Discuss Blood Donor Clinics at Meeting In Summerside

A meeting was held in the Town Hall at Summerside on Tuesday evening under the chairmanship of Mr. W. A. Currie to find some means of stimulating the attendance of Summerside residents at the Blood Donor Clinics.

Mr. Currie reported that at the two clinics held last year Summerside had not met its quota and he said that this was most unfortunate because in 1953 at the Prince County Hospital 577 bottles of whole blood and 27 bottles of plasma were used.

This blood and plasma was made available to the patients that needed it without charge. He explained the value of this service and the fact that so many people have been helped yet the citizens continually fail to support the service which is for their own welfare and for the welfare of other members of their families.

He stressed that the greatest lack of co-operation was found among young people in the 20-30 age bracket and he said it was necessary to find some way to attract the young people to the clinics. He said the operation was absolutely painless and there were no harmful after-effects.

After some discussion it was decided to hold a canvass of the business districts to get sufficient donors for the clinic to be held in St. Mary's Hall in early June. A clinic will be held at the airport then.

Various community organizations were represented at this meeting and it was decided to have another meeting on May 6 at 7:45 when each delegate is to bring several more members. At that
