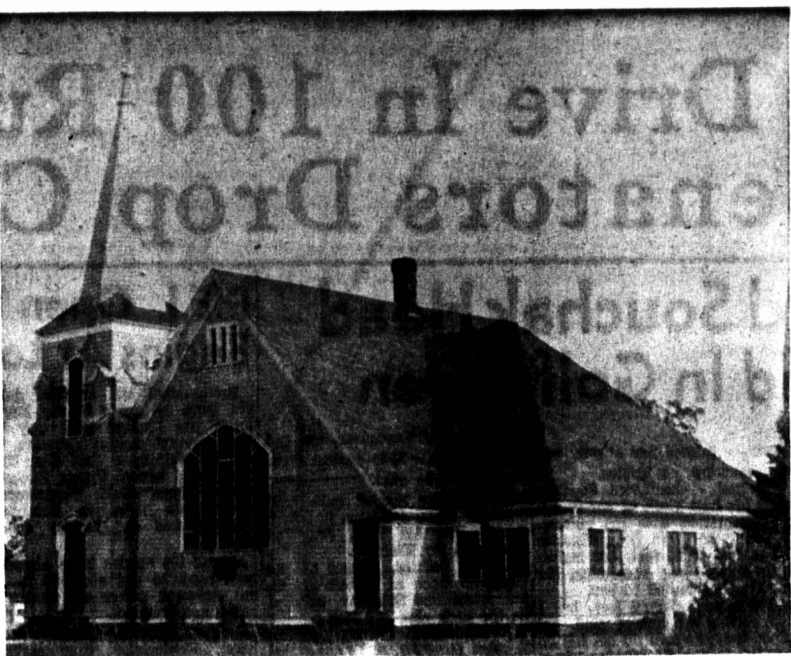

33rd ANNIVERSARY OF CHURCH

Lower Montague United Church will celebrate the thirty-third anniversary of its dedication next Sunday, August 28, with services at 2:30 and 7:30 p.m. (Standard Time). Church history in this community goes back to an early time. Dr. James MacGregor, the noted Scottish Presbyterian pioneer, preached in this area in 1793. Rev. Roderick MacAuley was settled in 1837 as minister of Murray Harbor and Three Rivers, the latter comprising Georgetown, Cardigan and Montague districts. A contribution list for his salary in 1837 still exists, showing names and amounts. There is also a list for 1841, and one also for Rev. Hugh Ross in 1863. Rev. James Bulpitt was the great Methodist pioneer in the surrounding districts. All who came to the area in 1807, and preaching at times in the Montague area. At a later time there were several other churches, Methodist and Presbyterian, in Lower Montague. These became one in 1922, and the present church, the first United Church in this Province, was dedicated on September 17, 1922. Recently the interior of the church has been redecorated, and new electric light fixtures installed. Next Sunday at 2:30 (Standard), Rev. A. T. MacDonald, B. A., B. D., of New Glasgow, N. S., will be the guest preacher, with music by the Murray River trio, and the choir of Trinity Church, Montague. At 7:30 (Standard), Rev. F. MacKinnon, B. Says Decision To Put Brake On Optimism

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Times says the Eisenhower administration has reached a policy decision "to put a brake on the optimism created by the Big Four conference last month at Geneva." That is the meaning of the President Eisenhower's speech before the American Bar Association at Philadelphia Wednesday says a Washington dispatch by James Reston. The story notes that the speech emphasized that the "spirit of Geneva," if it is to be "genuine and not spurious," must not be used to justify the division of Germany, the enslavement of the satellites or the activities of subversive communism.

The story adds that Eisenhower's speech represents a step toward the national security council after widespread indications that the "Geneva spirit" was being regarded in some Allied and neutral countries not as a means to a general European settlement, but as an end in itself. Accordingly, Eisenhower and State Secretary Dulles decided that it was time for a public warning. That warning was that the United States government regarded the more friendly attitude at Geneva as a first step toward the reunification of Germany, the extension of freedom to the satellites and the abolition of anti-American propaganda by the Communist apparatus.

It now is being made clear in Washington that Eisenhower's speech represents the basis of the instructions that Dulles will take to Geneva in October when he meets with the Soviet, British and French foreign ministers. Their task will be to follow up the July meeting of the Big Four heads of government.

LETHBRIDGE, Alta. (CP)—It's enough to make an old-time cowman turn in his grave and stretch a bony hand for a six-gun. There's talk of letting them varmints, sheep, run on the same range with cattle. Experiments at the Stately grassland experimental station of the federal department of agriculture indicate that for the foothills area of southern Alberta, that's actually the best thing for the grassland. Sheep like the finer grasses and various weeds, and cattle prefer bolom-land and gentle slopes, and sheep can be grazed on fairly steep slopes. Ranges that are weedy through excessive cattle grazing may be helped back to grass by a selective grazing program using sheep. That's what the experiments indicate, anyway.

LOANS TO REPAIR DEFENCE PLANTS DENVER, Colo. (AP)—President Eisenhower Thursday approved a program providing up to \$800,000 in federal loans to repair or replace defence plants damaged in the northeastern U.S. floods. The president signed an executive order at his vacation headquarters authorizing the emergency program.

C.N.R. Revenue Shows Increase

MONTREAL (CP)—Net revenue of the publicly-owned Canadian National Railways in the first seven months of this year showed an increase of \$26,404,000, it was announced Thursday. Operating revenues in the seven-month period totalled \$380,640,000 while operating expenses amounted to \$350,578,000. In the corresponding period of 1954, operating revenues were \$369,981,000 and operating expenses, \$364,324,000. The figures exclude taxes, equipment rentals and fixed charges. In July, operating revenues were \$57,913,000 and operating expenses, \$51,694,000, leaving net revenue of \$6,219,000, compared with \$3,353,700 in July, last year.

Carries Machine in Lunch Can ROUYN, Que. (CP)—Police accused a man Wednesday of taking heavy pumping equipment piece by piece from the Quemon gold mine at which he worked and carrying it home in his lunch pail. The charged Marc Gratton, 31-year-old welder, with theft. Police said the underground equipment was gradually dismantled daily for three years. They said they found it assembled in the basement of Gratton's home. They added that more than \$1,000 worth of the material was hidden under the stairs. Inquest Held In Death Of Gaspereaux Man In Drowning Accident

A coroner's jury inquiring into the death of Ivan Steele of Gaspereaux, found that he came to his death at Gaspereaux by drowning as the result of a boat capsizing, with no blame attached to the second party in the boat. Mr. G. S. A. Inman presided over the inquest and Mr. Nicholson represented the Crown. Mr. Nicholson read the autopsy report of Dr. L. E. Prowse which showed that there were no marks of external violence, that the lungs were filled with fluid, and that in his opinion death was due to drowning in salt water. Mr. Gerald Acorn, Charlotteown, stated that on August 7th he was at the home of Harold Butler and there he met Ivan Steele. He examined the boat, which was about 12 feet long and four feet wide, and leaked on the sides and bottom. There were no seats in the boat, he said. The jury was then instructed by the Coroner and brought in the verdict given above.
