THE BOMBARDMENT DID LITTLE DAMAGE.

Most of the Shots Fell Into the Bay.

ONE SHELL STRUCK A CHURCH STORED WITH POWDER.

And the Spaniards Showed a Flag of Truce.

OFF SANTIAGO, Monday, July 11.—At half-past nine this morning, after several range-finding shots over the ridge protecting Santiago from the sea, the cruiser Newark opened fire on the city with her eight-inch guns. The New York, Brooklyn and Indiana participated in the fire at intervals of five minutes.

The bombardment lasted two hours, when General Shafter reported that the shells were mostly falling in the Bay, doing but little damage.

The last shot struck a prominent church in the heart of the city in which was stored powder and ammunition, causing a tremendous explosion.

When the warships had ceased firing and before Shafter had commenced the land attack a flag of truce was seen coming from the city.

The object of this was not known at noon today, when the correspondent left for the front.

THE CONDITIONS DEMANDED FOR PEACE

United States Wants a Big Indemnity.

\$240,000,000. A PORT IN THE CANARIES, CUBA AND PORTO RICO.

And to Retain the Philippines Till the Debt is Paid

MADRID, July 12.—It is asserted that the United States makes the following demands as the conditions of peace:

First, the possession of Cuba and Porto Rico, with a port in the Canaries.

Second, an indemnity of £48,000,000,—about \$240,000,000.

Third, the retention of the Philippines as a guarantee of the payment of the indemnity.

These terms are regarded as impossible.

SAGASTA HAS RESIGNED.

Advices the Formation of a Military Cabinet.

LONDON, July 12.—The Madrid correspondent of the Times says that Sagasta has tendered his resignation advising that a new cabinet be formed largely consisting of the military element.

This is generally expected, but the result may possibly be merely a partial reconstruction of the cabinet.

The Ministers are now in council.

DECEASED WIFE'S SISTER.

Second Reading of the Bill Carried in the House of Lords.

LONDON, July 9.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal has made a successful debut as an Imperial Legislator. Yesterday he moved the second reading of his bill to make marriage with a deceased wife's sister lawfully contracted in the colonies valid in the United Kingdom. The leading feature of the bill is that it allows the children of those domiciled in the colonies where such marriages are lawful to succeed to real properties in the United Kingdom. Lord Strathcona said the bill was introduced at the express desire of the Government of Canada, and he added that nearly every colony joined in the request. The late Lord Chancellor, Baron Herschell, opposed the bill.

The second reading was carried by a vote of 129 to 46. The minority included the Marquis of Salisbury, the Duke of Norfolk, Viscount Cross, and other members of the Government, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of York, and the Bishops, while the majority included the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Fife, the Duke of Westminster, the Duke of Devonshire, the Earl of Kimberly and the Marquis of Lansdowne and all the Liberal peers.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

The twelfth annual session of the Summer School of Science is now in progress at Moncton, N. B. The opening meeting was held in the Opera House on Thursday the 7th inst. Addresses of welcome were given by Mayor Cole, D Grant, Esq., Chairman of School Board, Mr Robinson, M P P, and Dr McCully, to which replies were given by Dr Iuch, Superintendent of Education for New Brunswick, Dr MacKay, Superintendent of Education for Nova Scotia, and Dr Bailey of the University of New Brunswick. The addresses were interspersed with music both vocal and instrumental.

On Friday morning a large number of students enrolled and regular classwork was begun. Friday evening Round Table Talk was an extremely interesting one, conducted by that noted naturalist and scholar Dr MacKay superintendent of education for Nova Scotia. It is an inspiration not soon lost to come into personal contact with so enthusiastic and yet practical a man. The doctor's theme was the development of the industrial idea in our schools. While acknowledging that the tendency of the education of today was to draw people to the towns and into what is called the learned professions he thought a sentiment might be created and an education provided that would regard farming, mining, etc, as learned professions, and those engaging in such would come to be regarded as occupying an exalted and desirable position in life. A most animated discussion followed, in which it was evident that, so far as the teachers who attend the Summer School of Science are concerned, they not only will, but already do, use their endeavors to combat that tendency which causes their pupils to look away from farm and factory to find an easier way of making a living.

Saturday evening was spent with the microscope. There were a number of instruments and collection of microscopic subjects are not surpassed in Canada. Wonders from every department of nature were exhibited. Beginning with the lowest forms of plant and animal life the development of both were traced through their various stages until specimens of the organisms of the highest forms of life in both the animal and vegetable kingdom were reached.

With each succeeding session of the Summer School of Science the interest and profit increase. From this benefit the teachers of P. E. Island are practically cut off by the action or rather inaction of the Government. Supported as the school is by the governments of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and being denied support by P. E. Island, the board of management would not be justified in holding meetings in P. E. Island until such support is accorded the school. In 1894 a session was held in Ch'town and largely attended by teachers, a few of whom have since attended the meetings held in the neighboring provinces.

The meeting could easily have been secured for P. E. Island for 1899 were it not for the attitude of our Government towards it. A large grant has not been asked for. A grant of \$100 annually or even \$50 would secure for the teachers of the Province the boon of occasional meetings of the Summer School in their midst.

Nova Scotia, in addition to the money grant to the school, recognizes the work done by the school in granting their Normal School diplomas, and gives their teachers who attend additional holidays for that purpose.

New Brunswick, in addition to the money grant, is considering the matter of additional holidays and other recognition of the school, and the prospect of gaining these concessions are encouraging.

From P. E. Island the school gets no recognition whatever. This is certainly impolitic were it only for the bad light in which we are made to appear in the other provinces. No one today denies the utility of the study of the natural sciences and the province that does the most to encourage it will take the foremost place educationally.
