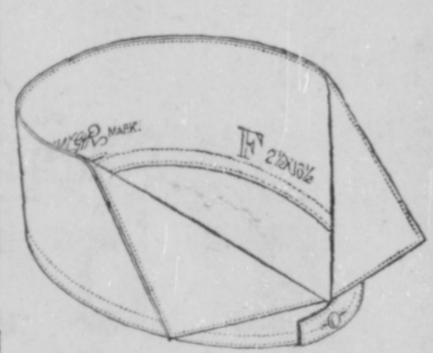

MANILA IN A BAD STATE

Foreigners in fear of their lives

DESPERADOES LURK IN THE STREETS OF THE CITY.

The Americans will now move on Iloilo.

MANILA, Feb. 8.—This city is full of desperadoes whom the police are locking up in twos and threes.

Armed natives are in hiding places on every side street and in many houses, and foreigners are in great danger of their lives.

The greatest vigilance to prevent assassination or incendiarism is maintained.

The rebels died by hundreds in the trenches except the Gorotes who, armed with bows and arrows charged desperately and uselessly.

The prisoners declare that the attack was unprepared and that the outposts fired and then all joined in the attack.

A forward movement upon Iloilo is anticipated.

General Miller has never had any doubt of his ability to take the place, but he held back owing to the unwillingness of President McKinley to begin forcible measures.

Americans After American Filibusters.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Further information concerning the seizure of the schooner loaded with arms for the Philippine insurgents shows that it was an American vessel and not a German.

TO LET HADES LOOSE.

The Effect of the United States Leaving the Filipinos Derelict.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Outlook says:—To leave the Philippines derelict now would be to let hell loose upon the world. America herself made Mr. McKinley President, and must herself bear the consequences of his acts and the heavy but enabling responsibility for good government in the lands over which she has hoisted the Stars and Stripes.

The oldest Queen in Europe is now the Queen of Hanover, who will be 81 next April, while in the following month Queen Victoria will be 80. The ex Empress Eugenie, who may well be included, comes third, being 73 in the same month. Among the Princesses of Europe, Princess Clementine of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, exceeds all the Queens and Princesses in age, being 82 this year; Princess Alexandra of that house, widow of Duke Ernst and sister-in-law of the Prince Consort coming next with 78 years last December.

Chinese Loan Subscribed—Snow in New England—Bad Beef Thrown Overboard, Etc.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—There was a public demonstration in Porto Rico yesterday to celebrate the ratification of the Peace Treaty.

A northeast snow storm rages in New England and few steamers venture to leave the ports.

A large quantity of canned beef sent to Havana for the United States troops was condemned and ordered to be taken outside of the port and thrown overboard.

The appeal for ten thousand dollars in connection with the Chinese Imperial five per cent gold loan has been subscribed five times over in London.

Dr. Henry E. Royce and wife were accidentally asphyxiated in their home in New York.

A reign of terror exists in Bolivia.

John Dillon has resigned the leadership of the Irish Parliamentary party.

Morgantown, Kentucky is being visited by spotted fever or spinal meningitis, which is carrying off scores of people, old and young.

THE DESTINY OF CHINA

It Is Impossible to For- tell It

LORD SALISBURY MAKES A REASSURING SPEECH

Regarding British Interests and the German Treaty.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Feb. 8.—In the House of Lords yesterday, Lord Salisbury in his speech referred at length to China.

The destiny of China, his Lordship said, was impossible to foretell. All that Her Majesty's Government was concerned with at present was to see that the treaties are fully observed, that the interests of British subjects are safe-guarded, and that nothing is done by either China or any other nation to compromise their rights.

The agreement between Germany and Great Britain was of a character favorably to friendship between the two nations to the rights of all concerned as well as to the peace of the world, but he would not be doing his duty if he gave further details as to stipulations which for the present required no action on the part of Great Britain.

DELAGOA BAY IS BRITISH.

"Portugal Fell Into Our Arms Like a Fainting Woman," Says Milner.

The New York Post's London correspondent says:—If there is one question more than another to which financiers and business men generally are most anxious for an answer, it is "What is the truth about Delagoa bay?" which is the key to the whole international position in Africa. I am enabled to send you a reply which Sir Alfred Milner, British High Commissioner in South Africa, made to this question before he sailed for the Cape last Saturday. He said:—"I can tell you no more than this. Delagoa bay is all right. Portugal fell into our arms like a fainting woman."

"But what," asked his questioner, "about the King of Portugal's speech the other day, when he declared Portugal never would consent to alienate any of her colonies?"

Milner replied:—"Ah, the King has opposition to consider. You must draw no other conclusion from what he said than that he had his strong opposition in mind. But though Delagoa bay is securely British, that will not itself settle the Transvaal question, which is South Africa's problem. The central fact in the Transvaal is this:—You have 15,000 armed Boers sitting upon £100,000,000 worth of bullion. What would you do if you were one of these 15,000? Take that as a lamp when you look into the future."

GERMAN CONSOLS.

Fifty Million Dollars Worth to be Placed on the Market.

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—The two hundred million marks (\$50,000,000) of Imperial and Prussian 3 per cent, consols recently purchased by the Brussels Bank will be offered for subscription by the public on Feb. 9. The consols were purchased from the German and Prussian Governments at 91-1-8, and will be issued at 92.

TO PROTECT THE BRITISH.

Consul in Colon Wants a Warship Sent There.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Feb. 5.—The British Consul at Colon, Colombia, it is reported, has cabled the Governor-in-Chief and Captain-General of Jamaica, Sir August Henning, requesting that a British man-of-war be despatched to Colon to protect British subjects and property there. This appeal tends to confirm previous private advice that the lives of inoffensive foreign residents are endangered through the indiscriminate attempts of the Colombian soldiery to suppress strikers, and through threatened retaliatory efforts of the dockmen and railway employees, which yesterday threatened to precipitate a sanguinary crisis.
