As noticed in our last, this Show came off at Charlestown on Wednesday the 23rd ultimo. Fifty Cows and Fifteen Bulls were brought to the show, and the latter presented a very creditable appearance. Upwards of one hundred head of CATTLE were exhibited in competition for the various prizes...

The Show of Sheep was rather inferior to what we have witnessed in previous years. In the Southdown class no competition. A very fine collection of Sows were shown, amongst them two presented by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor.

A sale by auction of Stock was held on the ground immediately after the close of the show, at which several lots of Cattle were made at fair prices—a two year old Heifer of the Cross between the Durham and Ayrshire, being knocked down for £100 by the late Mr. Lauchlin de Leiszler...

At five o'clock, the business of the day being over, all fifty gentlemen, including the President and all the Officers-Barons of the Society, sat down to dinner at Curtis' Hotel—which was served in excellent style, and reflected great credit on the management of the Society...
