Brazilian Traction Declares Dividend

TORONTO — (CP) — Brazilian Traction, Light and Power Co., Ltd., Tuesday declared a dividend of 1-20th of a share and three cents cash, payable Jan. 5 to shareholders of record Nov. 12.

The part-stock, part-cash dividend is being paid instead of the 50-cent half-yearly cash dividend ordinarily paid at this time.

The stock-cash dividend is similar to the one paid a year ago and in both cases resulted from foreign exchange regulations in Brazil.

Earlier this year the company paid a half-yearly dividend of 50 cents, and Henry Borden, president, said he believed a cash dividend could be continued at least through 1954.

Events in Brazil, however, including the death of President Vargas and new financial stringencies, changed the picture.

EIGHT-CENT VALUE

The stock-cash dividend approximates in book value the cash dividend it replaces. For income-tax purposes the dividend will be valued at eight cents a share, five cents for the 1-20th of a share portion, and three cents for the cash.

Mr. Borden, in a statement accompanying the dividend announcement, said that Brazil's export trade, which had contributed so much to the substantial and fundamental improvement in Brazil's over-all exchange picture in the first five months of the year, had declined seriously in both volume and value in the past several months and the trend had not yet been reversed.

"As a result," he continued, "Brazilian authorities, while adhering scrupulously to their financial and exchange commitments to us, have had to introduce further changes in Brazil's exchange procedures which adversely affect and presumably, for some time, will continue so to affect our overall financial position."

Eskimos Go Through Stiff Drill For Game

EDMONTON (CP)—Coach Frank (Pop) Ivy sent his Edmonton Eskimos through a stiff drill Tuesday night in preparation for the Western Interprovincial Football Union's playoff finals opening here Saturday night.

Winnipeg Blue Bombers, 27-25 winners over Saskatchewan Roughriders in the semi-final, meet Eskimos in the best-of-three final with the second game in Winnipeg Nov. 11 and the third, if necessary, in Edmonton Nov. 13.

Most Edmonton players appeared to prefer having to meet Winnipeg in the final.

TLC Critical No Fall Session of Parliament

OTTAWA (CP)—The Trades and Labor Congress of Canada has criticized the federal government for not calling a fall session of Parliament to deal with unemployment problems.

The leading editorial in the TLC's monthly journal says that, with the convening of Parliament deferred until early 1955, no action will be taken to improve unemployment insurance provisions until next summer.

(Amendments to the Insurance Act now are in preparation. Labor department officials hope to get them into operation in time to take care of any abnormal employment situation this winter.)

"There are changes that should have been made to improve the Unemployment Insurance Act before we again run into another epidemic of unemployment," the TLC says, "and it was generally expected—in fact agreed—that action in such direction would be taken before another winter."

It adds that rates of benefit payments are too low and the period of payments far too short to take care of "a severe and long depression as we had last winter."

"No fall session of Parliament," it says, "means no action to be taken on enacting the necessary amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act until the summer of 1955."

"We are astounded at the unconcern displayed in the well-being of the many hundreds of thousands who now live in fear of unemployment."

Polio Victim Is Skillful Designer

CHETICAMP, N.S. (CP)—Marie Antoinette Deveau is a skillful dress designer, first class milliner and also makes hats whose lacy tracings have attracted buyers in the United States.

Marie has spent 40 of her 46 years in a wheelchair.

She was a tot of six and a school child for only three days when polio struck and fashioned for her a life in a wheelchair.

Miss Deveau could never dance or run with the kids but she called on a native talent to become one of the most accomplished artisans of Cape Breton island where the hardy people are proud of their skills.

She can finish, remodel or alter a suit with the perfection and polish of a professional tailor. But her principal output has been hooked hats. They adorn private homes and public buildings in many cities of the United States and Canada.

Her work is done with a simple hook made from a nail sharpened to a point. She copies designs from postcards, water color sketches, magazines and color prints but can also produce an original design.

Marie speaks French in a soft, musical voice, like many of her fellow Cape Bretoners on this northwest coast of the island.
