WHAT THE FARMERS GET

During the federal election campaign the farmer was the one man upon whose shoulder the Liberal politician lovingly placed his hand and into whose ear he feelingly whispered "We'll make all these things easy for you; we'll open new markets for you; we'll get you agricultural implements boots and clothing, and everything else cheaper than you ever bought them before."

What does the farmer get out of the Fielding tariff? Not a thing. Mr. Fielding did not secure any concessions in the American market as the Liberal candidates and the Liberal leader assured the farmers they would. On the contrary any advantage that may accrue from the reduction of the duty on agricultural implements shortens by so much the home market. The lowering of the protection of our Canadian industries is a lowering by so much of industrial activity in Canada and a lessening by so much of employment in Canada. The farmers for whose sake the election was held, to save whom Mr. MacKenzie King was called to the leadership of the party, has been given the heavy end of the stick; he gets nothing of what was promised him while he has a fifty per cent tax added to his daily purchases. An exchange well remarks that the flimsy deal handed out to the farmer would not deceive a horse.

THE PROGRESSIVES

The Progressives, as a potential factor, are serving their first term in parliament and either laying the foundation of a new political party or burying the hopes of those who were looking for a new light in the political world.

Many people were quite honestly convinced that the two old line parties could be made more generally efficient by placing beside them in the House of Commons a third party who could stand by them when acting squarely and in the interests of the country, or who could be used against them when the interests of the country demanded it. It was claimed that party interests had become too pronounced, that men elected to support either one of the old parties would stand by his party regardless of any other interests. There probably was sufficient truth in this charge to appeal to many honest people although it was far from being the whole truth or even a considerable part of it. Partly as a result of this propaganda which has been in progress for some time and largely because of the general unrest and dissatisfaction prevailing and the idea that a change might be beneficial a sufficient number of Progressives were elected to at least make their weight felt.

But nothing has happened. Not one of the purposes for which the Progressives were elected has been accomplished. Not only that but the Progressive members do not appear to have made any effort towards their accomplishment.

The main purposes for which the Progressives were elected were (1) to secure a Wheat Board; (2) to secure a renewal of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement, (3) to secure substantial all round reductions in the tariff and the elimination of duties on agricultural implements and foodstuffs; (4) to secure more rigid economy in administration.

They have secured none of these, not even a substitute or a compromise. Instead of the Wheat Board they were pledged to secure they have been promised a board which will give them none of the special privileges they wanted; instead of free duty on agricultural implements the duty has been lowered by a small percentage and the cost of the implements increased by an increased sales tax; instead of an all round reduction in duties there have been a few small reductions and an all round increase in cost because of the increased sales tax; instead of a more rigid economy in administration there has been a vast increase both in administration and in taxation. In short they asked for bread and were given a stone.

For failures such as these good men are not necessarily to blame. Many good men have failed and the hopes of many men in the present administration have been blasted. The point is that the Progressive members became politically human as soon as they entered parliament. They accommodated themselves to political exigencies; they saved their own bacon as individual members; they made no appreciable effort to carry out the wishes of those who elected them.

Whether their constituents will give them another chance or admit the folly of trying to make a new and cleaner party out of the old material remains to be seen. That a good Progressive can be made out of either a Grit or a Tory who is ready to become any one of the three provided he is elected, is about as impossible as it is to "make a silk purse out of a sow's ear." There is no short cut to a political millennium. The men who cannot be a good Conservative or a good Liberal will make but a poor Progressive. The emphasis must be placed more and more upon moral character and sound common sense, and the denunciation more and more upon that deception and fraud the only purpose of which is to win elections.

A TIMELY LESSON

The imposition in Summerside the other day of a \$20 fine on an autoist for exceeding the speed limit will probably effect a slowing up in future on the part of the offender. We need a similar lesson in Charlottetown. We still have a few autoists who think the streets are speedways and that others who venture upon them in front or otherwise must look out for themselves. That we have had so few accidents is a marvel to many. Last Sunday just as the churches were dismissing and the streets almost crowded with men, women and children a speed fiend drove furiously down Prince Street to the imminent danger of all on the street but fortunately without collision. He escaped arrest. There are too many such and the sooner they are taught a lesson that they will remember the safer will be the city and its people.

The fact that one "gets away with it" is an encouragement to others to defy the law and the police and the evil is steadily growing. We have excellent traffic regulations but unless they are enforced they are useless and there is a good deal of laxity in their enforcement. It is time to call a halt.

SUMMER'S HERE.

Summer is here; the river routes, the Rocky Point shore and woods, the trout streams, the jobster factories are now open and holding out hands in the warm sunshine for visitors, for hard working men and women to come and drink in life and health after the uninviting days of spring. And those who value life and health are accepting the invitation. The joyousness of summer is in the air, a prelude to the fuller life of the fast coming summer.

Migratory Game

Sir.—There is something wrong with our game law. The sports of this country are not satisfied with it. I don't know why we can't get a limited number of birds to shoot in the spring or say ten days or enough time to please and satisfy the people. It is all right to go shooting in the fall if the farmers and laborers had time. Of course the rich have never anything to do spring or fall. As you know the opening season for game in New Brunswick is in the fall when the moose and deer are in their prime. Why should we not shoot geese when they are in good condition; when they come here in the fall from hatching they are as poor as rakes. We on Prince Edward Island have no big game like there is in our neighboring sister provinces and they have them all the year round and are worth protecting. We on Prince Edward Island have wild fowl; many kinds hatch here; those our local game laws have protected for many years. Geese and Brant appear in March or April, the young laying geese remain for a few weeks and the hatching geese proceed to the far north. Therefore our local game laws never gave them protection for they never required any. Now we are confronted with the Migratory Game Act, framed in a foreign country and presented to Parliament in Ottawa. The government passed it as a treaty between Canada and the United States prohibiting the shooting of any kind of birds in the spring on Prince Edward Island. These birds are shot in the United States on their way north until the 10th of March. Is it any wonder we should kick. I can't ask your readers if it is right for a deer and moose warden to come here from New Brunswick to arrest any one here under the Migratory Bird Law. Notes By The Way

(From the Examiner)

The Fielding tariff has many peculiarities. Among these is the increase of 50 per cent. in the sales tax. When this tax was first put on by the late Government it was violently condemned by the Liberal tariff critics. Nothing was too bad for them to say about it from their places in the House of Commons, and the Liberal press throughout the Dominion also with one voice condemned it. Now Mr. Fielding has not only adopted the sales tax but he has increased it by one half and made it the main feature of his policy as a revenue producer.

Here in Prince Edward Island we have grown familiar with this form of Liberal deception. When in opposition they promised the people reduced taxation and no sooner had they gained power than they doubled the load. In opposition they promised close economy and once in office they increased the provincial expenditure by 90 per cent., a good slice of which was pocketed by members of the Government and their supporters in the notorious salary grab. Now Mr. Fielding and his colleagues at Ottawa have performed a like feat in regard to the sales tax.

And as with the sales tax so also in reverse fashion with their pre-election promise to make all foodstuffs and agricultural implements free of duty. We look in vain to the tariff for free foodstuffs or implements. In the one case what they denounced they have adopted and increased and in the other case what they promised they have refused to give. And it seems passing strange that what they had promised and have now rejected was the very heart and core of Liberal policy, while what they have adopted and increased by 50 per cent. they had before rejected as an oppression and infamous Tory measure.

It will be seen at a glance that the Bell Government here and the King Government at Ottawa, are running true to form, and on parallel lines. To both of these combinations what was bad when they were in opposition has become good in power, and what was then good has now become bad. In fact, the Tory sales tax has become better in their esteem than Liberal free food and free agricultural implements. As is set down in the Biglow Papers, "A merciful Providence fashioned them hollow, on purpose that they might their principles swallow."

Apart from swallowing their principles and promises in regard rather sinister aspect.

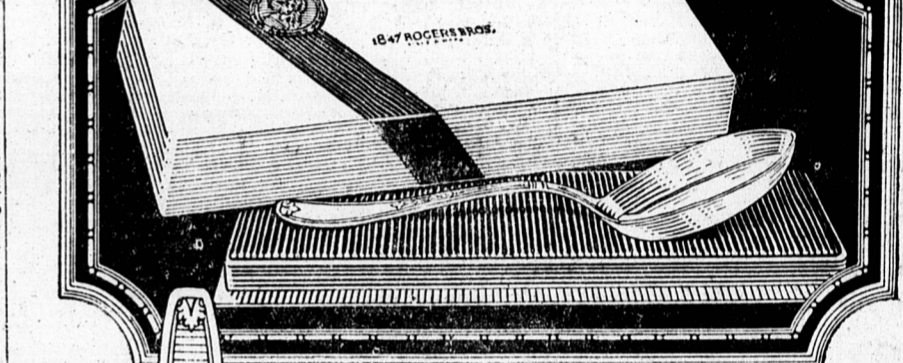
