Supreme Court.

The Easter Term of the Supreme Court opened this forenoon. Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Hensley on the bench.

Robt. I. Holman vs. Robt. Bell.—On motion of Mr. H. C. McDonald for plaintiff and removal of case under Canada Temperance Act. On motion of Mr. W. S. Stewart, for applicant, and consent of Mr. N. McLeod, Q. C., for respondent, it was ordered that the rule nisi for certiorari be made absolute.

In the matter of the Winding-up Act, re the Bank of Liverpool, N. S., against George Wightman, the court on motion of Mr. N. McLeod, Q. C., granted a rule nisi returnable on Monday next, to show cause why a certified copy of a judgment of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia for \$897 recovered in this matter, should not be made a judgment of this court.

John McCull, respondent, vs. R. Gallant, appellant.—A rule nisi was granted last term directed to Oswald Haywood, who was subpoenaed as a witness in this court and failed to attend thereunder, to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt. Haywood having appeared and stated that he had attended on the subpoena, but having been informed that the case would not be called went away. Court ordered to give his own recognizance in the sum of \$150 to appear before the Supreme Court of Summerside on the 1st of June term next, then to abide by the judgment of the Court.

Wellington Mathew vs. Michael McGaughey.—Applicant making default, the Court on motion of Mr. Peters for respondent orders the appeal to be dismissed with costs.

Wellington Mathew vs. Margaret E. Ware.—Mr. F. L. Hazard for applicant proved notice of appeal. On motion of Mr. Peters the Court allows this case to stand over till next Trinity Term on payment of costs.

Court adjourned till 11 o'clock on Monday next.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

AN IMPORTANT QUESTION.

Outline of the Debate.

OTTAWA, May 3. The Finance Minister stated yesterday that the Government had not yet decided whether or not to lower the duty on crude petroleum or gas oil.

Mr. McCarthy moved for the appointment of a representative by the Canadian Government, to be attached to the staff of Her Majesty's Minister at Washington, specially charged to watch, guard and represent the interests of Canada. He spoke at length in support of his resolution.

Mr. Foster sympathized with Mr. McCarthy's remarks. In so far as the development of treaty-making power was concerned, Canada had been making some progress during the past few years, and Canada had to-day all the powers that she asked for, all the powers that are consistent with her position as a part of the British Empire.

The resolution contemplated something more than the establishment of a commercial agency and something less than the status of an independent power. The Government of Canada might yet extend the system of the appointment of agents to represent her in a commercial way—something like consular agents. The Government had, indeed, made a commencement of establishing such agencies by the appointment of a High Commissioner in England.

Outside of every other duty he performed was the watching of Canada's interests in London in regard to trade matters. There was, too, Mr. Fabre at Paris, and there were some six agencies established in the West Indies. The Government at Washington is conducted very differently from that of other countries, as matters affecting tariff are dealt with entirely by a Committee of Congress and are not initiated with the Cabinet as was the case in Canada and other countries; and therefore an attaché of the British Ambassador would not be of so much value in getting his views carried out. A simple commercial agent would be better.

Mr. Laurier supported the resolution. It did not go so far as he desired, but it was a step in the right direction.

Prof. Weldon, who seconded the resolution, with Cockburn, McNeill, Mills and Davies spoke in favor of the motion.

Sir John Thompson pointed out that the range the debate had taken showed its vast importance and how careful the House should be before adopting the resolution. The resolution was not asking the mere appointment of an agent, but an attaché to a British embassy. The Leader of the Opposition, he said, pointed out that this attaché would report to the Canadian Government and the British Government at the same time. Now, if he was an attaché of the British Ambassador he could do no such thing, as he would have to be a confidential servant of the British Minister, and could not report to either. There was a good deal to be said in favor of appointing an agent at Washington and at some of the other cities in the States—something similar to consular agent. He moved the adjournment of the debate, so that the Government might have an opportunity of taking the different views expressed on the matter into consideration.

Mr. McCarthy, while adhering to his views already expressed, said that he trusted the Leader of the Opposition would not press a vote on adjournment of the debate, as an opportunity would yet be had to fully discuss the subject this season.

Mr. Laurier agreed to this, and the debate was adjourned.

The Contest in East York.

TORONTO, May 3. John K. Leslie has been nominated by the Grits to contest East York with Wm. McLean, editor of the Toronto World, the Conservative candidate.

In Distress.

LONDON, May 3. The English schooner Sophie was sighted off the Faroe Islands with her sails destroyed and bulwarks gone. Some of her crew were swept overboard and drowned.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.) HALIFAX, May 3. Quebec—Excellent catches of herring and lobsters are reported as being made at Percé and Newport Point, fair at Paspébiac and a few herring and lobsters at Grand River.

New Brunswick—Herring are reported stuck in at Caraquette, boats averaging one barrel per net. A few herring and lobsters were taken at Point Escuminac and Musonnette respectively, to-day, but at the latter place the weather continues too rough for good fishing. Chaleur Bay is reported clear of ice.

P. E. Island—Herring are very plentiful from Alberton round North Point to Miminigash. Lobsters are also very plentiful at Miminigash, Frog Pond and Natesford, and a few are at the latter.

Magdalen Islands—Herring are still in abundance at Amherst Island.

Cape Breton—Fair catches of herring and lobsters were made to-day at Port Hood, and the first net set this season at Meat Cove had two barrels of herring. There was also a fair catch of herring at St. Ann's, N. S. There is no fishing of any note on the coast of Nova Scotia to-day. At Port LaTour a few lobsters and gaspercaux were taken.
