and 435 here. A player would have to hit the ball 410 feet to put it over the centre field fence in Los Angeles while he would have to hit it 30 feet farther here. The right centre field fence in Los Angeles is 380 feet from home plate, compared with 435 in the Minnesota stadium.

The Los Angeles right field fence is 330 feet from home plate compared with 355 here. Fences in two of the fields in the Minnesota stadium are higher than at Los Angeles. The left and right field fences here are 12 feet high. In Los Angeles all fences are 10 feet high.

The Los Angeles stadium has the edge in seating capacity. It can hold 56,000 compared with 45,182 for Minnesota.

Bob Lee Boy Is Retired

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — Bob Lee Boy, a 10-year-old pacer, has been retired after seven years on the Maritime harness racing circuit, owners Eric and Harry Wheby announced here Monday.

Purchased in Haulton, Me., when he was a two-year-old colt, Bob Lee Boy started on Maritime tracks a year later. He has earned \$36,256 in an eight-year racing career.

The horse has started at every track in the Maritime provinces and set an individual lifetime record at Gorham, Me., two years ago with a clocking of 2:05 3/4.

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Brian London Close To Top

LONDON (CP)—A year ago Brian London was being written off as a fairly talented boxer who had passed his peak.

Today, at 31, after soundly beating fellow Briton Billy Walker and knocking out American Roger Rischer in the first round, the pundits are having some second thoughts.

Not that they're being taken in by manager Al Phillips' claims that London is good enough to be champ. But they are impressed with the fact that the new London is a streamlined improvement over the old — Phillips sweated 12 pounds off his 210-pound frame.

Son of former British heavyweight champion Jack London, Brian is a native of Blackpool who turned pro 11 years ago after winning the British amateur title and beating the Commonwealth's best at the Empire Games in Vancouver.

Four years later, in 1958, he took Joe Erskine's British crown, then lost and won in two matches with highly-touted Willie Pastrano of Miami.

His stay at the top was short. In his first defence of his title seven months later he was outpointed by Henry Cooper of London.

Things got worse when he defeated the British Boxing Board of Control and fought Floyd Patterson for the world title. He was not only soundly beaten by Patterson but was suspended for three months and fined \$1,000.

BEAT BLONDE BOMBER The board had refused to approve his shot at the world championship, mainly because he was not the British titleholder at the time.

Brian Conacher Returns To Tor.

TORONTO (CP)—Brian Conacher, a 24-year-old student at McMaster University, Monday night signed a contract with Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, 10 days after leaving the Leaf camp to return to school.

Prior to his departure from the Leafs' Peterborough training camp, Conacher, a star with Canada's national hockey team, had asked for a substantial contract and assurance that he would play in the NHL with the Leafs.

"He has agreed to the same terms as I offered him in Peterborough," said Punch Imlach, coach and general manager of the Leafs. "I don't discuss financial arrangements, but I can tell you that he agreed to play anywhere in the Leaf setup."

Brian became the fifth member of the Conacher family to sign an NHL contract. His father was an All-Star defenceman with New York Americans, Chicago Black Hawks and Montreal Maroons. His uncle Charlie was one of Leafs' star right-wingers, and another uncle, Roy, played with Boston Bruins, Detroit Red Wings and Chicago.

A cousin, Pete, had brief whirls with Chicago and New York.
