

THE JEWISH BURYING-GROUND JERUSALEM.—Returning along the valley of Jehoshaphat, and passing along its eastern sides, we came to the great burying-ground of the Jews. It looks more like a paved court and I walked over it without at first perceiving it. Among the monuments are four unique in their appearance and construction, known from time immemorial as the tombs of Absalom, Jehoshaphat, St. James, and the prophet Zechariah. All are cut out of the solid rock. The tomb of Absalom is a single stone as large as an ordinary two-story house, and ornamented with twenty-four semicolumns of the Doric order, supporting a triangular pyramidal top. The top is battered and defaced, and no one, whether Muslim, Jew, or Christian, ever passes through the Valley of Jehoshaphat without casting a stone at the sepulchre of the rebellious son.—No regular entrance to it has ever been discovered; and the only way of getting into the interior is by a hole broken for the purpose in one of the sides. Notwithstanding the specific names given to the tombs, it is altogether uncertain to what age they belong; and it is generally considered that the style of architecture precludes the supposition that they are the work of Jewish builders.—*Literary Travels.*
