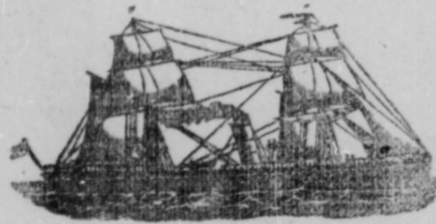

SENATE REFORM.

It is stated—perhaps with truth—that the "Senate Reform Resolutions" proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier were laughed at by the Liberal caucus. Certainly they struck at the fundamental principle of the Limited Government which requires that each of the three estates composing Parliament shall be independent in its action, as well as that all three shall consent, to the passage of every act of Parliament,—and were, consequently, ridiculous. In its issue of July 22 the London Spectator refers to Laurier's scheme of Senate reform, and says: "Such questions must of course be decided by the will of the Canadian people, but we cannot help hoping that, on consideration, Canada will abandon this scheme for settling disputes between the two Houses, and adopt that which has found favor in Australia, under which a poll of the people is taken to settle a conflict between the Upper and Lower Houses. In a dispute between servants the appeal should be to the master,—i.e., to the whole body of the electors. We are quite aware that regular party politicians always dislike this plan; but that is a recommendation rather than the reverse." In this the Spectator puts admirably the principle of the matter; and everyone must see that Sir Wilfrid was well advised by the Liberal caucus when his proposal to overcome the vote of the Senate was laughed at and metaphorically kicked out of the House of Commons by the Liberal caucus. The nonsensical idea will not be revived.

THE OPPOSITION AND HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE.

The Guardian now says that it is "not at all sorry for anything that it expressed or implied" in regard to the Opposition's position on the Hillsborough Bridge question. Well, it ought to be sorry; for the article, unintentionally or otherwise, conveyed to its readers an entirely false impression.

The Guardian now asks "what would the present prospect of the construction of bridge and railway be worth if the Opposition had succeeded in defeating the Government's plan?" As the Opposition could not and did not defeat the Government's plan, the question need not be considered. The Opposition performed its constitutional duty of criticising the Government's plan; and the Government's plan was carried as a matter of course. If the Opposition's plan could have been carried, the Hillsborough Bridge would have been provided,—and the tax payer's of the Province would not have been compelled to pay on account of it \$12,000 a year for all time to come. But the Opposition could not carry out its plan, any more than it could hinder the Government from passing a bad license law for Charlottetown! The Guardian's deceptive remarks about the Opposition's vote on the bridge question are, consequently, the more remarkable.

—At the present time France is easily maintaining the premier position which is hers by right as having first seriously started the automobile industry. Germany and England were later in the field, and the United States has been the last country to take up this new industry in earnest. Judging from the large amount of capital which is being invested, we may look for very rapid developments in the next two years.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The old Liberals of Ontario have put their foot down and said that the Hon. John Costigan shall not enter the Liberal Cabinet. Sir Wilfrid Laurier—whose position is not so strong as it used to be—must perforce, submit.

—Mr. Astor's naturalization as a British subject is the cause of a great fuss in the States. Some of the Republican Unionists had him burned in patriots of New York. States shall be fleety. When the Unionists will come a really great country they will not allow themselves to be perturbed by such incident as the loss of a citizen, however prominent he may be.

—It is claimed for the Marchand Government that its surplus on the last financial year's operations is \$23,000. Quebec newspapers print a circular from the Department of Lands, Forests and Fisheries, which shows that the employees of that branch of the public service did not get their salaries for June, owing to the appropriation running out. The Montreal Gazette remarks that if the other departments are in the same fix, the nature of the "surplus" will be understood. It simply represents the cash that should have been paid to the public servants, and when these are paid the surplus will be gone. The Liberals of Quebec have apparently borrowed one of the "ideas" from their fellow office holders in this Province.

—It is pointed out by Mr. Davin that whatever Mr. Sifton may be himself, he certainly has an extraordinary collection of friends. One of his cronies is W. T. R. Preston of "Hug the Machine" fame. To Preston he is so much attached that he says nothing can deprive the campaigner of his \$3,000 job, with expenses thrown in. Preston's job which was given to him just after the West Elgin affair, is a tour through Europe at the public expense with an interpreter and a valet. While on his trip he is supposed to be inspecting emigration agencies; but of course he is having a right good time, for which the producers of Canada are paying. Preston was evidently weary after his campaign in West Huron, South Ontario, and elsewhere for Mr. Hardy; and the Federal Government turned in to give him a holiday at the expense of the people. The case reminds Mr. Davin of the verse which tells us that

"Mrs. Gill is very ill, Nothing can improve her, Unless she sees the Turries, And waddles through the Louvre."

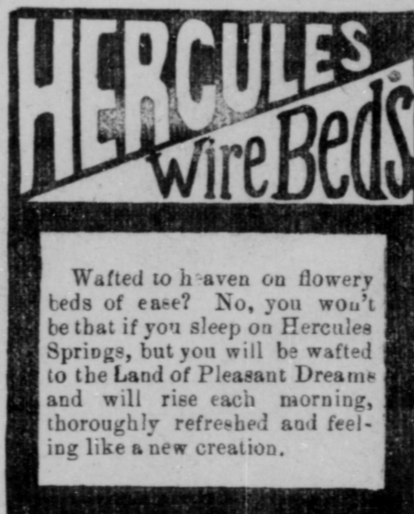
