**Music Festival Entries Close February 1**

The Prince Edward Island Music Festival Association is sending out a call for all musically inclined Islanders to take part in the 1967 Festival, scheduled for April 26 to May 1.

Whether they play the piano, the trumpet or clarinet or other instrument, or like to sing alone or with a group, they should be able to find a class to suit their interests. Dorothy Cullen, convener of the syllabus and music committee stresses the need of getting the syllabus right away in order to have festival entry in by the closing date Feb. 1.

Several changes will be noted in the syllabus this year. The committee has expanded the classes for brass and wind instruments in the hope that the many young people who are members of various bands will take part in the festival.

School choruses have been reorganized in an effort to keep pace with the changing pattern of school enrollment. New classes give regional and senior high schools better opportunities to participate. A minimum has been set for the number of pupils in a school chorus.

Schools that have any difficulty with this requirement because of small enrollment may apply for a change of classification. Classes for adult vocal ensembles, oratorio and operatic solos have not been listed in detail this year, since there have been few entries in these classes may apply to the secretary and a class will be provided if it was announced.

Supt. McNeil said that should any person still possess a badge but wish to retain it he asks that it be loaned to the RCMP so that it may be photographed from which it will be possible to get another made for the museum.

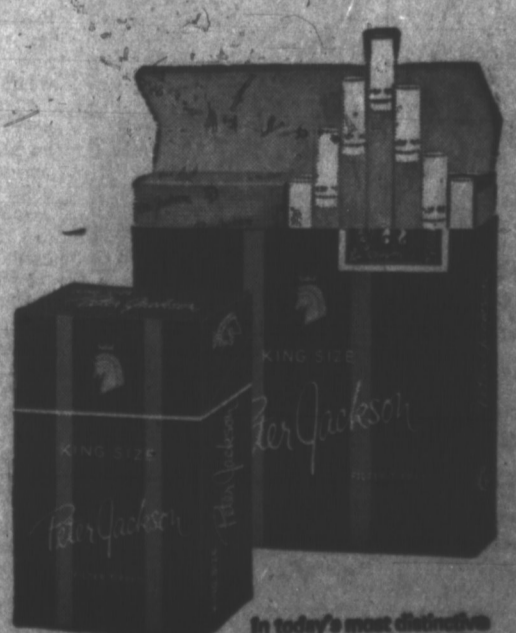
