29 Classes Adjudicated At Music Festival Yesterday

Twenty-nine classes were adjudicated yesterday, the third full day of local and inter-municipal competitions held in the final section of the 1958 Musical Festival. Each of the three distinguished Canadian musicians handling this section of the Festival appeared in one or more of the halls during the day. Dr. Leslie Bell of Toronto adjudicated at each of the three sessions held at Prince of Wales. Mr. George A. Smale, Brampton, Ontario, adjudicated both morning and afternoon sessions held at Queen Charlotte High School, and also the piano finals held at P.W.C. in the evening. Dr. Charles Peaker, Toronto, adjudicated both the morning and afternoon sessions held at the auditorium of Birchwood High School, and the evening session held at Queen Charlotte High School.

CLASS 84 - A mark of 85 earned Fay Edwards of Charlottetown first place in Class 84-Girls Solo, 11 years and under. She was followed in second place by Elaine Bryenton of Brackley with a mark of 84. Placing third was Linda Matheson of North Milton with 83 plus.

Two young ladies, Carol Ann Mary Campbell, Charlottetown and Judy Clow, St. Vincent's Orphanage, tied for first place with a mark of 84 in Class 85-Girls Solo, 9 years and under. Placing second was Barbey Moreside of Charlottetown with 83 plus. Linda Matheson of North Milton was awarded third place with 83.

Platform chairman at Queen Charlotte last evening was Mr. J.L.B. Anderson with Mrs. S.P. Connolly as Platform Secretary. AFTERNOON SESSIONS - Voice Solos, Folk Songs, Piano Solos and Violin Solos echoed through three auditoriums during morning and afternoon sessions of the Musical Festival yesterday in which 66 classes were completed along with the adjudication of 9 preliminaries.

The afternoon session at Birchwood High School saw David MacPherson of St. Vincent's Orphanage take first place over 28 other contestants with his rendition of "Johnny - Jump - Up" - Johnson. David appeared in Class 91-Boys Solo, 8 years and under and 6 received a mark of 86.

A Charlottetown lad, Brian MacPherson was awarded second place with a mark of 85 and placing third was John Carr of Harrington with 84 plus. Appearing in Class 194 - Violin Solo, 16 years and under, Gary Chipman of Charlottetown took first place with a mark of 84. He was followed in second place by David Thompson of West Royalty with 81.

In Class 191-Violin Solo, 10 years and under, Keith MacEachern of Tea Hill placed first in the two entry class with a mark of 85. Second was David Raynor of Mt. Herbert with 82. More Money Is Needed For Housing, Municipal Needs

WATERLOO, Ont. (CP)—Need for more money in two major areas of Canadian life were outlined Thursday by speakers to the annual meeting of the Dominion Mortgage and Investments Association. H. Carl Goldenberg of Montreal set out the needs of municipalities and indicated a further division among the municipalities of the proceeds of federal-provincial taxation, will be necessary. A speech prepared by Stewart Bates, president of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, urged the need for increased funds for housing, and stated that life insurance, trust and loan companies, and banks, should further increase their investment in mortgages.

Mr. Goldenberg stated: "An analysis of municipal finance and taxation in Canada over the last 25 years shows that municipalities cannot be expected to finance on their existing tax base the responsibility which will be forced upon them by the accelerated rate of growth and the enormous requirements for social capital forecast for the next 25 years. "While they may be able to find some new taxes which can be locally administered, these

LONDON (Reuters) - Peter Townsend visited Clarence House, London 1.3 me of Princess Margaret, at teatime Thursday. He arrived there just after Princess Margaret returned from an official engagement in south London. It was his second visit to Clarence House since his return from a world tour last March. A Buckingham Palace spokesman said the first visit, which lasted three hours, was "purely private." The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh were in Holland on a state visit when the first reunion between the 43-year-old Townsend and the 27-year-old princess took place.

Newsprint Output Down In April

MONTREAL (CP) - Canadian newsprint production in April amounted to 522,601 tons, a decrease of 32,245 tons from April, 1957, the National Association of Canada reported Thursday. Shipments were 532,700 tons, a decrease of 5,695 tons from April, 1957. Shipments to the United States were 422,458 tons, 3.2 percent lower than in April, 1957. In the first four months of this year total exports were 1,775,980 tons against 1,930,536 tons.

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Dental Association Again Reindorses Fluoridation

The Dental Association of Prince Edward Island at their annual meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel on Wednesday night reindorsed the resolution on fluoridation published in the Guardian a year ago. They also suggested that the time had now arrived when the City Council of Charlottetown and the Town Council of Summerside should take action and proceed with the fluoridation of their water supply. It was emphasized at the meeting that fluoridation is now generally recognized as being a safe, efficient and economical way of reducing dental cavities, not only in children, but also in adults as well. The opposition to fluoridation has largely died out as the arguments against it have been disproven and the truth accepted that fluoridation really works and is the greatest weapon known to medical and dental science today for the prevention of tooth decay. Dr. G.D. Barrett of Charlottetown was elected president; Dr. R.S. Romoke of Summerside, vice-president; Dr. Heath MacIntyre, Charlottetown, secretary, registrar, treasurer. Dr. A.L.
