

### Property Purchased For Mounted Police At Souris

OTTAWA, (Special)—A property in Souris, King's County 85 feet by 200 has been purchased by the Government for use by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. This was revealed in the Commons Thursday by Justice Minister Garson in reply to a question asked by J. Angus MacLean, Conservative M.P. for Queen's.

Vendor of the property was Mrs. Edna St. John and total cost of \$2,265. Mr. Garson did not offer any further information as to the type of the establishment to be built in Souris for the R.C.M.P. but police authorities here said the building is well under way.

It will be the standard type of building for an R.C.M.P. detachment with living quarters, offices and a lock-up. The building will be completed some time this summer or early fall.

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Grandma Nannie Doss was sentenced to life imprisonment Thursday for poisoning her fifth husband, Samuel Doss. District Judge Elmer Adams who pronounced sentence, had the choice of giving the giggling, chewing 45-year-old woman death in the electric chair or life. Mrs. Doss had admitted giving lethal doses of rat poisoning to four of her five husbands. She recently cancelled her pending murder trial by entering a surprise guilty plea to having killed Doss.

### QUICK CHANGES

MONTREAL (CP)—A Bristol Sycamore helicopter, due to arrive today in the freighter Gloucester City, will be assembled on the waterfront and will be flown immediately to Toronto for the International Trade Fair.
