PESSIMISTIC BRITISH LIBERALS.

Right Hon. John Morley's Jeremiad.

HE FEARS THE TRIUMPH OF JINGOISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

And Denounces the Prevailing Spirit of Imperialism

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Right Hon. John Morley, Liberal Member of Parliament for Montroseburgh addressing his constituents at Brechin, yesterday, said that he entirely concurred in the reasons which induced Sir Vernon Harcourt to resign the leadership of the Liberal party. It was his own intention, he declared, to retire from active and responsible participation in the formal councils of the Liberal party, although his zealous and eager co-operation could always be counted upon for the advancement of every Liberal cause.

Mr. Morley criticized the prevailing spirit of jingoism and imperialism. He denounced it as entirely opposed to all the lessons of Mr. Gladstone. "I think," he exclaimed, "we are nearer the beginning of them than the end."

It was his firm conviction that the prevailing spirit of imperialism must inevitably bring militarism, a gigantic, daily growing expenditure, increased power to the aristocrats and privileged classes, and war.

DUBLIN, Jan. 17.—Under the new Irish Local Government Act, John Daly, a former political prisoner, and his supporters, have captured 24 out of 40 of the seats comprised in the New Limerick Corporation, and Daly is almost certain to be elected Mayor of that city, unless he is declared to be disqualified.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Canadian Home Journal for January is at hand. It is interesting, particularly to the ladies.

—It is reported that Mr. Sifton's colony of Grouse in the North-West is to be followed by a new colony of Mormons, and there is talk of the importation of a number of Armenians to occupy parts of the territories.

—Speaking of the proposed Abolition of the Senate, "Bystander," in the Farmers Sun, says:

"The abolition of the Senate would be a serious step.

"It would leave us with a single Chamber, elected by universal, or almost universal, suffrage, and as the Governor-General is a figurehead, without any safeguard corresponding to the Presidential veto in the United States.

"It has been pronounced by Liberal writers that of all tyrannies such a constitution would be the worst.

"We are told that the single elective chamber would represent the will of the people.

"It would represent the will of the people, distorted by all the personal and local influences, the corruption, the blind passion, the blatherskite, the falsehood, and the senseless shibboleths of elections.

"But what we want is to be governed, not by anybody's will, but by the reason of the community."

—The Toronto Globe seems to have repented of the Premier's audacity in challenging the decision of the Senate on the Yukon and the Drummond County deals: It observes:

"If the Senate does a good act it is no argument for its maintenance, neither is a bad act a reason for its abolition. Either may be the result of accident. Unless we claim that senators have superhuman prescience and take it to Ottawa with them, we must admit that they are just as likely to obstruct wise as foolish legislation."

Upon which the Montreal Gazette remarks that it did not need superhuman prescience, but just ordinary business ability and common sense, to decide that the Yukon and Drummond County deals were not for the public advantage. The senators justify on their ordinary common sense.

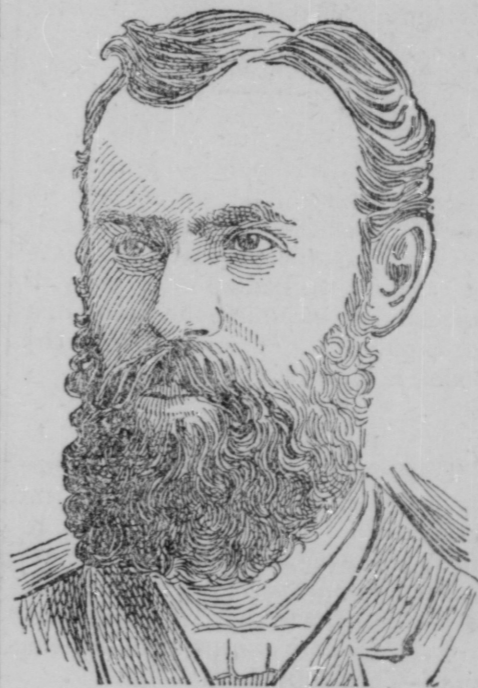
