JELLIED VEGETABLE SALAD
1 1/2 cups gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1-1/2 cup white sugar
1/4 tsp salt
1 cup hot water
1/2 cup mild vinegar
1/2 cup chopped, cooked beets
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 cup peas
1 small onion, chopped.
Soften gelatine in cold water, add sugar, salt and hot water, and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar and allow jelly to thicken somewhat. Stir in the vegetables. Chill and when firm unmold. Serve on lettuce leaf, garnish with celery and any salad dressing.

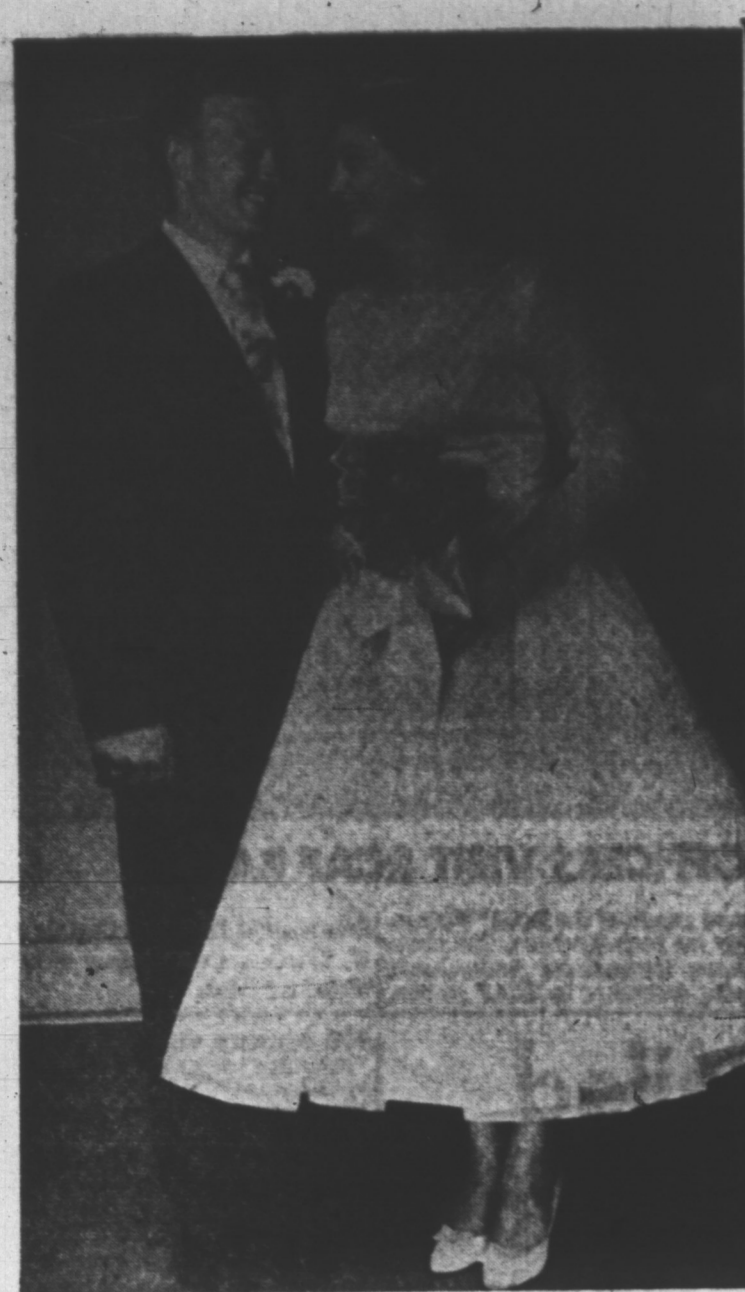
