PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Another Yukon Railway Bill in the Senate.

NEITHER MONEY NOR LAND ASKED FROM THE GOVERNMENT.

Only the Power to Construct.

OTTAWA, April 1.—In the Senate yesterday Yukon was the order of the day.

Senator Longheed moved the second reading of the bill incorporating Hamilton Smith's company and giving power to construct a railway into the Yukon country by the Dalton trail and Pyramid Harbor. The company is not asking for money or land but only for the privilege of building the railway. Senator Mills, for the Government, opposed the bill and moved the six month's hoist.

At the end of the afternoon's discussion Sir McKenzie Bowell moved an adjournment of the debate which was carried by a vote of 26 to 24.

In the House of Commons Mr. Britton's bill, amending the criminal code, got the six month's hoist.

UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

Spain's Answer to McKinley.

SHE SHOULD HAVE RIGHT TO PROPOSE

What's to be Done in Her Own Territory.

NEW YORK, April 1.—The following outline is given in a special of Spain's answer: "Spain neither accedes to or declines President McKinley's propositions. She takes the counter argument that she should herself be allowed to propose terms as to what should be done regarding her own territory; that the United States should not do so.

NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

HALIFAX, March 29.—There was a rumor about the city today that inquiries had been made by the government regarding the facilities for supplying coal for American warships in case of war with Spain. General Moore is expected back from Washington tomorrow morning.

OWEN SOUND, Ont., March 29.—Thos. Campbell, a farmer, had a bad attack of biliousness last night with the result that he hanged himself this morning.

OTTAWA, March 29.—Sir Louis Davies to-day paid over to the owners of the sealing schooner Willie McGowan the sum allowed by the Russian government for the illegal seizure as damages in the cases of the Willie McGowan and Ariel. The amount of \$40,085, was forwarded by Russia to the minister of marine and fisheries, who awarded \$19,485 to the Ariel, and \$20,500 to the McGowan, whose owners were represented by Mayor Bertram and W. H. Moore, of North Sydney, who have been in Ottawa for the past few days. The McGowan was owned in North Sydney, C. B., and the Ariel in Victoria, B. C. Mr. Bertram will at once make the distribution among the co-owners.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., March 29.—A letter has been received from Skagway stating that Delyea of Belleville, was shot dead there on January 1. Delyea got mixed up in a barrel quarrel with Ed. Fay and three companions. He went to get assistance and returned with the United States marshal. When they entered the door both were shot dead by Fay, who was afterwards captured and confessed.

LONDON, March 29.—A despatch from Shanghai to a news agency here says there is reason to believe the presence of the entire American squadron at Hong Kong, which was originally supposed to be designed for Manila on the prospect of war with Spain, was really intended as a practical display of American sympathy with the British policy in China. The American and British admirals had frequent interviews.

MONTREAL, March 30.—It has been definitely decided that the Queen's birthday will be celebrated by the regiment in this city by a grand field day, in which the entire militia force of the city will take part. It is also more than likely that the 62nd battalion, from St. John N. B., will be here for a few days at that time, and will join the local regiments in the review and in the field exercises. Operations will last two days and 5,200 men will be engaged.

A Regret.

SIR,—Some time ago there appeared, in the columns of THE EXAMINER, a letter, which was written by me, complaining that I had been informed that Mr. George McCormack, school inspector for the Eastern district of the Island, was using his influence over teachers and students in order to sell them life insurance. Since that time, Mr. McCormack has proved to my satisfaction that this information was not correct. I therefore take this means of expressing my regret that such a letter was written by me as I have none but the most friendly feelings for Mr. McCormack. I may, however, add for his information that the person from whom I received my information is an employer of the very company for which I accused Mr. McCormack of working. I have no doubt, however, but what it was the earnest desire which this person has to convey the idea that his company is doing a "rushing business," rather than any desire to injure Mr. McCormack, which caused him to give utterance to the statements which have caused so much annoyance.

A Criticism.

SIR,—I see by the daily papers, Guardian and Patriot, of this week, that a Guard of Honor is detailed to receive his Honour the Lieut-Governor on Tuesday next at the opening of the Local Legislature, and that the command of this guard is given to Major Weeks of the Charlottetown Engineers. Now, sir, if I understand the military regulations aright the detail of a Guard of Honor for this purpose consists of 1 Captain, 2 Lieutenants, 4 Sergeants and 100 rank and file. Surely the D. O. C., of No. 12 district is aware that a Guard of Honor is not a Major's command, and on referring to G. O., No. 5, 1897, under the head of "Engineers," I find the following:—"To be Major, Captain and Brevet-Major William Arthur Weeks," 9th January, 1897.

In referring to District orders, of the 23rd March, 1898, the detail is as follows: Chief town Engineers, 1 Capt., 1 Sgt-Major, 2 Sergeants, 40 Sappers; 82nd Battalion, 1 Adjutant, 1st Lieut., 2nd Lieut., 2 Sergeants, 60 Privates.

How can it be possible for Major Weeks to take command in the face of regulations and orders, and also under the above detail? I could understand the matter if Major Weeks were a Brevet-Major and Captain. But when he attains the substantive rank of Major, his command of Guard of Honor ceases. Probably the D. O. Commander could explain.

LATEST NEWS NOTES.

Coal gas from the open door of a stove caused the death of Mrs. Alex. McArthur, of London, Ont., on Saturday.

Since the Spanish-American war several American securities have, on an average, declined 10 per cent. or more.

When the Queen leaves Cimiez her apartments will, it is understood, be occupied by the Empress of Austria.

While hunting near Hamilton, Ont., James Findlay picked up a portion of a tooth of a mastodon weighing about five pounds.

The family of William Sleeth, sr., Batteree, Ont., narrowly escaped annihilation owing to the introduction of some poison in a "Johnny cake," of which they had eaten at dinner. The family consists of five persons. All were seized by violent vomiting. It is thought by some means a quantity of "Rough on Rats" had found its way into the "Johnny cake." For a time the life of W. Sleeth was despaired of, but he eventually rallied, as did the other members of the poisoned family.

Montreal harbor will shortly see very large vessels plying into it. There are additions being made to the list. According to the Liverpool Journal of Commerce, a contract has been let for another. Allen liner, dimensions not given, but presumed the same as those of the "Castalian" and "Tunisian," the latter of which is 500 feet long, 60 feet beam, and between 9,000 and 10,000 tons burthen. The Dominion line is building the "Yorkshire" and the "Dominion," the Donaldson line a 7,000 ton steamer for the Canadian service.

A young Mohammedan woman residing in the Sudder Bazar at Nagpur, was bitten in her left hand by a poisonous snake, which had concealed itself in her hut under a heap of firewood. The woman was hurried off to a neighboring Hindu temple and put under the treatment of a fakir, who resorted to a lot of unintelligible incantations, while the alarmed and half paralysed sufferer was made to chew neem leaves and green chilis. Needless to add she succumbed to the reptile's venom in less than half an hour, her last moments being of extreme torture, aggravated by the absurdities of the fakir's unique treatment.
