ST. JAMES' PICNIC.

Serious Illness of Several Who Attended.

A number of ladies and gentlemen attending the St. James' picnic at Morell yesterday became ill after dinner, and great excitement was caused. Vomiting was the main symptom, accompanied by diarrhoea and great muscular weakness. Severe abdominal pains were also experienced.

Dr. Coffin, who was on the grounds, did all he could for the sufferers in the absence of drugs. Many of those attacked were so greatly distressed as to be helpless and had to be carried on board the train. At Mount Stewart and Charlottetown medical aid was called in. On arriving at Charlottetown those suffering most severely were driven to their homes, where they were attended to. The symptoms indicated ptomaine poisoning, thought to have been caused by canned goods. The occurrence is to be regretted, but it is pleasing to hear that the consequences are not likely to be serious.

PASTEURIZATION OF MILK.

SIR.—It is pleasing to observe that we are having machinery in operation in this city to pasteurize milk for the consumption of inhabitants of this city. Not only will it be beneficial to the adults, but doubly beneficial to the infants and young children who are fed on condensed milk, farinaceous foods and on some of the artificial foods on the market. The high death rate in other countries from gastrointestinal diseases has been greatly reduced by pasteurized milk. No infant should be fed on cow's milk in its raw state, but the milk for their use should be pasteurized as soon as possible after the milking, so as to prevent the multiplication of bacteria and thus prevent the accumulation of their metabolic products. The pathogenic bacteria frequently encountered in milk, and which are a source of great danger to infants, are the ordinary pyogenic cocci; the tubercle bacilli, and virulent colon bacilli as well as the bacillus enteritidis sporogenes which Klein believes to play an active role in the causation of diarrhoea. Cattle having garget should be isolated from the herd and their milk should not be used. The milk of cows suffering from this condition is dangerous and some means should be adopted to see that the cows supplying milk to the city are in a healthy condition. These organisms are most probable also derived from manure and gain in pathogenic power through multiplication in the milk. If the proportion of this institution will guarantee to supply an average of four per cent. butter fat in his milk we are sure this will be a decided improvement on our present supply and we think the city should possess a Babcock milk tester in the hands of some competent person who would test samples of the milk furnished and be a check upon adulteration and skimming. In a report made by Dr. S. E. Getty on June 2nd 1897 before the Alumni Society of Bellevue Hospital from studies made in Youkers, N. Y. in 1896 the result of substituting pasteurized milk for ordinary cow's milk decreased the death rate 47 per cent.

We should gladly hail and welcome this institution in our midst and encourage the proprietor with the full patronage of the city, and it is to be hoped that he will be able to purchase a sufficient supply of milk fresh from the cow in order to immediately bring it under the influence of the pasteurizer. We wish him every success, and trust the venture will prove profitable.

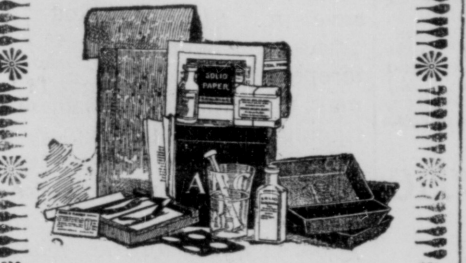
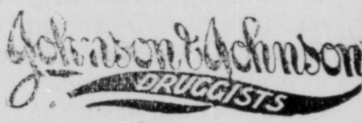
