## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Let no man fear others so much as himself.

—Little ideas and big successes never go together.

—A little more ease, a little more comfort, and this world would be our school no longer, but our home; the very thing which God never designed it for.

—During the Decoration Day celebration at Pembina, N. D., on Sunday a number of Emerson people crossed the border to take part, having their rigs decorated with British and Yankee flags. While the Canadians were away from their rigs the British flags were torn down and trampled in the dirt. This unfriendly action has created a great deal of bitterness at Emerson.

—The New York Herald "pays a well deserved tribute to the British sailors in the service of the United States. It says:

"When the four big ships of the American Line were acquired by the United States Navy our Government would have been considerably embarrassed to properly man them in quick time had not their crews stepped forward almost as a unit and volunteered in the United States service. A majority of these seamen are English born, naturalized Americans, but some who had not taken out papers did not stop to consider their nationality and shipped under the stars and stripes with utmost contentment and good will. Many of these men have been under fire; all have been baked under tropical suns, have done hard and incessant work and been deprived for extended periods of the seaman's first love—shore leave; but we have yet to hear of one instance of insubordination, of one complaint made, of one duty left undone. The British sailors have been cheerful under trials, steadfast to discipline, brave in battle. They are an honor to themselves and to the flag they serve."

## Disraeli's Manner.

I have no doubt Disraeli loses friends by his apparent insouciance and the method in which he walks to his place—without looking at anybody—but I surmise from my own experience that it arises from nearsightedness. I perceive that he cannot tell what o'clock it is without using his glass, and somebody told me lately that he saw him hailing a police van, mistaking it for an omnibus. His face is often haggard and his air weary and disappointed, but he has the brow and eyes of a poet, which are always pleasant to look upon.

He generally says the right thing at the right minute and in the right way, and he is lustily cheered, but sitting among the opposition I have abundant reason to note that he is not completely trusted. It is said that young Stanley and other youngsters of his class believe in him and that the man who is so taciturn in parliament is a charming companion among his familiars and is a gracious and genial host. Some of his postprandial mots steal out and, I should think, make fatal enemies. Somebody asked him lately if Lord Robert M. was not a stupid ass. "No, no," said Benjamin, "not at all; he is a clever ass."—"My Life In Two Hemispheres," Sir Charles Gavan Duffy.

# TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

## From Saturday's 5 o'clock Edition.

MADRID, June 4.—The debate in the Chamber with reference to the situation in the Philippines has been indefinitely postponed.

Private despatches from Cuba say that the rainy season has begun and the insurgents do not dare to attack Santiago de Cuba.

MADRID, June 4.—In the Chamber of Deputies, to-day, Lieut.-General Correa, the Minister of War, in replying to an enquiry as to whether a Spanish expedition would be sent to the Philippines, said the Government was deliberating the matter and that troops would be prepared ready to depart the moment they were required.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The navy department has bulletined the following report from Commodore Schley.

To the Secretary of the Navy, Washington:

"Made reconnaissance this afternoon, May 31st, with the Massachusetts, Iowa and New Orleans, to develop fortifications with their character.

The fire was returned without delay by the heavy batteries to the east and to the west, with guns of large calibre, long range.

The range was seven thousand yards. Reconnoissance developed satisfactorily the presence of the Spanish squadron lying behind the island near the upper fort as they fired over the hill at random.

Quite satisfied the Spanish fleet is here. (Signed) SCHLEY.
