Preliminary Hearing Resumed In Criminal Negligence Case

The preliminary hearing in the case of John A. Bell, charged with criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle was continued at R. C. M. P. Headquarters, Charlottetown on the night of Friday, May 4. He said that he received a telephone call from Mr. Long at 10:45 p. m. informing him of the accident. He then called two radio cars to go to the scene and also a St. John's ambulance. Sgt. Peter F. Austin, R. C. M. P., said that he was the first member of the police to arrive at the scene and that he saw two other men there in addition to the injured man. Asked by Mr. Nicholson if he had seen a beer can containing broken glass, which was produced by the Crown, witness said that he had seen the carton at the scene lying on the ground at the right side of the wrecked car. Taking it into his possession, he retained it until Sgt. Davis arrived to take it. He said that he did not see the ambulance at the P. E. I. Hospital, where he talked to the accused who said that he was the driver and owner of the car and that his passenger was Carmody. On cross examination witness said that he was at the office when the call came in and left as soon as he was informed of the location of the accident. He found the accused lying on the ground near the left side of the vehicle and Carmody near the right side. Both men were conscious. "Can you identify the carton," asked Mr. Trainor witness replied "That is the carton I gave to Sgt. Davis."

PHOTOGRAPHS PRODUCED

Sgt. Donald Davis, R. C. M. P., said that he received the call when in a police car in the vicinity of Queen's County Jail. He immediately went to the scene, stopping to pick measuring equipment at the headquarters on the way. On his arrival he was handed a beer can by Sgt. Austin, which he placed in the back seat of the police car. The Crown then produced a number of photographs of a scene in which the witness was asked to identify some of the objects which appeared in them. He said that the accused was lying on the ground at the driver's side of the car. He was on his back and conscious the witness went around to the other side and he later found injured men whom he later found out to be Carmody. He was also conscious, but at no time did he appear to move his lower limbs. On questioning, Sgt. Davis said that he smelled the odor of alcoholic liquor from Carmody and from the person of the accused, but in the case of the latter he could not tell if it was from his breath or clothing. There was also a strong smell of liquor from the inside of the car. Witness said that at a date a number of days after the accident he had driven a police car up the bank at the spot where the accused's car had left the road and continued on to the Borden Ferry and the speedometer had recorded a distance of 23 and nine-tenths miles. The following morning said that he had gone to the hospital in company with Sgt. MacDonald to converse with the two men. On the Sunday afternoon they went back to the hospital when a statement was taken from the accused. On questioning witness stated that the accused had been given the statutory warning by Sgt. MacDonald and Bell said that he understood.

DEBATE STATEMENT

Assistant solicitor Thomas Coker Jr., said bigamy charges would be filed against Joseph Phelps, 28. Helen Phelps said in her divorce suit that she left Phelps last September after five months of marriage because he beat her. Eunice Phelps said Phelps took her to Georgia and married her last May 12. She also said she was beaten. Phelps lives in Fort Lauderdale and operates a motor scooter business in Pampano Beach.

COST OF LIVING INDEX UNCHANGED

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's cost of living index remained unchanged in April, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. Decreases in food and household operation costs were counteracted by slight increases for shelter, clothing and other commodities and services to keep the index unchanged at 116.6. A year ago the index, based on 1949 prices equalling 100, was 116.4 at May 1, 1954, it was 115.5. The food index declined in April to 109.3 from 109.7. Lower prices were reported for tomatoes, coffee, some fresh vegetables and meats. Prices were higher for eggs, fresh and canned fruits, potatoes and most cuts of beef. Both rent and home-ownership components contributed to the upward movement of the shelter index to 132.1 from 131.9. Slight increases in footwear and children's wear were partially offset by a decrease in women's spring coats so that the clothing index moved up only to 108.8 from 108.7. The household operation index dropped to 116.5 from 116.8 under the influence of a seasonal decrease in coal prices and lower insurance rates for household of

Baby Whooping Crane Vanishes

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—One of the two rare whooping cranes hatched in Audubon Park last week, has disappeared. Officials at the zoo said Monday they feared a hawk or an owl swooped into the cage during the weekend and made off with the baby crane which came from egg No. 16 hatched Friday. George Douglas, park superintendent, said he stood watch over the cage since the eggs first appeared more than a month ago, said the top of the cage is being covered with wire to protect the remaining chick. The loss of chick No. 2 reduces the known world crane population to 31. Besides Crip, Jo and their offspring, 28 other cranes have been counted at the Aransas refuge in Texas, where the non-captive birds spend the winter.

Ease Restrictions On Trade With Communist China

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain revealed Monday she has given all her colonies discretion to export to Communist China goods of potential military value now allowed to Russia. The foreign office here made this disclosure shortly after the governments of Malaya and Singapore announced they would authorize "reasonable" sales of rubber, one of their main products, to Communist China. The decision represents the first big break Britain has made from the embargo of strategic goods imposed by the United Nations allies in May, 1951, after Red China entered the Korean war. This list is far more extensive than that now in effect on shipping to Russia and her eastern European allies. Britain argued unsuccessfully for months with her allies to bring the two lists into alignment. Mal opponent to the plan was the United States. BRITAIN ACTS ALONE Prime Minister Eden informed President Eisenhower during his mission to Washington in February that Britain might be forced to act alone if the United States refused to approve a relaxation of the ban on trade with Communist China. It was understood the president replied he could not agree to a joint policy with Britain on modifying the embargoes.

Work Starts On New Island Furriers Limited Building

Work is scheduled to start today on the construction of a modern fire-proof building of reinforced concrete and cement blocks and steel for the Island Furriers Ltd. in the downtown business area. The contract, which has been let to the Island Construction Company, calls for the completion of the new building in every respect and ready for occupation by the end of September. Located on Grafton St. just around the corner of Queen Street, adjoining the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the building will be of two storeys and cover an area with a frontage of 46 feet running back to a depth of 30 feet. Provision is made to devote the entire ground floor to the requirements of a modern furrier establishment with ample space for display and the adjacent work-room facilities. The upper floor will be fitted throughout for modern offices with an exclusive ground floor entrance apart from the store entrance area. A ten-foot basement covering most of the building area will contain a specially constructed cold storage vault equipped with double tier racks capable of carrying more than 3,000 garments in safe and effective summer storage. A sprinkler system is to be installed as an additional safeguard notwithstanding the fireproof construction of the entire plant. Fixed windows of thermopane will also be used throughout, and the most modern fixtures installed in the main store, vault and work-room as well as in the offices section on the second floor. The building will be faced with a 22 foot show window G. Keith Pickard of Charlottetown is the architect.

167 Nominations For Election In Saskatchewan

REGINA (CP)—A total of 167 candidates were in the field Monday when nominations in all but one of the 49 ridings closed for the provincial election June 20. With a likelihood of three candidates being named in far-northern Athabask. constituency, where nominations close June 18, the overall total will surpass by one the record 169 candidates who contested the 1954 provincial election, when the Liberals won office. This time, the Saskatchewan electorate has a choice of three parties which have enough candidates in the running to form the administration—the CCF and Social Credit, which each named full states of 52 Monday, and the Liberals, who named 51. Each of these parties is expected to contest the Athabaska seat in voting positions to July 4 because of the slow spring breakup.

Plan Gas From Coal Underground

LONDON, (Reuters) — Britain will build a pilot plant to produce gas from coal burning underground, Fuel Minister Aubrey Jones told the House of Commons Monday. He said the state-owned coal and electricity industries had accepted responsibility for this from July 1. Private enterprise would be associated with the work. The gas would be used to generate electricity, Jones said. In tests at two sites over the last six years nearly 5,000 tons of coal have been converted to gas. The trials consisted of passing air through a coal seam burning under controlled conditions.
