THE PORTFOLIO OF AGRICULTURE.

Some of the papers of the Upper Provinces have lately circulated rumors of a contemplated change in the office of Minister of Agriculture. In view of these rumors, the Watchman a short ago published a very forcible editorial article in advocacy of the appointment to the position of Hon. Donald Ferguson. We are glad to note that this suggestion has been well received by the press of the neighboring Provinces. Thus the St. John Sun, received this morning, refers to the Watchman's article, and says: "The farming interests have received more and more attention at the hands of the government, and at present occupy the attention of a large staff of practical men. The recent activity in the cheese and butter industry has been largely brought about by the action of the government through its dairy commissioner and his staff. Now this department may be, and has been administered by a minister who is not a practical farmer. The work of the minister is not technical, but administrative. The Minister of Public Works is not a builder or an architect, the Minister of Marine is not a sea captain, the Minister of Militia is not a professional soldier, and the Minister of Railways could not drive a locomotive. But while it is not necessary that the Minister of Agriculture should be a farmer, there would be a certain fitness in such an arrangement, especially in view of the fact that farmers do not often reach high political positions. Senator Ferguson combines the qualifications of a farmer and politician. The chief business of his life has been the cultivation of the soil. But he has also had long experience as a legislator and as the administrator of a public department in his own province. He is a capable, broad-minded, public spirited man, devoted to his island province, but by no means singular in his ideas, and as he showed in the senate last year, he is a fair parliamentary speaker. If the government should be in search of a minister of agriculture, it would do well to consider the suggestion of the Watchman.

There is truth and point in these remarks. Certainly, the farmers of Canada have no right to make complaint against the Hon. Mr. Angers, whose zeal and ability in their behalf are alike admirable. But if the Premier has, or should have, in contemplation a re-adjustment of his Cabinet and the removal of the present Minister of Agriculture to another department, it would be most fitting that a practical farmer, who is at the same time an able parliamentarian, should be tendered the portfolio. In this view, the claims of Senator Ferguson cannot possibly escape the attention of Sir John Thompson.

PROMOTION IN THE CIVIL SERVICE.

On Wednesday last the Patriot reported in effect that Mr. A. D. McLeod had been appointed chief clerk in the Customs, and Mr. M. J. Chen, cashier, over the head of their senior in office, Mr. Edwin White. On the following day the Collector of Customs informed a member of the Examiner's staff that he had received no such information; and he dismissed the report as one of the many Opposition canards. We have not since then taken the trouble to make further enquiry, and presume that the status quo has been maintained. But the Patriot, has returned to the matter, and in a leading editorial declares that it has "every reason to believe" that the report is correct. Now a glance at the Civil List, by which the administration is governed, will show that Mr. McLeod is Mr. White's senior by about eighteen months. If, therefore, Mr. McLeod has been promoted, he certainly has an official right to the higher position upon the admitted ground of seniority of office. It will not be denied that Mr. McLeod and Mr. Chen are both good men; and if good men, they cannot but be pained at the Patriot's attempt to impress the public with the idea that they have supplanted their companion in office who, in simple justice, had a stronger claim. Shakespeare has well expressed the feeling of an honorable gentleman when he says that "To the noble mind rich gifts prove poor when givers prove unkind." That is to say, if the giver of the gift or preferment be unkind or unjust to another, the receiver of the promotion will not highly value it. We have no doubt that this will be the feeling of Messrs. McLeod and Chen, if they are promoted, as the Patriot asserts, they have been promoted, and their friend and fellow-official who was before them, has been left behind—without even an increase of salary. But personal good feeling and the application of the Golden Rule in respect to this matter are, of course, quite secondary to the question of public policy. We boast of our permanent, non-political, non-partisan Civil Service, and have great satisfaction in comparing it with the Spoils System of the United States. The essence of the Spoils System is that public offices and promotions in office shall go to the supporters of the political party in power. In contrast to this is the permanence of the Civil Service system of Canada which shall enter into the question of electioneering promotions within its ranks. We do not say that the ministry have not a perfect right to prefer one official before another. The interests of the public require a reasonable and just discrimination between man and man. Sir John Macdonald, when Minister of the Interior, promoted a young man named Burgess, who is now the Deputy Minister of that department. That young man had been one of his political opponents and had been appointed to the office by the Hon. David Mills. Upon the same principle, the Government have repeatedly maintained in office and promoted in office men who, before they entered office, were their most active opponents. Witness the cases of the Hon. Benjamin Davies and the late

Mr. Foley. We have no doubt that some of their supporters have been changed to opponents because their friends have not been promoted before their opponents. But the Government have considered the public interests and the importance of maintaining a permanent Civil Service as superior to questions of this or that party, or of this or that person. It is, therefore, to be presumed that if they have given to Mr. Moren a nominally higher position than to Mr. White, they have a good reason for their action; and that while keeping Mr. White in his old position, they will add materially to his salary. Mr. White and Mr. Moren are both excellent officials, and they will, we believe, be treated as such, independently of all other considerations.

We note that Mr. White has heretofore received but \$600 a year, though he has been sixteen years in the service and his efficiency has been sufficiently proved. This is a very small sum upon which to maintain a family and the position of a public official. Indeed, the salaries of all our Customs officials are small in comparison with those of other Provinces. The Patriot would, instead of fomenting bitter feelings between the officials, upon a report which has not been verified, and upon grounds one of which is not in accord with the Civil List, it had set forth the duty of the Government to provide adequate salaries for their officials in this Province.

—United States papers report that the country is rapidly recovering from the populist craze. The Indianapolis News says that the people have been through a valuable education in the last two years. It is significant that the Indiana prohibitionists recently declined to unite with them in a political campaign. These "third parties" are usually promoted and maintained by interested and selfish men. They are not, usually, in the interest of the country. As a rule, the well understood wishes of the people are not enforced by either one or other of the two parties into which British parliamentarism, as a rule, divided.

SILVER WEDDING CELEBRATION.—Rev. J. A. Gordon, pastor of Main Street Baptist Church, St. John, N. B., celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his marriage, on which occasion they were presented with a china dinner set, a set of silver knives and forks, butter dish and cake basket by the members of the congregation. An address appropriate to the occasion was presented. Rev. Mr. Gordon made a feeling reply.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 25.—The most destructive fire in the history of the state is now raging in Cherry, Thomas, Grant, Hooker and Sheridan counties. There are immense losses of hay and cattle, and it is feared there will also be loss of life.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 25.—A lamp was upset during the ceremonies of the consecration of a church in the village of Krokhi, in Don province, yesterday. In the rush which ensued two women and three children were trampled to death and twenty-three persons seriously hurt.

QUEBEC, Oct. 25.—News just received from the Lower St. Lawrence says the north and south shores are covered with snow and several schooners have been reported lost during the last week's storm. SAs FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—Despatches received in this city show that Southern California was shaken by several earthquake shocks shortly after three o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 25.—Two freight trains came into collision near Preybitkovo station on the Kosloff Waronsek railroad yesterday, demolishing 22 cars and killing ten train hands. A number of cars were loaded with benzine, which exploded.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—The congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church will make an effort to wipe off the debt on the church property, amounting to \$15,000, on the occasion of the jubilee. Ad to meeting of the congregation last evening, within half an hour nearly ten thousand dollars was subscribed.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—A consignment of a drug upon which the attention of the medical profession is now directed, has just come through the customs here. It is a small quantity of the new remedy for diphtheria, the anti-toxin serum. This is the first portion of the drug to reach this country. The inventor, Prof. Behring, of Berlin, who is its discoverer.

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 25.—Speaking at the annual banquet of the Massachusetts Republican Club in Music Hall here last night, Harold M. Sewall, of Maine, referring to the Democratic tariff policy which he said, would benefit English manufacturers, he said: "Great Britain is the last country in the world the people of America wish to confer any benefits on either by legislation or executive act. If it is possible for a peace-loving people like ourselves to have a traditional enemy, assure this that enemy is Great Britain." In conclusion the speaker conveyed the records of the Democratic and Republican parties with reference to foreign relations of the United States, characterizing the Democratic party as the party "which has won for us the approach that we are without a foreign policy and which stands ready now with a bill to complete its extinction and degrade our flag by loaning it to British ship-owners in time of war."

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The eastern asphaltic sales agents reached a conclusion today, as was generally expected. They agreed to advance prices and put no limit on the production of coal. This is an unusual proceeding. Heretofore the production has been limited, and this limitation has been depended upon to maintain and even advance prices.

PARIS, Oct. 25.—La Verite publishes a positive statement, said to be the authority of M. Roussel, to the effect that a secret agreement exists between France and Russia, and detailing the terms upon which the two countries agree to take joint action in view of the possibility of certain occurrences. This agreement is said to have been signed before the eyes of Admiral Gervais and the French squadron to that port.

ABOUT THE Y. M. C. A.

—For over twenty years the organization, known in every land under Heaven, has had a branch here. Its record has been a good one. Mistakes have been made, as is the case with every organization and every man. To deny this would be folly. The building will pass into other hands, for less noble purposes. Charlotetown, in the next few days, will score a victory for the right, or suffer an inglorious defeat should she permit out of their refuge for her young men to pass out of this work. No quibbling about minor questions will make the responsibility off. The other problem is to get men of God, who love young men with all their hearts, to take hold of this work and carry it forward on the lines well known and well tried in the Young Men's Christian Association work the world over. The Association is a democratic institution, and its membership, which is composed of members of evangelical churches, have the whole of the policy of the Association. The Young Men's Christian Association is what men give to Christianity; it has to do with the body, mind and spirit of young men.

The opportunity is being given now to give towards the first problem. The opportunity will be given to settle the second as soon as the first is settled. They both dovetail into each other, but after all must be settled separately and in this order.
