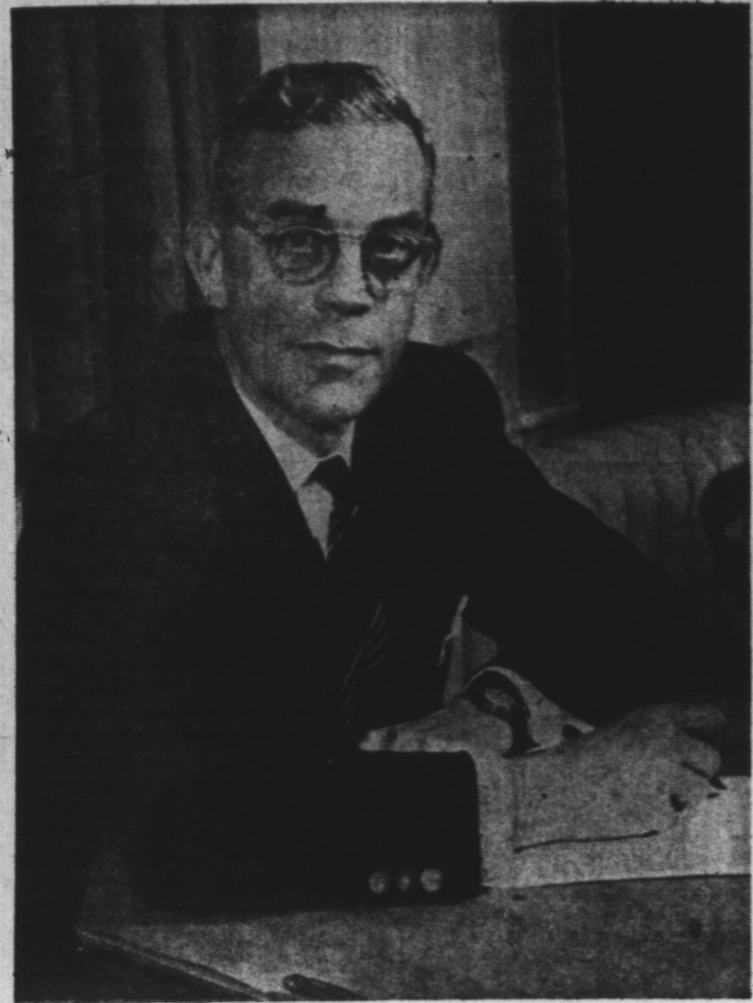

Russians Pour Soothing Salve On Controversy With Algeria

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) — Russia poured soothing salve on the Algerian controversy Thursday by saying that French President Charles de Gaulle can play an important role in settling the five-year-old war.

Soviet Ambassador Arkady Sobolev declared what was probably the mildest speech yet given on the Algerian issue by a Russian representative when he addressed the general assembly's 82-member political committee.

Diplomats said Sobolev's conciliatory approach probably resulted from the forthcoming visit of Soviet Premier Khrushchev to Paris next year, but he kept a certain sting in his remarks when he declared:

URGES ACTION
"President de Gaulle's proposals for self-determination could play an important role in the settlement of the Algerian question if they did not remain mere declarations and were supported by real measures which, taking into consideration the legitimate right of the Algerian people to free and independent development, would at the same time ensure the coordination of the mutual interests of the parties concerned."

Meanwhile, French sources described as unacceptable an Afro-Asian resolution, co-sponsored by 22 countries, urging French-Algerian talks on political issues as well as a cease-fire for the Algerian rebellion.

The sources predicted the resolution might win by a simple majority in the political committee, but would fall short of the necessary two-thirds majority in the general assembly.

Canada, which sided with France in the vote last year, has issued a new plea in the political committee against taking any UN action that might upset de Gaulle's efforts to restore peace.

SOME OPTIMISM
Burma's Ambassador U Thant, who introduced the 22-nation resolution, expressed confidence that it would win by enough to assure a two-thirds vote in the assembly. A spokesman for the Algerian rebels was equally optimistic. Last year an Afro-Asian resolution missed by a single vote.

Sobolev said the Soviet Union would support any resolution that would aid in achieving a peaceful and just solution in Algeria. He did not come out in direct

Applications For Draggers Are Received

A decision on two applications before the Fishermen's Loan Board for the building of two additional draggers for the Souris fleet will be reached at a board meeting next week, A. Walther Gaudet, chairman, said Thursday.

The two proposed draggers would be for individual fishermen of the area and would be in addition to the four draggers approved by the board recently for company use. It is expected that further applications will be received by the board.

Mr. Gaudet said Thursday that the board would like to see all fishermen there outfitted with draggers as "this is a terrific development in the industry". However, he pointed out that acceptance of all future applications by the board would depend entirely on the amount of money remaining in the fund for this purpose. He noted that the fund was now getting low.

ONTARIO DAM

The Fanshawe dam, a flood-control project on the Thames River near London, Ont., is 2,050 feet long and 77 feet above water.

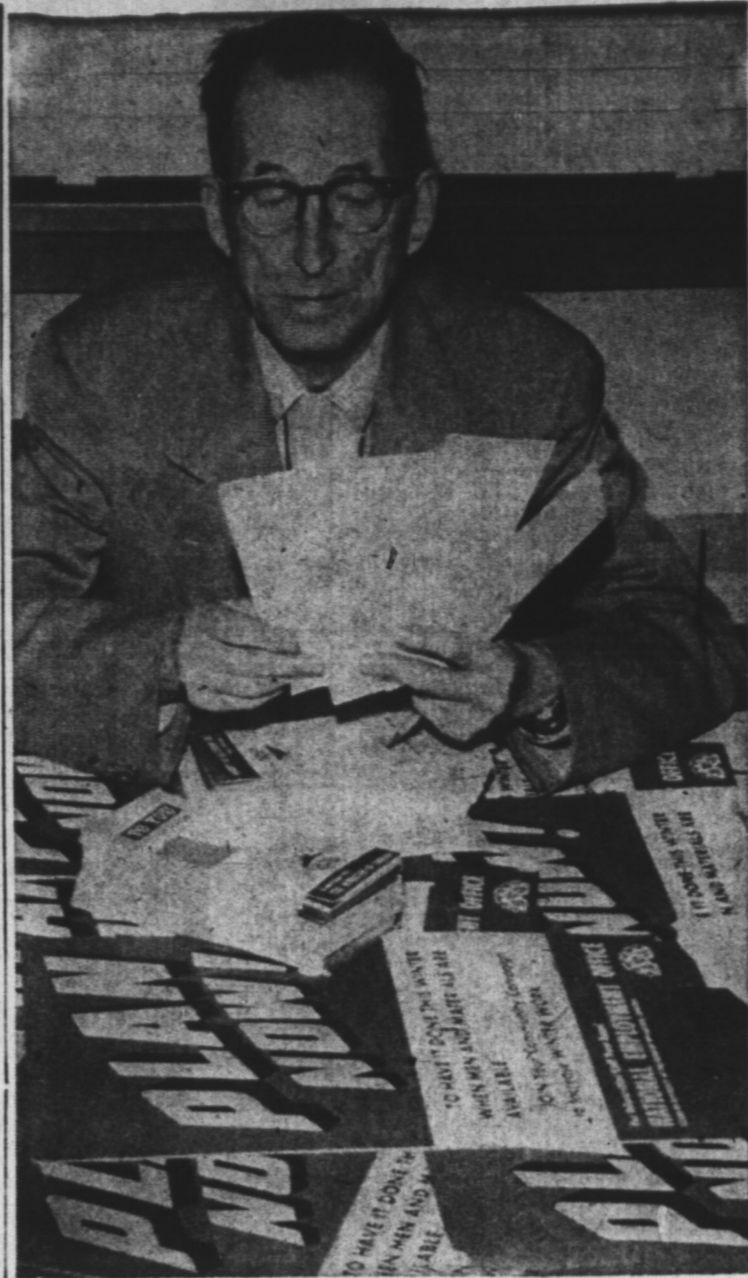
CAMPAIGN SUPPORTED

Need Funds To Keep Nuclear Bombers Constantly Air-borne

WASHINGTON (AP) — Neil McElroy, who resigned Tuesday as U.S. defence secretary, said Congress will be asked in January for money so nuclear bombers can be maintained on an air-borne alert.

As of Tuesday Russia and the United States have about the same number of long-range missiles and that number is "quite small" on both sides, McElroy said.

He told a press conference Tuesday this move toward keeping some bombers in the air at all times is in recognition that the U.S. will lag behind Russia in missiles for the next three years.

Thus, he left open the question of the time when the United States might go to an airborne alert because of Soviet missile superiority.

The idea of having bombers in the air is so that: (a) they cannot be destroyed on the ground

by a missile shot, and (b) they will be ready to strike back quickly.

McElroy said that if the Russians build the number of intercontinental missiles they are capable of building and if the United States builds the number it intends to, the Russians will have more missile capability during most of a three-year period. However, by 1963, McElroy said, the United States will have an even greater variety of means of delivering hydrogen warheads against the Soviet Union.

PROMINENT DOCTOR DIES
MONTREAL (CP)—Dr. Adrien Bonin, 79, chief anaesthetist at Verdun General Hospital for 23 years, died Thursday. Born in Ste. Elisabeth in nearby Joliette County, Dr. Bonin studied at Laval University and in Paris. His wife and a son survive.
