Mary Stewart Ties Record in Leading Canadian Team

SAO PAULO, Brazil (CP-AP) — Under glittering sunshine, the four Pan-American Games moved into high gear Sunday with Canada's swimming team led by world champion Mary Stewart of Vancouver who equalled a Games record — qualifying all seven entries.
Competition began in 10 sports — swimming, tennis, fencing, cycling, base ball, volleyball, basketball, shooting, judo and weightlifting. More than 1,600 athletes from 21 countries are taking part in the two-week packed that winds up May 5.
Mary Stewart, queen of the butterfly swimmers, tackled her specialty — the women's 100-metre butterfly — and won her heat by well outside her world record of 1:07.03, her clocking was a full second better than her gold medal-winning performance in the 1962 British Empire Games at Perth, Australia.
Four swimming events were held in the 50-metre, 10-lane pool with the eight fastest times in each qualifying for the finals Tuesday night.
Joining Miss Stewart in butterfly final was 15-year-old Sharon Pierce of Prince Rupert, B.C., who finished second only behind the other heat winner, Kathy Ellis of the U.S. Miss Ellis clocked 1:09.9 and Miss Pierce 1:15.0.
Two heats were run off in each of the four races and the Americans qualified all eight entries. Among the men, two Americans broke Games records and Sandy Gilchrist of Ocean Falls, B.C., equalled an other.
The first three finishers in the men's 100-metre freestyle led by Steve Clark of the U.S. smashed the Games mark of 58.3 set by American Jeff Farrell in 1959.

SHERRY WINS
Clark won the second heat in 54.7 after Dean Dan Sherry of Hamilton, Ont., easily captured the first in 56.6.
Gilchrist, 17-year-old holder of 10 Canadian senior records, swam in the same heat with Clark and finished fourth in 58.3.
John Kelso of Ocean Falls was fifth in another heat but his 2:51.8 was just enough to qualify.
The other two Canadians to qualify were Ed Gazlett of Vancouver and Ralph Hutton of Ocean Falls. Two Americans, Ed Barsch and Charles Buttick, captured the heats in similar times of 1:03.7.
Cazlett, a 21-year-old University of British Columbia student at the Olden

city of Washington, placed third in 1:07.9. Hutton was fourth in 1:08.7 in the other heat.
Canadians advanced in men's fencing and the men's tennis singles but lost their opener in volleyball.
WITS IN FOILS
Hungarian-born Ben Simon of Montreal advanced to the finals of the individual foil championship but two other Canadians, John Andru of Toronto and Peter Bakonyi of Vancouver, bowed out in the first round.
In tennis, Canadian Davis Cupper Harry Faulstich of Toronto breezed past Venice Roci of Uruguay 6-1, 6-1, 6-1 in the first round of the men's singles.
But in the longest game of the day, Don Fontana of Toronto, playing captain of the Canadian Davis Cup team, was eliminated by Brazil's Carlos Ferrnandes 6-2, 6-2, 11-9. They went at it for more than two hours before the 25-year-old Fontana finally was subdued in a torrid final set.
Heavily-favored Brazil overwhelmed Canada 3-0 in the opener of the men's volleyball tournament. The Brazilians won the three games 15-0, 15-0, 15-4. The Canadian team comprised mainly Latvian-born players.

Toronto Cars Hold First Five Places

CALGARY (CP) — Toronto cars—one with a United States license—held the first five places in the 4,000-mile Cross-Canada Rally Sunday at the end of the first lap here.
However, with the rally only 18 hours old—it began 656 miles to the west in Vancouver Saturday night and ends in Montreal Friday—a controversy was building up.
Rally officials, notified that only half a dozen of the 47 cars had checked through the first control point outside Vancouver, investigated and found that the control's lights had failed sometime during the night.
