**Western Economists Find Financial Problem Serious**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sort of uneasiness about the Western world's economic well-being has been nagging financiers, bankers and government economists in many economic surveys.  
Is the world's economy glowing with real health or is it flustered with fever?  
If business does go to pot, will governments be able to control the economy and prevent a world-wide depression?  
Through the first two-thirds of 1957, the answers are not yet clear. You can see the uneasiness in the many economic surveys by United Nations organizations or the international monetary fund.  
As the United Nations social and economic council reports:  
**A CLOUD CRYSTAL BALL**  
"While the outlook is clouded with uncertainties, no acceleration in economic activity is foreseen in the immediate future, nor is any serious recession."  
In the last 10 years the purchasing power of money all over the world has declined. The U.S. dollar has dropped by 20 per cent the pound sterling by about 7 per cent, the West German mark by about 25 per cent and the French franc by about 60 per cent. In Japan purchasing power of the yen is down by about 65 per cent.  
The most crucial and recent monetary crisis was in France. There, to meet foreign trade debts, Finance Minister Feil-Gaillard dropped the price of the franc for tourists and others who bring foreign currencies into France.  
In addition, Gaillard moved to cut down on foreign currency leaving the country by taxing all imports except basic raw materials and fuels.  
**RECORD SPENDING SPREE**  
The French had joined the world in a record spending spree. The only trouble was that France was spending more than she was making.  
Indeed the world's prosperity seems to account for most of its current economic problems — inflation, wage-price increases, shortages of industrial capacity, money and labor.  
For those who remember the bust of 1929 and the depression of the 1930s, it should be pointed out that most economists say the world economic picture is substantially different today.  
Both the United Nations survey and a still unpublished economic report make essentially the same point: Governments today generally accept more responsibility in economic matters.  
Unlike their earlier counterparts governments today do not hesitate to create employment or to adopt fiscal policies controlling money supply and credit.  
In the Western industrial world there has been a tremendous technological breakthrough on almost all fronts in the last 30 years. There are more new things to make. The television, plastic and synthetic industries are but three examples. Not to mention the unfolding world of the atom.  
Development from the laboratory to production requires financing.  
As much as anything the money shortage has forced the slow-down in Western industrial expansion. This is a potential danger.  
**CORNERED MARKET**  
There is another potential danger: The United States world trade situation.  
The U.S. now takes in some \$4,500,000,000 a year more than it spends on imports.  
Were it not for the U.S. government's foreign aid policy, which amounts to an export of dollars, plus the fact that private investment abroad has increased from less than \$1,250,000,000 in 1953 to around \$3,000,000,000 in 1956, there would be a serious dollar shortage around the world.  
This chronic trade situation which sees the world's money continuously flowing toward the U.S. is one of the underlying factors in the creation by six European nations of a common market.  
By treaty Germany, France, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands and Belgium propose to abolish all trade and travel restrictions between their borders. Ultimately, the hope is to establish a strong, highly industrialized economy capable of competing on an equal footing with the United States for world trade.

**Says Russia's IBM Has Made No Change In NATO Policy**

HALIFAX (CP)—Admiral Jerrold Wright, NATO's supreme allied commander in the Atlantic said Saturday Russian development of an intercontinental ballistic missile "has not made any difference yet" in NATO policies.  
"All new weapons affect our plans," he said at a hasty 10-minute press conference here. "We study their effects and take such measures as are necessary, but the IBM has not made any difference yet."  
**WEEK'S TOUR**  
On a week-long tour of North Atlantic Treaty Organization commands in eight countries, Admiral Wright spent five hours here before leaving for London Saturday night. He dined with Rear Admiral H. F. Pullen, new flag officer of Canada's Atlantic Naval Command, toured a naval museum, and attended a briefing on NATO exercises at the Maritime Air Command headquarters.  
At the conference, Admiral Wright said he had received reports of submarine sightings on the Atlantic coast. "I don't mean to discredit all reports but I don't believe... the sightings were all subs. People unskilled in sightings see strange objects like fish of floating wreckage and draw conclusions. We do everything of course to determine the authenticity of these reports."  
Newfoundland fishermen have reported a number of objects they claim were submarines since last spring.  
Admiral Wright said NATO exercises, now being held off Norway prove "the ability and readiness of these forces to work as allies rather than as eight individual nations."  
**ALLIES CONTROL SEA**  
"The navy's role is to secure the Atlantic against attack. The advent of nuclear weapons only serves to amplify demonstrate and re-emphasize that the allies control the sea."  
The admiral, also commander-in-chief of the United States Atlantic Fleet, was scheduled to leave London Sunday night for Bodo, northern Norway, where he will meet two allied task force commanders. Later he will board the U.S. aircraft carrier Forrestal for a first hand look at NATO fall exercises.  
Also on his busy agenda is a quick look at exercise "fend-off" an anti-submarine manoeuvre off Norfolk, Va., by mid-October.
