

MCA Commences New Cargo Passenger Service To North

A new scheduled airline passenger and cargo service one that will fly over 3,000 miles into Canada's northland on each round trip, was commenced this past week by Maritime Central Airways from its Moncton, N.B. base.

The service will be operated on a weekly basis and will serve Moncton, Stephenville, Nfld., Goose Bay and Sagak, Labrador and Frobisher, N.W.T.

With the exception of Canada's trans-continental air services, the new northline operation will account for more air hours per round trip than any other scheduled flight in the country. Hot meals will be served on all flights and the aeroplanes will be fitted out with sleeping quarters for two complete crews that will be needed for the long flights.

On hand for the inaugural flight on the new service were H. S. Jones, operations manager for M.C.A. and Roland Langlois, inspector of civil aviation for the Department of Transport.

M.C.A. will use Douglas DC-4 Skyliners for the flights which have been equipped for rapid conversion to passenger or cargo aircraft as the need arises.

The northline service will make connections at Goose Bay for the Newfoundland traffic going to Sagak and Frobisher and will connect with T. C. A. at Moncton on the return journey for Upper Canada and points in the U.S.A.

The service will cater to the personnel and supply movements of the many construction companies and military units operating in Canada's northland. Among their organizations are the U.S.A.F., Drake-Merritt Limited, Peter Kiewit Construction Limited and the Department of Transport of the federal government.

The flights will leave Moncton on Wednesday of each week, stop at the enroute points, and arrive at Frobisher, N. W. T., late the same night. They will leave this northern base early on Thursday mornings and arrive back in Moncton late Thursday afternoon.

As a measure of its general expansion program in the north, Maritime Central is endeavoring to open up the northern bases to the labor and supply markets of the Atlantic Provinces.

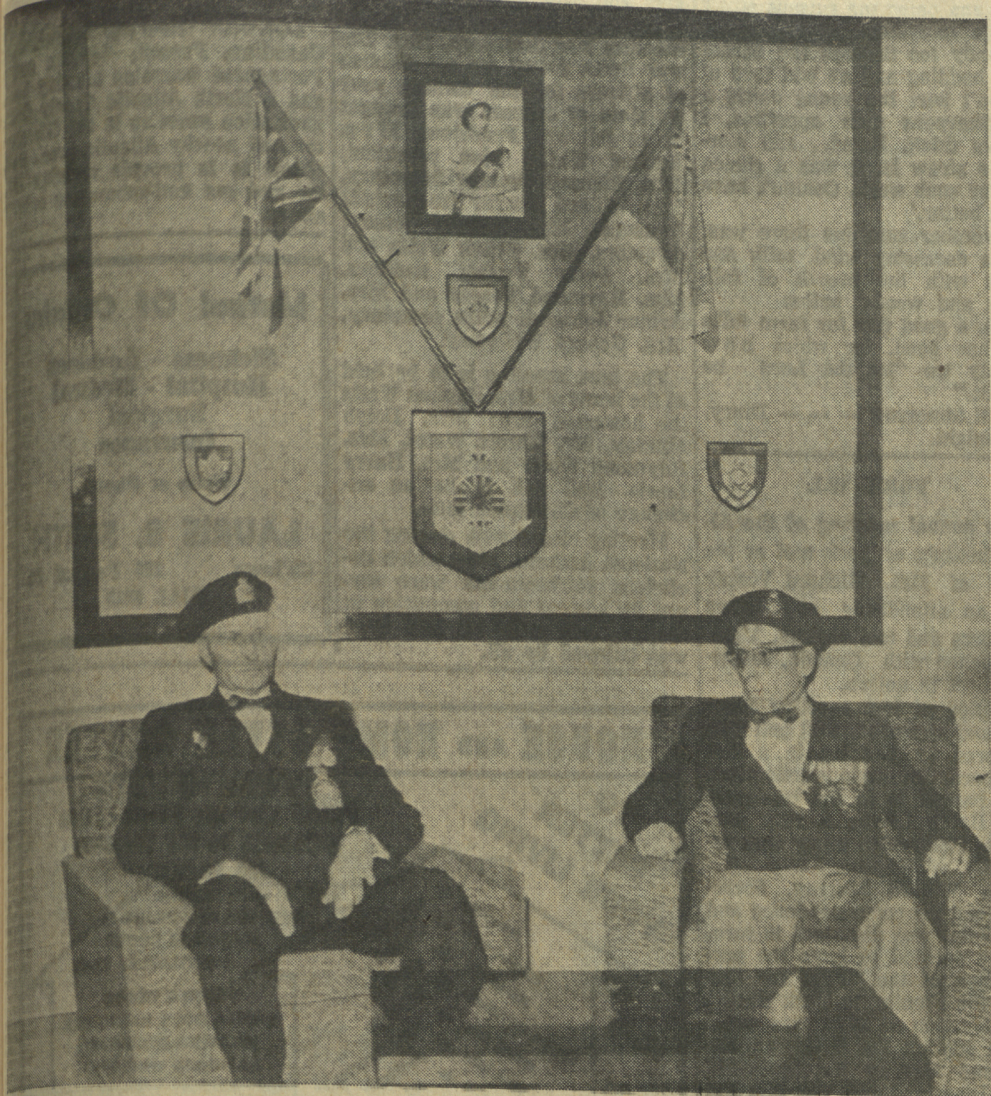

14 Pulp, Paper Companies Fined Total Of \$65,000

MONTREAL (CP) — Fourteen pulp and paper products manufacturers were fined a total of \$65,000 Wednesday after pleading guilty to conspiracy to fix and control prices of paper products in violation of anti-competitive legislation.

Twelve of the corporations admitted operating illegal price control machinery from 1934 to 1935 and two others pleaded guilty to charges covering the years 1934 and 1944.

Mr. Justice Wilfrid Lazure of the Court of Queen's Bench said he was apportioning the fines in approximate relation to the respective production of the accused companies and to the duration of their participation in the conspiracy in restraint of free competition.

The penalties are:

- Price Brothers Company Limited and Beaver Wood Pulp Company Limited, fines of \$10,000 each;
- Fraser Companies Limited and Bathurst Power and Paper Company Limited, \$7,000 each;
- Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited and E. B. Eddy Company, \$5,000 each;
- Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Co. Limited, \$4,000;
- St. Lawrence Corporation Limited, Howard Smith Paper Mills Limited, Gair and Company of Canada Limited and Hinde and Finch Paper Company of Canada Limited, \$3,000 each;
- Miller Brothers Company Limited and Strathcona Paper Company Limited, \$1,500 each, and Minas

Anglican Church In Canada Starts Monthly Newspaper

TORONTO (CP) — The Anglican Church in Canada Wednesday launched its first national newspaper.

The Canadian Churchman, previously a twice-monthly magazine with a circulation of 7,000, now will be published only once a month but will have newspaper format and a circulation of more than 180,000.

SUBSIDIZED BY CHURCH

The church will provide a subsidy of \$62,000 a year until 1961. The first issue will appear in January.

Its new editor, Rev. A. G. Baker, told 114 delegates to the annual meeting of the executive council of the General Synod of the Anglican Church Wednesday: "It will be the church's national voice."

He appealed for support for the newspaper, and told bishops, priests and laymen: "The biggest obstacle to almost every national program of the church is the clergy."

"Clergymen discussing the paper with me have said if a thing is worthwhile it needs no promotion; but we must promote this new paper."

He said he heard numerous complaints about the religious and secular press.

"Churches do not feel they get enough attention," he said, "but newspaper men say the church does not produce news. The church fails to establish proper contact with the press."

Mr. Baker, 30, was born in Saint John, N.B., and grew up in Truro, N.S. He is a bachelor of music and of divinity of the University of Toronto, and is a former rector of Uxbridge, Ont.

In other business, delegates were told that caravan missions of the church—vans staffed by women missionaries who conduct bible study classes in isolated areas—are having problems.
