The horses are the property of J. Harry Breen of Halifax and H. T. Fulton, Upper Stewiacke, N.S. They will occupy the same stalls at the Charlottetown Driving Park track as they did last exhibition. Star G., High Toby and Baronette will start at Montague on Wednesday.

A deuce of entries is the best way to describe the response that George McIntyre has received from horsemen for his classes on Wednesday next at Montague. When the different track managers were taking stock of the racing situation this spring there was a general belief that the number of horses available would not be as great as other years. However, it is turning out otherwise and instead of difficulties in filling classes the trouble is to prevent over-filling.

Alberton race track sports a new pacers record as a result of the first heat in the 2.16 class, when the rejuvenated McElwyn the Great 2.09 1-4 romped home a winner, following up by annexing heats numbers two and three for good measure. This horse raced in Maine two years ago and was considered

a high-class prospect. Last year he was off and when Mr. Callbeck bought him, faith had pretty nearly departed. The Prince Edward Island air, good care and the human touch has made all the difference in the world and now those in the know say—keep your eye on McElwyn!

Tyndal Semple, who occupied a bed in the Prince Edward Island Hospital for many weeks last winter, has recovered his health and is loud in his praise of Dr. Seaman, considering him a miracle worker. Tyndal deserves a lot of praise for driving Helen D. such a splendid race in Summerside and came near securing another niche in the Hall of Fame with Helen in the first heat of the 2.16 class at Alberton on Wednesday. JOE HUMPHRIES SUCGUMBS TO HEART ATTACK

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) FAIR HAVEN, N. J., July 10.—Joe Humphries, noted light announcer, died today after a heart attack which the family attributed to the heat. He was 63. Humphries suffered a stroke—his second—last December, but recovered sufficiently to go to Florida for the winter. There he improved so much that he returned to his home in Fair Haven about two months ago and planned to participate again in the fight announcing specialty he had followed for 45 years.

Humphries was born in New York's lower east side October 19, 1872, and went to school with Al Smith. They were close friends and the fight announcing used to relate that he had been instrumental in bringing the former Democratic presidential nominee into politics.

His great idol, however, was Terry McGovern, whom he managed. Humphries' eyes would light up and emotion would creep into his bellows of a voice as he discussed the great Irish pugilist.

He announced almost all of the championship bouts for many years. John L. Sullivan, Bob Fitzsimmons, James J. Corbett and their successors in the ring were among them.

So well known to the fight faithful was the Humphries voice that he commanded as much as \$1,000 for announcing a night's boxing card.

He almost broke with Tex Rickard when the promoter insisted on installing amplifiers for the Dempsey-Carpenter fight. Humphries settled the issue by pushing aside the microphone and bellowing the names and weights to the farthest seats.

He got his start using his lungs in paging brokers on the New York Produce Exchange. That job was an advancement from shining shoes.

Girl's Team Experiencing Tough Times

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 10.—Dee Boeckman, coach of the United States Women's Olympic Track and Field team disclosed today that some of the girls who qualified for the team are virtually stranded in New York and are on the verge of hunger.

"They are eating so little they can't train in this severe heat," she said. The fund raised by the American Olympic Committee to defray the Olympic athletes' expenses is about \$75,000 short of the amount needed.

Scratch Hit Robs Senator Hurler Of No-hitter; Gehrig Takes Lead In Home Run Race

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 10.—New York Yankees took sweet revenge here today on Cleveland Indians, smashing out 20 hits, including four homers, to turn in an 18-0 victory behind Carley Ruffing's seven-hit pitching.

Humbled yesterday by Cleveland slugging, the New York "Murderers' Row" batted Trille pitching all over the lot today, with Lou Gehrig setting the pace by polling out two home runs, his 22nd and 23rd of the season, to take the major league away from Jimmy Fox and Hal Trosky. Joe Di Maggio and Bill Dickey each smashed out one round-trip blows to follow Gehrig's pace.

The win, Ruffing's 11th of the year and his third shutout, put the Yankees 10 games in front of the American League pack again, since both Detroit Tigers and Boston Red Sox, their nearest rivals, were defeated today.

Tough Break For Newcomer One lone, scratch hit separated Buck Newsom, Washington's husky right-hand pitcher, from base-

ball's "hall of fame" as he shut out Detroit Tigers 5-0 at Washington in the best pitched game he has ever turned in.

It was his 11th victory of the year. In the third inning Irving Burns, the first baseman, hit one of Newcom's tosses between first and second. Both Bluege and Kuhel went after the ball. Bluege managed to stop it but no one got to the bag quickly enough to beat Burns. Many thought Kuhel should have drawn an error for not letting Bluege handle the ball, but the play went down as a hit.

Sox Lose To Chicago A six-run rally in the last two innings at Boston gave Chicago White Sox an 8-2 victory over Red Sox today, halted the Sox team's five-game winning streak and tied the series at one game each.

Vernon Kennedy went the route for the Sox. He held Boston to seven hits, and although he gave 10 bases on balls, won his sixth game in a row and 10th of the season.

STARS AWAIT OPENING OF TRIALS

NEW YORK, July 10.—Nearly 300 of Uncle Sam's bravest track and field athletes today awaited the starter's gun for the final drive down the qualifying trail that leads to the Olympic Games in Berlin.

The final United States trials, quadrannally the greatest carnival of its kind in the country, will be held in the new Municipal Stadium on Randall's Island tomorrow and Sunday.

With only 60 berths available, four athletes will fall for one that makes the grade. Twenty-two members of the 1932 team will be in the field among them Frank Wykoff, who went to the 100 metres final at Amsterdam in 1928, John Anderson and Eddie Gordon, discus and broad jump champions, respectively.

The first three in each of 17 events will gain Olympic assignments. The personnel of the 400 and 1600 metre relay teams will be selected from among the sprint candidates. Motion pictures will be taken of all finishes and in cases where judges disagree the camera will decide.

Giants Win From Dodgers In Close Game

Giants were victorious over Dodgers in a scheduled game of Holy Redeemer Parish's House Baseball League last evening. The final score was 9-8. Some of the most spectacular plays seen thus far in the league were made as the teams waged a desperate battle for the decision. TIGERS ROARING AGAIN

(By Guardian's Special Wire) Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, July 10.—It has been just a month since Mickey Cochrane, Detroit's nerve-wracked exhausted pilot, turned the skidding, discouraged world champions over to Del Baker and hurried to a hospital bed. Today Baker, the veteran coach, has the Tigers roaring through the baseball jungles again, once more a spirited team that won't regard its cause as lost. Tearing through all opposition the Detroiters have won 13 of their last 15 games. In the short month Cochrane has spent in sick bay and on a western ranch regaining his strength the Tigers have moved along at an average just below the .500 mark. "It sure looks like an almost impossible task to try and catch these Yankees," Baker said today, "but we considered New York's big margin, but anything can happen in baseball."

German Team Takes 2-0 Lead

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia, July 10.—Winning both opening singles matches for a 2-0 lead over Yugoslavia, Germany today virtually clinched a berth in the inter-zone final of the Davis Cup tennis competition.

Baron Gottfried Von Cramm and Heiner Henkel trimmed Josef Palmiter and Ferenc Puncce, respectively, before a crowd of 7,000 in the opening of the European zone final.

Appearing none the worse for the injury he suffered in the all-England championship final against Fred Perry a week ago, Von Cramm spotted Palmiter a 3-0 lead in the first set, and won at 6-4, 6-2, 6-8, 6-2. After taking a 5-1 lead in the third set, Von Cramm slumped and lost it. But he returned to the court after the intermission with his strokes under control and won the fourth and the match much as he pleased.

Henkel performed at the top of his game in vanquishing Puncce in straight sets, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

The doubles match will be played tomorrow, with the concluding singles scheduled for Sunday. The winner of the best three matches of the series of five will meet Australia, conqueror of the United States, at Wimbledon, England, next week.

"Chuck" Klein Sets New National League Mark As Phillies Beat Pirates 9-0

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 10.—Chuck Klein, slugging Philadelphia outfielder, batted the Phillies to a 10-inning 9-6 victory at Pittsburgh over the Pirates today by smashing out four home runs to set a new modern National League record for circuit blows in one game.

By pounding the ball into the right field stands in the first, fifth, seventh and 10th innings, Klein equaled the major league record and became the fourth player to do the trick. Lou Gehrig of New York Yankees hit four homers on June 3, 1932. Bob Love of Boston Nationals and Ed Delahanty of the Phillies both turned in the feat, but neither performance is listed in modern records.

The Philly outfielder, who batted in six runs with his wallop, came close to hitting another homer in the second inning when Paul Waner backed up against the wall in time to pull in his drive. Klein's fourth smash broke a 6-6 deadlock in the tenth inning and proved to be the winning run although the Phillies scored two more markers off Bill Swift in the one extra frame.

10 out of 13 for Bees Danny MacFadyen checked the bats of his former teammates at Cincinnati today and pitched Boston Bees to a 4-1 victory, their 10th in 13 games with the Reds this season.

A first inning triple by Bill Urbanski gave the Bees their first run on an infield out. Coscarart's single, Mueller's double scoring him, and Moore's single scoring Mueller added two more in the eighth. The Bees got another in the ninth on Berger's double, Coscarart's single and Mueller's double.

Davis Hails Dodgers The Cubs made it three in a row over the lowly Brooklyn Dodgers at Chicago, winning 6-2 behind Curt Davis' six-hit pitching.

Davis held Brooklyn helpless in all but the seventh inning, when the Dodgers scored both their runs on homers by a pair of rookies—Eddie Wilson and Euday Hassett.

A rookie, Johnny Gill, also hit a homer for the Cubs. The Cubs put together five hits for four runs off Fred Frankhouse in the second inning, and were never in danger.

Frisch Buins Great Effort The Cardinals came from behind to ruin a fine pitching performance by Carl Hubbell, to beat New York Giants 5-4 in 13 innings at St. Louis and hold their slim half-game lead in the National League.

A pinch double by Manager Frankie Frisch, sending in Leo Durocher with the winning run with none out in the last of the 13th, broke up the ball game. Billy Terry, who announced only yesterday that he was through as an active player, finished the last two innings at first base for the Giants.
