A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.—A peculiar accident occurred at Cross Creek near Fredericton, N. B., a few days ago. Thos. Coughlan was carrying a bundle of shingles up a ladder, having a pipe in his mouth at the time. When near the top he fell. CITY COUNCIL.—At the last regular monthly meeting of the City Council a by-law respecting milk vendors was passed. The by-law is similar to the old one. The street committee was authorized to connect Richmond and West Streets by a breastwork with earth filling \$200 to be taken from the street appropriation for that purpose. The same committee was also authorized to lay a concrete sidewalk on the east and west sides of the market house. It was ordered that the breastwork and shore road around Victoria Park be proceeded with until such time as the material on hand is used up. The matter of music on Queen Square was referred to the Mayor and Councillors Taylor and Johnson.
