

Braves Beat Giants In Slugfest; Chi-Sox Win

The red-hot Chicago White Sox rolled to their 12th victory in the last 24 games Wednesday, defeating the Boston Red Sox 6-2 to protect their impressive first-place lead in the American League.

In two other afternoon games, one in each league, the Detroit Tigers edged out the Washington Senators 3-2 in 11 innings and the Milwaukee Braves took a 9-8 verdict from the New York Giants in a three-hour and two-minute slugfest that produced nine home runs.

Dick Donovan went the distance for the White Sox, scattering eight hits for his fourth straight victory and fifth complete game. His record now is 5-1.

A throwing error by Red Sox shortstop Billy Klaus gave the winners two unearned runs in the fifth for a 3-2 lead, leading to the downfall of righthander Tom Brewer.

WILLIAMS 401
The White Sox collected 11 hits, two each by Luis Aparicio, Nellie Fox, Sherman Lollar and Dave Philley. Ted Williams banged a single and a double for Boston to raise his average to .401.

Bill Tuttle's single scored Al Kaline, who had doubled, to drive in the winning run for Detroit and give Paul Foytack relief. Both pitchers were working in relief. It was the sixth victory for Foytack, who rescued starter Frank Lary after the senators had tied the score in the ninth.

Six homers failed to help the

Giants, who outlit the winning Braves 9. Eleven bases on balls by five Giant pitchers and a passed ball by catcher Ray Katz in the eighth proved disastrous. The passed ball came with Jim Davis on the mound and allowed Bob Malkmus to score what proved to be the winning run. The rookie second baseman had opened the eighth with a triple, his first major league hit in 14 official times at bat.

The victory went to relief pitcher Ernie Johnson although he needed help from Taylor Phillips in the ninth after the Giants had put the potential tying and winning runs on bases with one out. Phillips struck out pinch hitter Andre Rogers and disposed of Whitey Lockman on a grounder to end the game.

Hank Sauer and Red Schoendienst hit two homers each for the Giants and Willie Mays and Lockman contributed solo smashes. Pitcher Johnson and Joe Adcock hit three-run homers for Milwaukee and Bobby Thomson chipped in with a four-bagger.

The national record for most home runs by two teams is 10. It was last accomplished by Cincinnati (8) and Milwaukee (2) last August. The American League record was established by the Detroit (5) and New York Yankees (6) in August of 1950. **JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP)**—Sophomore Don Drysdale gained his first major league shut out tonight, striking out nine and giving up five hits as the Brooklyn Dodgers won their third in a row with

a 4-0 victory over the last place Chicago Cubs. Gino Cimoli drove in two runs for the Brooks, with his sacrifice fly breaking up a duel between Drysdale and young Don Kaiser in the sixth.

Drysdale, a 20-year-old righthander who now has a 5-2 record, struck out five in a row while protecting a 1-0 lead before the Dodgers broke out for three runs with two out in the eighth. He walked only two. Chicago has been handed 22 strikeouts in two nights by Dodger pitching.

Kaiser, a 22-year-old righthander struck out four and gave up six of the Dodgers' 11 hits before giving way to a pinch-hitter in the eighth.

Takes Slick Talking To Get US Stars In Canada

MONTREAL (CP)—It takes psychology, connections, a thick bankroll and some slick talking to football stars to play in Canada, says Doug (Peahead) Waker, Coach of the Montreal Alouettes in the Big Four Football Union. Even then I was afraid some of those other coaches might come a-bustin' in and carry the players off with my pen in their hands and no signature on the contract. They'd do it, too, those burglars."

Crepello Wins Epsom Derby

EPSOM DOWN, England (CP)—Crepello won the 178th Derby for England Wednesday, and stamped himself the healthiest "cripple" in any man's racing stable.

They said he was lame, they claimed he was a coughing victim, and they couldn't see him going the Derby distance. But Crepello

the cripple came lunging home confounding rumor mongers who tried to "knock" the favorite. At the end he was a comfortable 1 1/2 lengths ahead of Irish-bred Ballymoss, a 33-to-1 shot, with Greek-owned Pipe of Peace, 100-to-8, another two lengths away in the field of 22 three-year-olds, France's four-ply challenge faded and the Queen's Douteille was

10th. Crepello, handsome chestnut son of Donatello II, thus gave his 75-year-old owner, Sir Victor Sassoon, and jockey Lester Piggott, their second Derby triumph. Sassoon won with Plaza in 1953 and Piggott was aboard Never Say Die in 1954.

Crepello was a 6-to-4 shot the best-backed horse since Bahram in 1956. His time over hard-baked 1 1/2 miles at Epsom was 2:35.4, fastest since Bahram. Several hundred thousand spectators jammed this picturesque U-shaped Surrey course in fine weather for the big race that has become one of Britain's oldest sporting institutions, and which

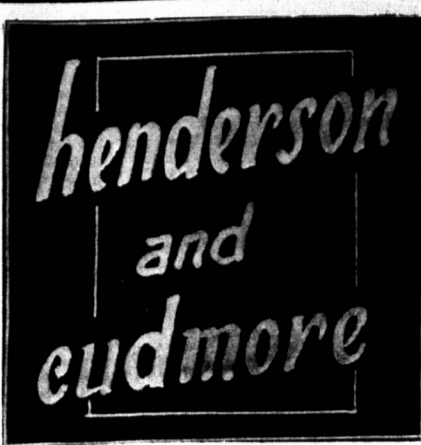
the statesman Disraeli called the blue-riband of the turf, he Queen other members of the royal family and Prime Minister macmillan were in the crowd.

For all, the throbbing question was whether Crepello could do it—whether the big chestnut colt would live up to his reputation or prove just another morning glory. Last week racecourse rumors—possibly inspired by bookmakers tired of taking wagers on the favorite, boosted the odds, but reassuring word, from Crepello's connections sent the price tumbling again. Piggott, Britain's "boy wonder" of post-war racing said he knew he was going to win all the way. "Everything went right," he said. "I had a perfect run. If any-

thing had challenged in the last half mile, Crepello could have gone a little faster." Crepello had been made the heavy betting choice on the strength of his victory May 1 in the 2,000 Guineas, his only other start of the year.

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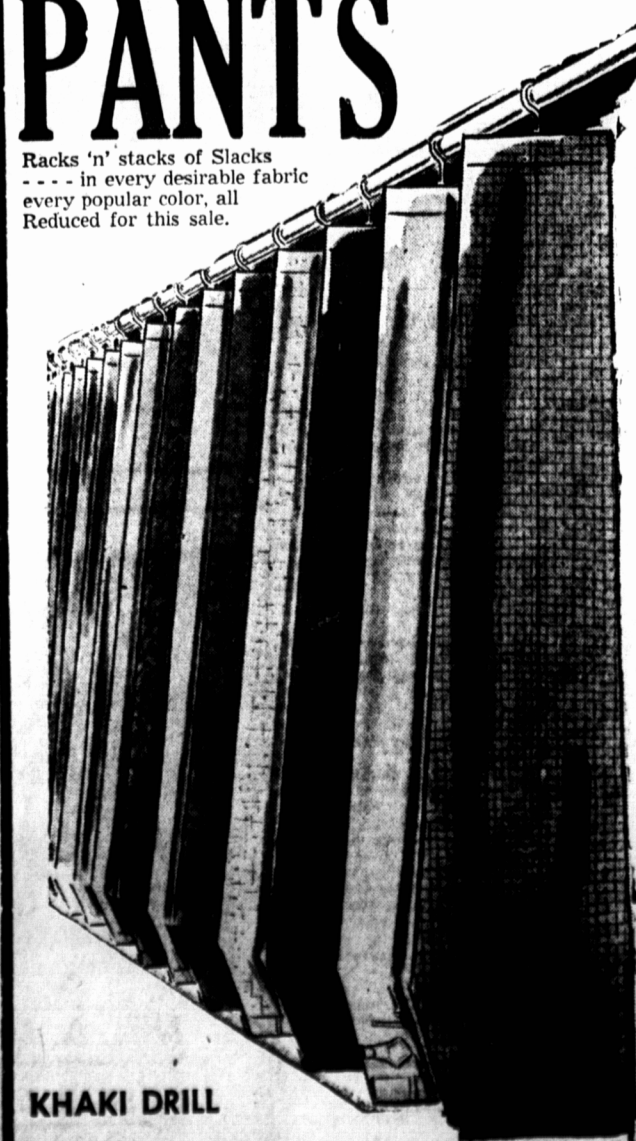
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
