City Merchant, War Veteran Dies March 2

Harry A. MacDougall, a long time resident of Charlottetown and formerly of Belfast, died at the Livingstone and MacArthur Nursing Home, Tuesday, March 2, 1965.

Mr. MacDougall moved to Charlottetown prior to World War I and was employed with Patons Department Store on Richmond Street. He served over seas in Belgium and Germany and was wounded in France. He was awarded the Military Medal and after his discharge from the army in 1919, received a commission with an Island Regiment. He was also awarded a 30 years service medal.

Up until three years ago he owned and operated MacDougall's Men's Wear on Great George Street.

Mr. MacDougall was an active member of Zion Presbyterian Church and was made Elder in 1926.

He was the first president of the first Legion in Charlottetown in 1926.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacDougall, Belfast, he is survived by his wife, the former May Macdonald of Georgetown, residing at 129 North River Road, a daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Wellner, Charlottetown, sisters, Mrs. A. E. Smith, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Hector McLeod of Calgary. Also surviving are three grandchildren residing in Charlottetown.

Nine Planes Island-Based For Seal Hunt

Prince Edward Island seal hunters are anxiously awaiting the opening of the annual seal hunt which gets underway March 7 in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

A member of the sealing party from Prince Edward Island said nine fixed wing aircraft have been licensed through the Charlottetown Department of Fisheries. These planes, which are a key factor in sealing operations, are not necessarily island-based aircraft but the majority of the crews will be Islanders. Air reconnaissance has been hindered for the past two weeks, due to poor weather conditions.

Flying sealers are hoping for a break in the weather which would enable planes to get a fix on the main seal herd.

Tignish has been established as the first base for operations and if no seals are sighted near Prince Edward Island the operation will then move to the Magdalen Islands.

6 Disturbances Cases; One Given Dismissal

SUMMERSIDE — The case of a Summerside man, Alex MacLean, charged with creating a disturbance in or near a public place by fighting was dismissed by Magistrate W. Chester S. Macdonald yesterday morning in Prince County Court.

A second Summerside resident, appearing on a similar charge arising from the same incident, was fined \$50 and costs and ordered to enter into a bond of \$250.

George Michael Charles Kinch had pleaded guilty to the charge as an earlier hearing and in assessing the fine Magistrate Macdonald told the accused this was the last warning he was being given and that next time he appeared on a charge such as this he would be given a jail term.

MacLean had earlier pleaded not guilty and two crown witnesses stated yesterday that Kinch had punched MacLean as he was leaving the Kensington Legion.

SDU President Attends Session Of Universities

Dr. Rev. G. A. Macdonald, president of St. Dunstan's University, is in Halifax today attending a meeting of the Association of Atlantic Universities.

One of the principal items in today's session of the AAU will be a discussion of the possibility of engineering students spending only two years at affiliate universities and three years at Nova Scotia Technical College before receiving their engineering degrees.

They now spend three years at the affiliate universities, two at Tech.

Other items for discussion include: university entrance requirements; winter carnivals; the possibility of setting up a common scheme for concerts, lectures, etc. among Atlantic universities, with a secretariat in Halifax; the suggestions of the Bladen commission; and 1965-66 tuition fees.

market was "a vital question" to be considered, Mr. Macdonald said. "If we had controlled marketing, prices would not be fluctuating as they are today."

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

Speaking on the possibility of a vocational school for Kings County, Mr. Macdonald said "the school is going to be a long way from the outer perimeters of the county, wherever it is located."

Some students, he said, would have to travel as far as 140 miles per day, and this would constitute "a great physical strain" on the students.

WEIGHT REGULATIONS

The First Prince member said he saw no reason why weight restrictions should be placed on the highway from Albany to Miscouche. He said that since the government plans to make this stretch of highway into an all-weather road this year, it wouldn't hurt if it was broken up now by lack of weight restrictions.

Mr. Campbell added that a ferry between West Point and New Brunswick is "necessary to the people of West Prince." He said "I don't see why the provincial and federal governments can't handle this project."
